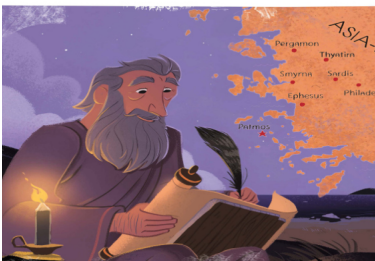

leader bible study

The Book of Revelation opens with John's description of a vision. In the vision, Jesus gave John messages for seven local churches. Jesus told John to write these messages on a scroll and send them to the churches.

In most cases, Jesus commended the church for their good work, warned them about the areas in which they needed correction, and urged them to return to Him. Among other things, He warned the churches not to forget their love of the Lord. He encouraged them not to be afraid of being tested. He urged those who were surrounded by evil to not deny their faith. Each time, Jesus promised to reward those who remain faithful to Him.

The church is made up of people who have trusted in Jesus, who are committed to one another, and who meet together to worship Jesus and share the gospel. Jesus loves the church as His bride. (See Eph. 5:25-27; Rev. 19:7-9.) Jesus' message called the churches to turn away from their sin and remain faithful to Him. The Lord is slow to anger (Ex. 34:6-7) and patient, wanting everyone to repent (2 Pet. 3:9).

Jesus warned specific churches in Asia Minor (modern-day Turkey), but the problems they faced can still be found in churches today. Help kids understand some of the problems the early churches faced: They did not love like they should, they believed false teaching and did wrong things, and they were lukewarm—useless to the cause of Christ.

We can pray for our churches to be faithful, effective instruments in spreading the gospel. We should love the church because Jesus loves the church. Through the church, Jesus helps believers work together to do God's plan. Finally, Jesus warned believers to stay alert because He will come like a thief when no one is expecting Him. Believers—then and now—must always be ready!

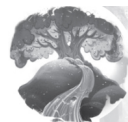

Celebrate being here! Introduce the morning.

Open in Prayer

Hook

Prompt kids to think about a time they built a sandcastle or a block tower. Was it strong? What did they do to help it stand firm? Today we will hear a message Jesus had for 7 churches needing to stand firm in their faith.

Big Picture Question

The stories we talk about each week help us answer a big picture question. During our time together, we have been thinking about the question: ***What is the hope of the church? The church looks forward to Jesus' return when He will make all things new.*** Believers can have hope in hard times because we know that Jesus is coming back soon.

Key Passage

Lead the boys and girls to read together Revelation 11:15. Believers will face difficulties in this world. The good news is that we can live with hope, knowing that one day soon, Jesus will return and reign forever. As our verse says, the kingdom of this world will become the kingdom of our Lord and of His Christ. Knowing this truth, believers can keep turning away from sin, following Jesus, and working together to do God's plan by sharing the good news of the gospel.

Timeline/Introduce Bible Story:

Last week we read that **Jesus appeared to John in a vision**. Jesus instructed John to write down everything his vision. Jesus is the First and the Last, the Living One. This week we'll be learning what Jesus wanted the seven churches to know. .

Transition to Bible Story: (OPTIONAL) Show the Bible Story Video.



15 Min Journey

Where we travel into God's word

Bible Story

Open your Bible to **Revelation 2-3** Read from the Bible or use your storytelling skills to help you tell the story.

Last week, we began looking at the Book of Revelation. Jesus had revealed Himself to John in a vision and told him to write down everything he saw and heard. In today's story, we heard about the messages Jesus had for seven early churches. Jesus spoke to churches like the one in Smyrna, who faced hardship because they followed Him. He told them to remember that even though they were facing hardship, they would receive a great inheritance when they completed their time on earth and went to be with the Lord. He also warned churches like those in Ephesus, Pergamum, Laodicea, and Sardis to turn away from their sins and return to following Him completely. He warned the church at Thyatira not to be tricked by false teachers but to continue on in the way they were loving and serving others.

Jesus had an individual message for each church, but He had one message for all the churches. Jesus told the churches to not give up. He desired for each church to turn away from things that were causing them to be ineffective witnesses and return to follow Him with perseverance.



Jesus loves the church. His message to the seven local churches called them to turn away from their sin and remain faithful to Him. We can learn from those churches. Through the church, Jesus helps believers work together to do God's plan. By studying the message Jesus had for each of the churches, we can think about our own lives and turn from sin, getting rid of anything that gets in the way of following God.

Age Appropriate Story

STORY POINT: JESUS TOLD CHURCHES TO NOT GIVE UP.

The apostle John was on the island of Patmos when he had a vision of Jesus. Jesus told John to write down a message for seven churches. So that is what John did. “To the church in Ephesus: You do not love well like you did when you first believed. Turn back and love like you used to.

“To the church in Smyrna: You are poor and are suffering, but really you are rich!

“To the church in Pergamum: You are faithful to Me, and you tell others about Me even when it is hard. But not everyone in the church is doing the right thing. Turn away from your sin and turn back to Me!

“To the church in Thyatira: I know about your love, faithfulness, and service. Keep believing the truth until I come.

“To the church in Sardis: People think you are alive, but you are actually dead. Turn from your sin and remember the gospel.

“To the church in Philadelphia: You have little power, but you listen to Me and obey My word. I am coming soon. Be ready and keep believing.

“To the church in Laodicea: You are lukewarm—not hot or cold, so you are not good for anything. I will spit you out!”

Jesus said, “See! I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears My voice and opens the door, I will come in to him and eat with him, and he with Me.” Jesus will reward every faithful and obedient believer.

Christ Connection: Jesus loves the church. His message to seven local churches called them to turn away from their sin and remain faithful to Him. We can learn from those churches. Through the church, Jesus helps believers work together to do God’s plan.



Discussion & Bible Skills

Distribute Bibles. Guide boys and girls to open their Bibles to Revelation 3. Choose a volunteer to read aloud Revelation 3:20-22.

• Revelation is the very last book of the New Testament and the final book of the Bible. It was written by Jesus' disciple John. John also wrote the Gospel of John—which is about Jesus' life and ministry—and he wrote the letters of First, Second, and Third John, which were letters written to early believers. The message Jesus had for the seven churches is a message that still applies to believers today. Lead the group to discuss:

- 1. How can we be the most effective for the cause of Christ?** *Help kids recognize that they must be aware of anything that would keep them from an intimate relationship with Jesus. All believers must turn from sin and watch for false teachers. We must follow hard after Jesus, looking forward to the reward we will experience in eternity.*
(Option: Choose a volunteer to read Col. 3:23-24.)
- 2. How do the warnings to some of the churches show God's love for these churches?** *Remind kids that Jesus loves the church and wants us to be a part of His plan. God disciplines His children, so out of His love for the church, Jesus tells them to remain faithful to Him.*
(Option: Choose a volunteer to read Heb. 12:6.)
- 3. What does it mean to be lukewarm?** *Clarify that lukewarm describes a temperature that is neither hot (hot water is therapeutic) nor cold (cold water is refreshing). We become ineffective for Jesus' cause if we are lukewarm. He desires that all believers follow Him passionately.*
(Option: Choose a volunteer to read Ps. 63:1.)
- 4. How can we be faithful to remain in Him until His return?** *Discuss different ways we can build up our faith to remain in Christ.*

Instill Wonder as you experience the Bible
CHOOSE ONE ACTIVITY

Key Passage Activity

Before the session, write each word or key phrases of the key passage on sticky notes. Make two or three sets of sticky notes. Stick the sticky notes to individual blocks (building blocks, large interlocking bricks, or magnet tiles). Divide the kids into two or three groups. Provide each group with a set of blocks with attached sticky notes. Instruct the groups to put the blocks in order and recite the key passage. Challenge the groups to build a church with the blocks.

Heads up, seven up

Choose seven kids to stand at the front of the room. The rest of the kids will put their heads down and stick their thumbs up. The seven kids with each touch another kid's thumb. Once touched, kid will put her thumb down. The seven will go back to the front of the room and say, "heads up, seven up!" The kids whose thumbs were touched will stand up and get one chance to guess who touched their thumb. If they guess correctly, they change places and become one of the seven in front. Play again as time allows.

- Seven is an important number in Scripture. God uses the number seven to show perfection and completeness. In today's story, Jesus instructed John to write a message to churches. Can you guess how many churches?

Loving the Church

Choose a way that your class can serve the church: clean the room or another area, sing to a preschool class, make cards to pass out in a senior adult class, and so forth. Discuss with the kids why we serve and love our church. Explain that Jesus loves and serves the church, so if we love Jesus, we will love who He loves.

- Jesus loves the church. Because Jesus loved and served the church first, we can love and serve the church. What are some other ways you can serve the church?

Notes of Encouragement

Discuss the role of the church leaders and pastors at your church. Make a list of ways the church leaders and pastors help believers in your church to remain faithful to Jesus and wait for His return.

Provide kids with construction paper, markers, and stickers. Instruct them to write notes of encouragement to church leaders and pastors thanking them for their instruction, leadership, and teaching. Allow kids to decorate their notes. Deliver the notes after class or let kids deliver their own notes.

- Jesus encouraged the churches when they were doing good work. He warned and corrected them about things they were doing wrong. Jesus urged the churches to repent, turn to Him, and remain faithful. The church is made up of believers who have trusted in Jesus. Leaders and pastors help the church remain faithful to Jesus and share the gospel. We can encourage our leaders and pastors in their work and thank them for helping us follow Jesus.

Pen Pals

Kids will get to know one another by “interviewing” one another; however, kids can only ask and answer questions by writing them down—without talking. Begin by grouping kids into pairs. Start a timer for 8 minutes. Challenge the kids to learn at least one thing about as many kids as they can within the 8-minute time. When the timer starts, each kid will write down a question she would like to ask and show it to her partner. The partner will then write down his answer. They will then both find other kids to interview.

When time is up, invite kids to share what they found out about one another and determine who interviewed the most kids.

- Though it is less frequently used today, letter-writing was a common means of communication during the time of the early church. In our Bible story today, we will see how John wrote letters to seven churches to give them a message from Jesus.

Start and Finish

Prepare to play partner charades by writing the following events on separate index cards: *playing a basketball game, mowing the lawn, talking on the phone, doing the dishes, reading a book, and getting a haircut.*

Invite two partners to draw an index card. The first partner should act out the beginning of the event. The second partner should act out the end of the event. Encourage the rest of the group to guess what the partners are acting out. (Example: When talking on the phone, the first player might begin by picking up a pretend phone and mouthing a conversation. The second volunteer should mouth a brief conversation and then hang up the phone.)

After kids guess, allow another pair to act out an event.

- In today’s Bible story, Jesus said, “I am the beginning and the end.” What do you think He meant by that?



5 min Pilot's log

Pray:

If time, share prayer requests and allow kids to record in the **prayer journal section of their *Travel Guide***.

ALWAYS CLOSE THE MORNING WITH PRAYER.

Waiting for parents/Activity Page:

Tie back into the lesson, remind them of the Big Picture Question/verse, etc...

Be sure to **re-set expectations on what their choices are while waiting for mom and dad:**

- Activity page
- Key Passage Activity (See next page for list of options)
- Coloring page
- Gospel Kit Activities
- Anything quiet at the tables you are ok with (*origami, free draw on blank paper, hangman game at white board, putting Book of the Bible cards in order, etc....*)

Be sure that the Co-Pilots hand out the Activity sheet to each child or to parents so they can go home with families.

Key Passage Review Extra Ideas:

Invite kids to sit around tables. Give each kid a pencil. Show the key passage poster and lead them to read it aloud.

Give a piece of paper to one kid at each table. Instruct him to write down the first word of the key passage and pass the paper to the person on his right. That person will write down the second word, pass the paper to her right, and so on. Kids will pass the paper around the table, writing one word at a time until they finish the key passage. When kids finish, invite groups one at a time to say the key passage together.

Display the key passage poster. Lead the kids to read it aloud. Then challenge them to read it in various ways: whispering, shouting, quickly, slowly, and so on.

Form two groups of kids. Call on the first group to say the key passage together. Then call on the second group to say it.

Prompt the first group to say the passage a few phrases at a time, pausing for the second group to echo. When kids finish saying the key passage, lead the second group to begin and the first group to echo.

Instruct kids to sit or stand in a circle. Choose one kid to begin by saying the first word of the key passage. Guide kids to say the key passage, one word at a time, moving around the circle.

Allow kids to look at the key passage poster if they need help remembering the words. Continue around the circle a few times. Consider shouting, "Switch!" and letting kids move to another place in the circle before playing again. *Or toss the ball to different kids rather than go in order.*

Before the session, write out the key passage on a chalkboard or dry erase board in eight separate phrases. Display the phrases where kids can see them. Give each kid a marker and eight craft sticks. Instruct kids to copy from the board, writing each phrase on a separate stick. Then instruct kids to mix up their sticks and then quickly rearrange the phrases in the correct order. Kids may work individually or in pairs. Provide rubber bands for kids to bundle their sticks and keep them as a method of practicing the key passage during the week.

Prayer Extra Ideas:

Prayer Chain—In small groups, ask children/co-pilot to write prayer requests on a few paper strips. Connect paper strips into a chain and display our growing conversation to the Lord. Feel free to revisit older requests as well.

Painted Rocks—Have each child choose a painted rock to write on. Write a word of encouragement, a word about Jesus, a name, etc. The goal is to take it with them and place it somewhere near their typical living space—a neighbor’s house, a store, a playground, etc. Then pray over the place or the people who are there.

Pointing to a Map—Choose one or two kiddos to spin/close their eyes/find a certain color (you can be creative and have fun) and point to a country on the map. Place a pin in the place(s) and pray over it as a group. Even if you don’t know anything about the country, we can lift up the people, pray for Jesus’ light to shine there, the Gospel to be active there, and churches to grow, etc.

Looking out the Window—Grab a dry erase marker, have the kids gather at the windows, and look outside. Ask the children to look for 3 things they can see out of the window to pray over. Using the dry erase marker, write those things on the window (Pre-K & K may draw things) and then pray over those things. Feel free to leave them on the window, so whenever we look through, those things are brought to our mind to pray for again.

Head Shoulders Knees and Toes—Pray through the song.

- Head (mind, imagination, thoughts, creativity)
- Shoulders (physical strength, things we might be dealing with)
- Knees (dancing, playing, jumping, etc.)
- Toes (walking and following after Jesus, standing strong in our faith)
- Eyes, ears, mouth & nose (seeing goodness, listening to Him, speaking truthful words, our senses, etc.)

Preschool Carpet Bag Prayers— Choose an item(s) out of the carpet bag. Discuss the item and different people/things the item could represent (car—driving safely, mechanics, trips, first responders, etc) Encourage kids to “think outside the bag” and help them make connections. Pray over the people, places, and things that were discussed.
