MSPC Summer Read

"This Here Flesh: Spirituality, Liberation, and the Stories That Make Us"
by Cole Arthur Riley.

"From the womb, we must repeat with regularity that to love ourselves is to survive. I believe that is what my father wanted for me and knew I would so desperately need: a tool for survival, the truth of my dignity named like a mercy new each morning."

As I was searching for a book to suggest as our summer read, I came across this quote from Cole Arthur Riley's *This Here Flesh* and knew right away this was the one. I had heard of Riley, especially her book *Black Liturgies*, but I was not familiar with this memoir/spiritual reflection. The phrase "to love ourselves is to survive" caught my attention.

John Calvin wrote that true wisdom has two inseparable parts: knowing God and knowing ourselves. If you know a little about Calvin, you might assume self-knowledge means recognizing what "an amazing grace it is that saved a wretch like me!" Fortunately, that's an oversimplification. Self-knowledge shouldn't lead to self-loathing, especially if we believe we are made in God's image.

When we can see God's image in ourselves, we can begin to see the whole of ourselves—our peculiarities, differences, even our "faults"—as beloved. There is strength in that knowledge. We are made for God's purposes, given gifts to use toward those purposes, and worthy of God's love. I'm hopeful Riley can help us claim this truth for ourselves.

We're going to read it together this summer, and this year, we're going to use our MSPC App as a place for shared conversation about the book. If you'd like to join the virtual reading group, email me at matt@maxpres.org, and I'll help you get connected. We'll read two chapters per week beginning Sunday, June 7th.

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

The May 4th Stated Session meeting opened at 7:00pm with prayer and reflection led by Dan Farrer, who shared Wendell Berry's poem "The Peace of Wild Things."

The first item of business was to welcome new member Nicole Currier to Maxwell Street. Elders introduced themselves by sharing their names, how long they had been part of Maxwell Street, and the ways they are involved in church life. Nicole shared her story of reconnecting with her faith and finding a welcoming, affirming community at Maxwell Street. Nicole expressed gratitude for the church's spirit of inclusion and shared her desire to be baptized and formally join the congregation.

Matt then led a time for learning by shifting to a broader conversation about inclusion and accessibility within the life of the church. Participants had been asked in advance to read articles related to neurodiversity in worship, digital ministry, and support for transgender members of congregations. Most participants chose to focus on the article addressing neurodiversity, and the group divided into smaller discussions to reflect on insights and practical applications.

Several participants highlighted the importance of online ministry as a form of inclusion. One Elder noted that the article challenged her assumptions about attendance numbers and reminded her that online worship can be a vital connection point for individuals living in communities where they may not feel safe or welcomed in local churches. Another reflected on how online worship has provided meaningful connection during periods when attending in person was difficult.

One Elder shared reflections from conversations with his son about the experiences of neurodivergent individuals in worship settings, particularly around sensory overload, expectations regarding physical contact, and participation in congregational activities. This prompted discussion of possible accommodations, including creating a smaller, quieter worship space, expanding the use of screens for bulletins, and improving accessibility through closed captioning and other technological supports. The conversation emphasized the church's ongoing commitment to creating a worship environment that is welcoming and accessible to a wider range of experiences and needs.

The meeting also included updates from church committees. The Mission Committee presented a preliminary proposal exploring a partnership with Arbor Youth Services to provide transitional housing for young adults ages 18–24 in the second-floor space of Blevins House. Discussion centered on models used in other cities, including shared housing arrangements supported by resident assistants and case management services.

Members discussed practical questions related to the proposal, including financial sustainability, safety concerns, potential remodeling needs, and how to appropriately separate first- and second-floor spaces. To guide future discernment, the group agreed to tour the second floor of Blevins House during the June meeting to better understand the space and evaluate potential next steps.

The meeting concluded at 8:00pm with additional personal updates, prayer requests, and shared concerns from members of the group.
