The sermon distinguishes between Old Testament favor and New Testament grace, highlighting how grace in the New Testament involves God bestowing His righteousness upon undeserving people. Through various dimensions—saving, sanctifying, justifying, quickening, abounding, and sustaining—God's grace transforms lives, covers sin, and provides strength in weakness. T

he pastor emphasizes that believers are called to walk in the light of God's grace, which has multiple dimensions like a spectrum of light, and that this grace is sufficient for every trial, circumstance, and need.

- Walking in grace means walking in the multidimensional light of God's favor
- The worst sin cannot put you outside the reach of God's grace, and the best day cannot put you beyond the need for God's grace
