

4-19-2026 Discussion Questions

Getting to know you Questions:

1. Have you ever yelled at a group (team, kids, coworkers) in a moment of frustrated ambition, then immediately regretted it? What's your most embarrassing "captain meltdown" story?
2. What's the funniest way you've tried to "achieve" your identity—like posting 10 gym selfies in a row or bragging about your accomplishments—only to realize it didn't make you feel any more secure?

Into the Bible Questions:

1. Read John 1:12-13

12 But to all who did receive him, who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God, 13 who were born, not of blood nor of the will of the flesh nor of the will of man, but of God.

How does this passage redefine identity from something we "achieve" to something we "receive"? Why is this shift so hard for us to live out?

2. In what ways do we still live like "nervous strays" even after being adopted into God's family—worrying we'll lose our place with God if we fail?

3. The sermon mentions "virtual ambition" and identity through social media, gaming, or online escapes. How have you seen this play out in your life or others?

4. Pastor Ian said "Don't give your kids access to content that outweighs their character." How might this statement apply to kids and adults? What does "guarding" our kids and ourselves look like practically?

5. Read Matthew 6:33

33 But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you.

The passage calls us to seek Christ's kingdom first. How does chasing worldly things (success, likes, achievements) distract from true life in Him?

6. Read Ephesians 4:1

I therefore, a prisoner for the Lord, urge you to walk in a manner worthy of the calling to which you have been called,

It urges us to "walk worthy" of our calling as God's children. How does knowing our identity in Christ change how we approach ambition?

7. Read Ephesians 4:22-24

22 to put off your old self, which belongs to your former manner of life and is corrupt through deceitful desires, 23 and to be renewed in the spirit of your minds, 24 and to put on the new self, created after the likeness of God in true righteousness and holiness.

In the passage, Paul says to put off the old self, renew the mind, and put on the new. What does “renew your mind” on your true identity look like day-to-day?

8. How has trying to just “stop bad behaviors” without renewing your mind on your new identity and God’s character fallen short for you?

9. Why does failure hurt so deeply when our identity is tied to achievement? How does being a child of God change our response to setbacks?

10. Look at the “I Am Accepted/Secure/Significant” list from Neil T. Anderson. Which truth surprises you most, and why?

Application Questions:

1. In what relationship might your ambition be harming others? How can viewing them through your identity as a “minister of reconciliation” (2 Cor. 5:18-20) change that?
2. Identify one area where your ambition is currently self-focused or virtual. What small step can you take to redirect it toward Christ’s kingdom (Matthew 6:33)?
3. When content outweighs character, it causes chaos. What boundaries will you set on social media/virtual content to protect your (or your kids) identity formation in Christ?
4. Is there any content you are consuming that you should “put off” because it does not reflect God’s character?
5. Share one way you’ll run from sin and toward God to strengthen your new identity.
6. Choose one truth from the “I Am” list How will you rehearse it daily this week (e.g., say it aloud, write it, pray it)?
7. When ambition tempts you to overcommit or blame others, what reminders can you have of your identity in Christ to help stop the cycle?
8. What does “seeking Christ first” look like practically in your daily schedule—replacing virtual escape with real relationships or mission?
9. Based on this sermon, what’s one ambitious step you’ll take this week that flows from your received identity in Christ, not achievement? How can the group pray for you?
