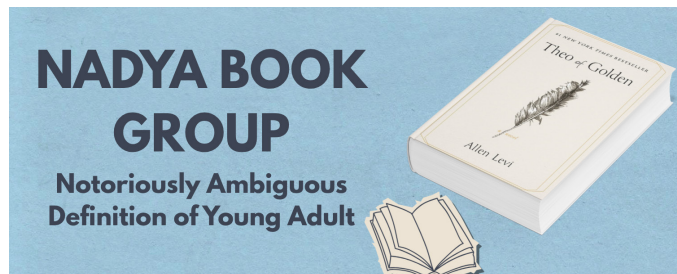

This year, Maxwell Street Presbyterian Church not only sponsored the Lexington PRIDE festival, but is also sponsoring the annual PRIDE 5K Run/Walk in Lexington on September 19th. Frontrunners, a local LGBTQ+ organization that supports fitness in the queer community, hosts the PRIDE run every year, and last year a couple of congregation members ran the 5K Run/Walk. The PRIDE Run is one of the only opportunities in Lexington for Non-Binary/Gender nonconforming people to run in their own gender category. There are plenty of opportunities to participate with the Social Justice Committee on September 19th. There is a \$35 fee to sign up for the race, and the proceeds support scholarships for the LGBTQ community in Lexington. Our New MSPC Youth Intern!

Appalachian Service Project

This summer, six youth and three adult leaders from the Maxwell Street Youth Group traveled to Whitesburg, KY to work with the Appalachian Service Project (ASP) to help a local mother repair her home after damage from the catastrophic floods in Summer 2022. The group helped replace the front stairs to her home, place tile in her bathroom, and they built a drainage ditch around the backside to route water away from her home. They bonded with youth groups from other states (WI, NJ, DE, and MD) over watermelon, swimming, and service to those they were there to help. The group worked hard to complete the jobs they were tasked with and grew together as a group. They also learned that they don't have to change who they are to help those around them.



SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

June 1 Session Meeting

The June 1 meeting of the Session opened at 7:00 p.m. with a reflection and prayer led by Elizabeth Varney, who shared Harry Romain's poem "Ad Coelum" and a prayer by Thomas Merton. With a quorum present, Matt noted that agenda items and committee reports, including personnel and trustees matters, were ready for discussion. Session began the meeting by visiting the Blevins House. The group noted recent improvements, including new outlets and breakers, and discussed a possible future partnership with Arbor Youth Services for use of the second and third floors. The Mission Committee is currently in conversation with Arbor Youth about this possibility.

Committee Updates and Announcements

Matt updated Session on current prayer concerns and upcoming memorial services for Jane Stevenson and Janet Marple. Sarah reported on completed performance reviews, the addition of Mason Hart as a Youth Group intern, and the possibility of establishing professional development funds for staff. Michelle suggested considering endowment funds rather than budget allocations for this purpose.

Session also received updates on the elevator modernization project, including the recent \$31,000 down payment.

Church Maintenance Budget Updates

Matt provided updates on several maintenance projects and budget concerns. Organ repairs and wall repairs are scheduled for July, with estimated wall repair costs of \$4,700, plus travel expenses. A more significant maintenance concern also emerged this past month: sanctuary HVAC equipment now requires approximately \$14,000 in repairs. Combined with previous overages, these expenses will exceed the church's \$15,000 maintenance budget. The Budget and Stewardship Committee will determine whether to use the Major Maintenance Fund, which currently holds approximately \$28,000, or to show the overage in the operating budget. A recommendation is expected in August. Session also received updates from various committees, including the Social Justice Committee's participation in Pride and the upcoming General Assembly in Milwaukee.

The meeting adjourned with prayer at approximately 8:00 p.m.

An Additional Note from Pastor Matt

I think it is important for you to know that, since our Session meeting took place at the beginning of June, it has been a difficult summer for our facilities here at Maxwell Street. In addition to the repairs mentioned above, additional repairs have been required in both the Sanctuary Building, related to HVAC, and the Blevins House, related to structural concerns. These additional expenses have totaled approximately \$20,000.

Fortunately, we currently have additional savings available to cover these repairs. We have also completed the first year of our three-year New Wineskins Capital Campaign, a portion of which will help fund future maintenance needs as they arise.

Our aging facilities can pose a significant challenge to our shared ministry. They require church leadership to consider carefully how the needs of our buildings align with the goal of furthering the church's mission. An adequate facility—one that is not extravagant, but also not neglected or insufficient—properly maintained through regular preventive care and thoughtful updates, helps ensure that our ministries remain vibrant and growing. Like a living organism, our facility must be nurtured so that our ministries can thrive.

Phase One of the Capital Campaign, the Elevator Update Project, is now underway. Before long, we will begin Phase Two: a "facelift" of some of the spaces we use most frequently. As mentioned above, Phase Three will help ensure that we can maintain our facilities well into the future.
