

EASTER, the message of HOPE

"On the first day of the week, very early in the morning, the women took the spices they had prepared and went to the tomb. They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, but, when they entered, they did not find the body of the Lord Jesus. While they were wondering about this, suddenly two men in clothes that gleamed like lightning stood beside them. In their fright the women bowed down with their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, he has risen! Remember how he told you, while he was still with you in Galilee; The Son of Man must be delivered over to the hands of sinners, be crucified and on the third day be raised again." Then they remembered his words" Luke 24:1-8 NIV.

Let's go back in time about 2,000 years. It's the week following the resurrection. There is a buzz about Jerusalem. Jesus of Nazareth has risen from the dead. The women who went to the tomb were talking about it. The soldiers and the Sanhedrin were talking about it. The disciples were talking about it. And we are still talking about it. "The Resurrection".

Easter may be coming, for many, just another holiday, but not for us. For the church, it's a day we celebrate life and hope. Easter is the HIGH DAY of the Christian faith. It's why we know we have the promise of eternal life, the promise of heaven. Easter, a day that represents things coming back to life. It is not just about his resurrection - it's about our resurrection. Not just in the sense that someday we will be resurrected but it is about God bringing us out of our graves of disappointment, despair, our failures and our past. "We have passed from death unto life" John 5:24.

I don't know if the world really understands everything Jesus did for us. Dying on the cross for our sins. Taking our shame and destroying the power of sin over us. But, it was absolutely necessary for him to rise from the dead. The disciples thought they had lost him. They did not remember his words. They didn't fully understand that he had to rise for all our sakes. He had to come back to life so that we could come to life.

Ephesians 2:1 "As for you, you were dead in your transgressions and sin." We needed to be resurrected from our sins. Paul said in 1 Corinthians 15:17, "If Christ has not been raised, your faith is in vain and you are still in your sins."

The stone to the tomb wasn't rolled away so that Jesus could get out. It was rolled away so that man could see in and believe the resurrection. Imagine these ladies in Luke 8 coming to the tomb after the crucifixion to anoint the body. Not to celebrate, but to mourn. The tomb was empty. He had risen. Two messengers from heaven spoke to the women. "Remember how he told you, the son of man must be crucified and be raised again." Then they remembered his words. Luke 24:7-8

We may remember a lot of things about the days surrounding Easter. But it is imperative that we remember his words. I think when the disciples saw the resurrected Christ they, too, remembered the words he spoke at the tomb of Lazarus - "I am the resurrection and the life. Anyone who believes in me will live, even though they die, and whoever lives by believing in me will never die."

John 11: 25-26. They remembered his words about how he was the good shepherd who would lay down his life for his sheep. His words about how God had sent him into the world, not to condemn the world, but that the world through him might be saved. They remembered it was the Father's good pleasure to give them the kingdom.

A few years ago, I stood at the empty tomb in Israel, a city somewhat commercialized, and amid all the traffic noise I was thinking in my spirit what a scene this must have been. To arrive at the tomb and hear the angels say, he is not here, he is risen. When I entered the empty tomb that day, it made the scriptures come alive and I remembered his words, "Because you have seen me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen and yet believed" John 20:29.

1 Peter 1:8, "Though you have not seen Him, you love Him; and even though you do not see him now, you believe in Him and are filled with an inexpressible and glorious joy."

Not everyone got to see Messiah in the flesh. Not everyone got to witness the resurrection. Not everyone will visit the Holy Land in their lifetime. But, it is vital that everyone remember his words. The message of hope.

Sharing Faith Forms Faith

There are natural links between evangelism and spiritual formation. Most Christians, however, view formation as following a faith decision versus interacting with it. But the relationship between growth and the gospel is more complex and beautiful. Developing and deepening over time. The unfortunate consequences of the common view is that it deprioritizes evangelism for people already caught. That leaves them ill prepared to share the good news with others.

In the past I have focused my attention more on personal growth than on evangelism. I see now that what I and others have unwittingly done is equip an army to feed and care for itself while leaving it unprepared for a wider war. Sharing faith has to be taught as an integral part of formation.

As believers, we are stewards of our gifts and calling but we also steward the attention of others. We give those who encounter us a glimpse for better or worse of the Christ on earth. When we give ourselves to evangelism, we are lifting him up and presenting him to a world crying out for a Savior, instead of just secreting him away as a tool for our own personal sanctification.

It is important to remember that evangelism is how we love the world as God does, but conversion is the work of the Holy Spirit. Live the truth you tell. Tell the truth you live. The rest is God's business. When we wed ourselves to the idea that we are responsible for making people believe, we put ourselves in the place of the Savior or the Spirit. We take the glory that doesn't belong to us.

Christians need to rediscover that listening is an act of love. Listening makes room for people. In a culture that places high value on acceptance, this is no small thing. When we make space first for who people are, and for what matters to them, only then can we know how to offer ourselves and our faith to them. Listening is the first duty of a servant. Without it he or she has no way of knowing what the master requires. When we share our faith, we are servants, not sages.

We are spiritually formed by and in the love of God in Christ. Evangelism is the fruit and the root of our formation. To give the grace we have been given is not only the evidence of our transformation; it is itself transforming. Every opportunity to share our faith with others challenges us to live out what we say we believe. And every time that we refuse to shrink away from that responsibility, we are strengthened in our faith and as a witness.



"We Were Worth His Journey"

I often wonder what Jesus was going through in the days leading up to the cross. He had gone from hero to zero in a matter of hours. One day He was being celebrated through the streets of Jerusalem. A few days later that same crowd was shouting, "Crucify"!

Being "Jesus," He had strength to fulfill what He had come to earth to fulfill. Being "man," He was probably afraid and full of dread.
