Last year, I quoted C.T. Studd in my annual report: "Some want to live within the sound of church or chapel bell; I want to run a rescue shop within a yard of hell," the point being the need to venture out of the church, take a risk, and partner with God in the city. And now, during Parkwood's 100th anniversary year, we are doing just that in setting up a campus presence at Wyandotte and Parent! I have a sense of expectation these days of God's kingdom plans in Windsor. I see snapshots around our city of God at work, and I anticipate the genesis of a new work in the downtown as we partner with God on Wyandotte Street.

Looking back on 2022, God has used His church. Parkwood's food bank gave out over 2,257 servings of much needed grocery items -- double the amount compared to the previous year. Parkwood Ladies Outreach Mission donated 523 hand-knit items to Begley Public School, Hiatus House, and Sparky's Toy Drive, among many other organizations. Through our monthly We Love Windsor Challenges, you helped us donate over 56 bins of food and clothing; furniture and appliances to over 190 people in The Great Giveaway; 102 backpacks to Begley School; and over \$9,500 to various organizations. Our missions committee continues to liaison with the global workers we support and prayerfully plan towards reaching out to Windsor. We also rebooted our wonderful breakfast program at Begley Public School in September. Please consider volunteering in one of these areas.

Special thanks to all these missional leaders who lead and make a difference. Thanks also to my administrative assistant, Mary Land, and the support of my wife, Linda.

There are exciting days ahead for us as a church. I can only imagine this time next year what God can and will accomplish. My question I leave with you is, "What role does God have for you in bringing holistic reconciliation to others as you partner with Him?"

Let's just take a moment to praise the Lord for a full ministry year of no COVID restrictions and regulations. It's been a while since we've been there! Regardless of the challenges we I had to work with over the past three years, we're thankful for what the Lord has done and is doing within our Junior High Movement, Alpha ministries, and Parkwood Church!

We have, thankfully, seen the return of some youth/families we haven't seen as much over the past couple of years, and we continue to see 45-50 youth (from an active roster of 65+) coming out on a regular basis on Wednesdays. And 2022 marked the return of Sunday JHM discipleship class, which gives us an opportunity to connect with many youth we normally don't see on Wednesdays. This also marked the first year since 2019 that we were able to take our junior highs on the road to Momentum Convention where we brought a crew of 55 youth and leaders to Mississauga and saw three youth make first time decisions for Christ!

A total of 51 guests and 40 team members took part in Alpha last spring and fall, including our Alpha weekend in Chatham. Alpha continues to provide a safe, impacting environment for engaging in questions of life and faith and for building community.

I also want to thank our JHM and Alpha leadership teams who help provide the incredible vibe and environment that make our ministries so attractive and effective. And big thanks to the Holy Spirit for being the catalyst in it all!

Parkwood Kids exists to help kids and families find HOPE in the person of Jesus and find HOME in His family. 2022 was a year of rebuilding that very mission as we left COVID restrictions behind and faced a "new normal." Voting Bar/Quorum The voting bar was designated as the main floor of the auditorium, and it was established that a quorum was achieved with 140 members in attendance.

Pastor Gray expressed appreciation to the Board of Directors and to Bob Hill for managing the business of Parkwood Manor so well.

**Financial Report** 

The Chairman welcomed Chantelle Massaad of Grant Thornton Accounting Firm and called on her to present the 2021 Parkwood Non-Profit Housing Corporation Financial Report.

MOTION to accept the Parkwood Non-Profit Housing Corporation Financial Report as presented and printed on pages 32-44 of the Annual Report.

Parkwood Manor **Bylaws** 

Pastor Gray called on Secretary of the Parkwood Manor Board of Directors, Bob Hill, to summarize proposed changes to the Parkwood Manor Bylaws for approval, as follows:

We are looking to update and modernize our Bylaws in order to be compliant with the new Ontario Not-for-Profit Corporations Act (ONCA) and to better outline how the corporation functions today.

The role of President is eliminated because current legislation no longer requires it. It will be replaced by the CEO who will serve as the Chair of the Board of Directors.

The Lead Pastor of Parkwood is responsible for the hiring and firing of the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of Parkwood Non-Profit Housing. This is consistent with current practice.

The Board of Directors is selected by the Deacon Board of Parkwood and ratified by a vote at the Annual Business Meeting. This has always been our practice but was not clearly defined.

The members of Parkwood Non-Profit Housing remain the members of Parkwood Church.

The sections regarding Directors' terms of service and responsibilities have been expanded to provide greater clarity.

Everything else simply identifies how we currently operate and is worded to make future amendments simpler without having to rewrite our entire Bylaws.

MOTION to approve the revised Parkwood Manor Bylaws as presented and received.

Seconded. Comments/Questions. Carried.

#### Adjournment

### Independent Auditor's Report

To the Members of Parkwood Gospel Church

#### Qualified opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Parkwood Gospel Church, which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2022, and the statements of revenues and expenditures, changes in net assets, and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the Basis for qualified opinion section of our report, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Church as at December 31, 2022, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

#### Basis for qualified opinion

In common with many not-for-profit organizations, the Church derives revenue from fundraising activities the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Church. Therefore, we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to fundraising revenue, excess of revenues over expenses, and cash flows from operations for the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021, current assets as at December 31, 2022 and 2021, and net assets as at January 1 and December 31 for both the 2022 and 2021 years. Our audit opinion on the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2022 was modified accordingly because of the possible effects of this limitation in scope.

In addition, as described in Note 5 to the financial statements, tangible capital assets have a net book value of \$7,765,830. Management was unable to provide a complete and detailed listing for a portion of tangible capital assets to support a net book value of \$1,035,399, consisting of equipment and office furnishings, sound system, music equipment, and computer equipment. We were not able to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence about the cost or accumulated amortization of these tangible capital assets. Therefore, we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to amortization expense, excess of revenues over expenditures and cash flows from operations for the year ended December 31, 2022, tangible capital assets as at December 31, 2022, and net assets that are invested in capital assets as at January 1 and December 31, 2022.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements section of our report. We are independent of the Church in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified opinion.

## Responsibilities of management and those charged with governance for the financial statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Church's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Church or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Church's financial reporting process.

#### Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements. As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to
  fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit
  evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not
  detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error,

Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Church to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the
  disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and
  events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

#### 1. Charitable activities

Parkwood Gospel Church ("the church"), incorporated under the Ontario Business Corporations Act, operates under the constitution of the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada serving individuals and families in Windsor and Essex County. The church's mission is to help people find hope in the person of Jesus Christ. It is a registered charity defined in the income tax act (Canada) and, as such, is exempt from income tax.

#### 2. Change in accounting policy

#### Related party financial instruments

The church adopted the amendments to Financial Instruments, Section 3856. The change affects how the entity accounts for financial instruments originated or exchanged in a related party transaction.

#### **Initial Measurement**

Under the new requirements, a financial instrument is initially measured at cost, which is determined depending on whether the instrument has repayment terms. If the instrument does have repayment terms, cost is determined using the instrument's undiscounted cash flows, excluding interest and dividend payments, less any impairment losses. Otherwise, the cost of the instrument is determined using the consideration transferred or received by the church.

#### Subsequent Measurement

Subsequent measurement is based on how the financial instrument is initially measured. A related party financial instrument initially measured at cost is subsequently measured at cost less any reduction for impairment or at fair value.

#### **Transitional Provisions**

These changes have been adopted retrospectively with the following transitional provisions:

- The cost of an instrument that has repayment terms is determined using its undiscounted cash flows excluding interest and dividend payment less any impairment; and
- The cost of an instrument that does not have repayment terms is deemed to be its carrying amount, less any impairment provisions.

The adoption of the new requirements has no impact on the church's financial statements.

#### 3. Significant accounting policies

#### Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and include the following accounting policies:

#### Tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost. When conditions indicate that a tangible capital asset is impaired, the net carrying amount of the tangible capital asset shall be written down to the asset's fair value or replacement cost. Amortization is calculated using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets as follows:

60 years
15 years
5 years
10 years
40 years
15 years

#### Impairment of long-lived assets

The church tests long-lived assets for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that its carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognized when the carrying amount of the asset exceeds the sum of the undiscounted cash flows resulting from its use and eventual disposition. An impairment loss is measured as the amount by which the carrying amount of the long-lived asset exceeds its fair value.

#### Revenue recognition

The church follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Contributions are recognized as revenue in the year received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured unless there are restrictions on the contribution that have not been met. Restricted contributions are not recognized into revenue until the period the related expenses are incurred. Contributions include tithes and offerings, mission and department and alms contributions.

Contributions restricted for the purchase of tangible capital assets are deferred and amortized into income on the same basis of the amortization of the tangible capital asset purchased.

Rental revenue is recognized when service has been rendered and collection is reasonably assured. Interest income is recognized when earned and collection is reasonably assured.

Government assistance is recognized as revenue when the related expenses that the assistance is funding are incurred.

#### 3. Significant accounting policies (continued)

#### Cash and cash equivalents

The church's policy is to disclose bank balances under cash and bank indebtedness, including bank overdrafts with balances that fluctuate frequently from being positive to overdrawn.

#### Financial instruments

The church considers any contract creating a financial asset, liability or equity instrument as a financial instrument. The church accounts for the following as financial instruments:

- Cash
- Guaranteed investment certificates
- Accounts payable

A financial asset or liability is recognized when the church becomes party to contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial instruments in an arm's length transaction:

Financial assets or liabilities obtained in arm's length transactions are initially measured at their fair value, less financing fees and transactions costs that are directly attributable to its origination, acquisition, issuance or assumption.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are subsequently measured according to the following methods:

#### Use of accounting estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from these estimates. The current year's financial statements include management estimates for useful life of tangible capital assets.

#### Contributed goods and services

The church received food contributions from donors to distribute food to the needy. In addition, a substantial number of unpaid volunteers have made significant contributions of their time toward the operations of the church. The value of these contributed items and volunteer hours are not reflected in these financial statements.

#### 4. Guaranteed investment certificates

These certificates mature between May 2023, earning interest at a rate of 1.80% and 3.05% respectively (2021 - 0.30%-0.40%).

#### 6. Financial instruments risks

The following analysis provides a measure of the church's exposure of risks and concentrations of risk in its financial instruments as of its year-end:

#### (a) Currency risk

Currency risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in foreign exchange rates. The church is exposed to currency risk on its bank account denominated in United States dollars.

#### (b) Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk comprises three types of risk: currency risk, interest rate risk and other price risk.

The church is subject to a interest rate risk (specifically fair value risk) on its fixed rate guaranteed investment certificates, which is consistent with the prior year.

#### 9. Related party transactions

During the year, the church paid district tithes to the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada (related by virtue of significant influence) in the amount of \$324,034 (2021 - \$272,933). These transactions are in the normal course of operations and therefore measured at the exchanged amount, which is the amount of consideration established and agreed to by the related parties.

At December 31, 2022, the amount due to the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada was \$Nil (2021 - \$Nil). The amount due is non-interest bearing with no set terms for repayment.

#### Subsequent events

Subsequent to the year end, Parkwood Gospel Church has purchased a building located at 899 Wyandotte for \$525,000 cash with subsequent planned renovations that will amount to approximately \$250,000 cash. The purpose of this building is to hold Sunday morning services starting on the launch date, which has not been set, as well as to organize outreach events and activities during the week.

#### 11. Operating line of credit

From time to time the church operates within a bank line of credit, authorized up to \$250,000, bearing interest at prime rate plus 0.5%. The facility was not drawn on at year-end. The church also has access to a corporate Visa facility up to a limit of \$60,000. Both facilities secured by a general security agreement which includes all personal property owned by the organization now and all personal property acquired in the future, as well as a collateral mortgage for \$2,500,000 over part of Lots 99, 100 and 101, and Concession 2.

#### 12. Comparative figures

The financial statements have been reclassified, where applicable, to conform to the presentation used in the current year. The changes do not affect prior year earnings.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the organization's financial reporting process.

#### Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the organization to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including
  the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and
  events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

#### 1. Nature of operations

Parkwood Non-Profit Housing Corporation (Windsor) is a non-profit organization incorporated for the purpose of operating a 61 unit apartment building which opened during 1991. The corporation provides both subsidized shelter, as well as market rate apartments. The corporation is exempt from income tax in accordance with section 149(1)(I) of the Income Tax Act.

#### 2. Significant accounting policies

#### Basis of presentation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the significant accounting policies set out below to comply with the prescribed accounting requirements of The Corporation of the City of Windsor - Social Housing. The basis of accounting used in these financial statements materially differs from Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations because:

#### Capital assets

With the exception of the original building and furnishings acquired by the organization, subsequent capital assets purchased are charged to the statement of capital reserve fund as an expenditure in the year incurred rather than being capitalized on the statement of financial position and amortized over their estimated useful lives. A reserve for future capital replacement is appropriated annually from operations.

#### Amortization

Amortization is provided on buildings at a rate equal to the annual principal reduction of the mortgage. No amortization is charged on other capital assets. However, a capital reserve is maintained to provide for future asset replacement.

#### Capital reserve fund

The capital reserve fund is created by an annual charge against earnings as opposed to an appropriation of unrestricted funds. These funds are to be used to acquire capital items, replace worn-out capital equipment, chattels or such other items as The Corporation of the City of Windsor - Social Housing may specify from time to time.

#### Financial instruments

Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations for financial instruments would have caused the organization's investments to be measured at values which may have resulted in the inclusion of unrealised gains or losses in the fund balances. Instead, investments have been recorded at cost and realized gains/losses have been included in the income of the related fund.

Year ended December 31, 2022

#### 2. Significant accounting policies, continued

Other significant accounting policies followed by the organization include:

#### Revenue recognition

The organization follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions. Contributions, which comprises government subsidies, are recognized as revenue in the year received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured unless there are restrictions on the contributions that have not been met at year-end. These unspent restricted contributions are recorded as deferred contributions until the restrictions are met.

Other revenues are recognized as revenue in the year receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Housing charges are recognized monthly as earned.

#### **HST Rebates**

HST rebates are being claimed by the organization at the rate of 100% on the geared-to-income share of the federal portion (5%) of HST paid and at the rate of 82% on the geared-to-income share of the provincial portion (8%) of HST paid.

#### **Accounting estimates**

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities during the dates of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting periods. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### Cash and cash equivalents

The organization's policy is to disclose bank balances under cash and cash equivalents, including bank overdrafts with balances that fluctuate frequently from being positive to overdrawn.

#### Fund accounting

The organization uses the restricted fund basis of accounting for the following funds:

#### **General Fund**

The general fund reports the contributions from members and government subsidies as well as expenses related to the operations and administration of the organization.

#### Capital Reserve Fund

The reserve fund reports the contributions from the general fund and expenditures for major repair and replacement costs for the common elements and assets. Only major repairs and replacements for the common elements and assets are charged directly to this reserve fund. Minor repairs and replacements are charged to repairs and maintenance of the general fund. The organization segregates amounts accumulated for the purpose of financing future charges to the reserve fund in special accounts, for use only to finance such charges. Interest earned on these amounts is credited directly to the reserve fund.

#### 2. Significant accounting policies, continued

#### Financial instruments

The organization considers any contract creating a financial asset, liability or equity instrument as a financial instrument, except in certain limited circumstances. The organization accounts for the following as financial instruments:

- cash and cash equivalents
- accounts receivable
- harmonized sales tax receivable
- due to The Corporation of the City of Windsor
- restricted investments
- accounts payable
- long-term debt

A financial asset or liability is recognized when the organization becomes party to contractual provisions of the instrument.

The organization initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value, except for certain non-arm's length transactions. The organization subsequently measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost.

Financial assets measured at amortized cost include cash and cash equivalents, accounts receivable, harmonized sales tax receivable and restricted investments. Financial liabilities measured at amortized cost include accounts payable, due to The Corporation of the City of Windsor - Social Housing, accrued expenses and long-term debt.

Unless otherwise noted, it is management's opinion that the organization is not exposed to significant interest, currency or credit risks arising from these financial instruments. The fair value of these financial instruments approximate their carrying value, unless otherwise stated.

The organization removes financial liabilities, or a portion of, when the obligation is discharged, cancelled or expires.

Financial assets measured at cost are tested for impairment when there are indicators of impairment. Previously recognized impairment losses are reversed to the extent of the improvement provided the asset is not carried at an amount, at the date of the reversal, greater than the amount that would have been the carrying amount had no impairment loss been recognized previously. The amounts of any write-downs or reversals are recognized in net income.

#### 3. Restricted investments

The organization holds investments in two Canadian Bond Funds at cost. The fair value of investments may be determined by reference to published price quotations in an active market. As at December 31, 2022, the market value is \$171,664.

#### 4. Net surplus repayable

In accordance with the organization's contract with The Corporation of the City of Windsor - Social Housing, 50% of any surplus in the year is repayable to The Corporation of the City of Windsor - Social Housing if the balance in the organization's unrestricted fund exceeds \$18,300.

#### 5. Long-term debt

#### 6. Financial instruments

The organization is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments. The following analysis provides a measure of the organizations's risk exposure and concentrations at December 31, 2022:

#### Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that an organization will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The organization is exposed to this risk mainly in respect of its accounts payable, accrued liabilities and mortgage payable.

#### Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk comprises three types of risk: currency risk, interest rate risk and other price risk. The organization is mainly exposed to other price risk.

#### (I) Other price risk

Other price risk relates to the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices of securities held. The organization is exposed to price risk through its long-term investments.
