Week 4

Day 1: Eyes Open to Divine Moments

Reading: Acts 3:1-10

Peter and John were heading to prayer—just another ordinary day, another familiar beggar at the gate. Yet in this routine moment, they recognized an opportunity for God to move. How often do we pass by divine appointments because they look too ordinary? The beggar asked for coins, but God wanted to give him complete restoration. Today, consider the "ordinary" people and moments in your life. That coworker, neighbor, or family member you see regularly might be positioned in your path by divine design. Ask God to open your eyes to see beyond the surface. The extraordinary doesn't always announce itself with fanfare; sometimes it whispers in the mundane. What ordinary moment might God want to use today?

Week 4

Day 2: The Power Already Within You

Reading: Romans 8:9-11

The same Spirit that raised Christ from the dead lives in you. Let that truth settle deep into your soul. You may not feel powerful. You may look at the early church's miracles and think, "That's not me." But God's power isn't dependent on your feelings or confidence—it's dependent on His presence. Peter didn't manufacture supernatural ability; he simply offered what he had been given. You have been filled with the Holy Spirit, equipped with everything necessary for the opportunities God places before you. Stop waiting for a more dramatic moment or a stronger version of yourself. The power is already present. Your obedience in small moments creates space for God's extraordinary work. What would change if you truly believed God's Spirit empowers you today?

Week 4

Day 3: Hearing the Cry for Change

Reading: Matthew 9:35-38

Everywhere Jesus looked, He saw people as harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. The world around us is crying out for change—not just financial change or circumstantial change, but soul-deep transformation. Like the beggar asking for coins when he needed healing, people settle for temporary fixes to eternal problems. They medicate pain with distractions, relationships, achievements, or substances, never realizing the true healing available in Christ. Are your ears tuned to hear these cries? Selective blindness affects us all; we're busy, overwhelmed, focused on our own struggles. But what if God positioned someone in your ordinary path specifically so you could offer them what you have—the hope of Jesus? Ask God to help you see beyond surface requests to the deeper needs only He can meet.

Day 4: When You're the One Needing Change

Reading: Psalm 40:1-3

Sometimes you're Peter offering healing; other times, you're the beggar crying for change. Perhaps today you find yourself stuck—in a difficult relationship, battling depression, facing financial strain, or simply feeling like your best days are behind you. You've been calling out for something to change, but the change you're requesting might not be the ultimate solution you need. God sees you in this ordinary moment and wants to do something extraordinary. He doesn't just want to adjust your circumstances; He wants to transform you from the inside out. The psalmist waited patiently for the Lord, and God lifted him from the pit and put a new song in his mouth. What feels impossible to you is the very place God wants to demonstrate His power. Will you let Him work?

Day 5: Offering What You Have

Reading: 2 Corinthians 4:7-12

"Silver or gold I do not have, but what I have I give you." Peter's words reveal a profound truth: your adequacy isn't the point. You carry treasure in jars of clay so that the power clearly belongs to God, not you. You don't need to have all the answers, fix every problem, or be spiritually superhuman. You simply need to offer what you have—your story, your presence, your willingness, and most importantly, the Jesus who transformed you. Stop disqualifying yourself because you feel inadequate. God specializes in using ordinary people in ordinary moments to accomplish extraordinary purposes. A seed looks insignificant compared to granite, yet over time it splits the rock. Your small acts of obedience, your willingness to see and respond, create space for divine transformation. Today, who needs what you have to offer?
