Thanks to the beautiful generosity of our extended community, we had an abundance of sleeping bags available every time someone asked. We didn't have to turn anyone away empty handed. Even the folks who asked several times a week for an extra blanket or sleeping bag were able to take with them something clean, warm, and dry.



On one particularly miserable and cold evening, I was sitting with Aiden, a middle aged gentleman used to sleeping rough and who, even on the coldest nights of the year, still opted for the covered cement slab outside an empty building as his shelter rather than the close quarters of emergency shelters.

He surprised me, though, when he asked if we happened to have any quilts in donations. Sure enough, we had one! Aiden and I looked it over together, I commented on how beautiful it was, the quality of it, the tenderness put into the stitches and thoughtfulness of the patches, colours, and thread used to create this masterpiece.

Suddenly, Aiden's eyes welled up with tears. "Someone made this for someone they loved and cared about. To keep them warm and safe at night..." His voice cracked and trailed off as he clutched the edges of the quilt.



"And it's just for you tonight, Aiden." I responded, "All that love to wrap you up in!"

There is a song by the Porter's Gate called 'Little Things with Great Love'. We don't always get to see the impact of each act of kindness and love. But it is an incredible honour to experience moments like this in our community.

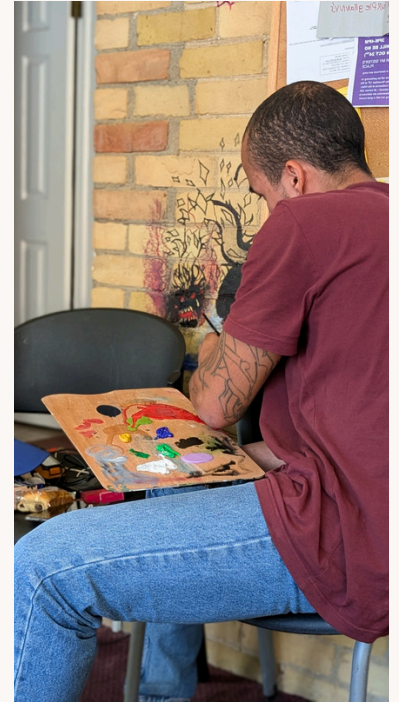

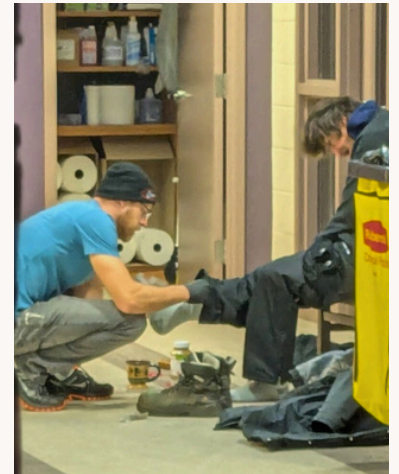
Supporting our Sector

Recently London's City Council was poised to reduce funding to already underfunded agencies that work to support people who are deprived of housing and shelter in London. Sanctuary London played a key role, alongside of other community partners to prevent this. Two Sanctuary staff members, working with 76 other frontline workers from across the sector, composed a letter that they all collectively signed and released to the local media in order to warn the public of the dangers Londoners were facing. The letter notes: "Most of us [front-line workers] are only one or two paycheques away from being homeless ourselves. We do this work because we know that every member of our community is a person deserving of love and care. If these changes take place, people we know and love will die premature and preventable deaths." To illustrate this, in a subsequent interview, one Sanctuary worker stated: "Earlier in the winter, outreach workers found a person stuck in their tent because their feet were frozen to the ground. They were able to save that person's life. But if there are no outreach workers going out to do that, that person's dying in their tent."



Sanctuary works hard to provide a place where people can experience a sense of home. This is at the heart of what we do. But this work is carried forward in the context of local politics, and a whole community of caregivers who struggle against mighty odds to support those who are experiencing homelessness, especially those forced to live in outdoor encampments. Thus, in a situation of dire need, Sanctuary helped provide critical direction to guide city policy and ensure a better life for all members of our community. In this instance, Sanctuary itself received no direct benefit from the hard-won financial changes, yet we know that all of us stand or fall together. As a donor and Board Chair, I'm truly proud that our Sanctuary staff care enough to selflessly engage our city, in partnership with others, to secure every bit of life possible for all members of our community.
