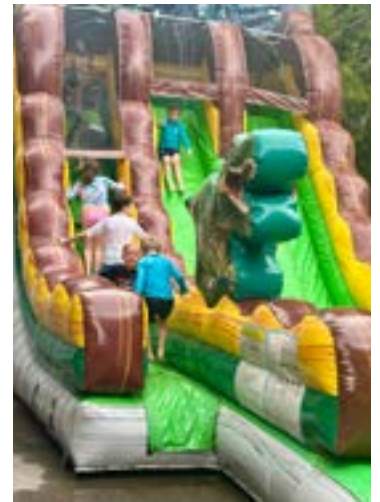
Blessings, Food, Fun, and Fellowship

Lay Academy Announces Fall Classes

Lay Academy at Trinity is a long-standing tradition of educational programming for adults held on Wednesday afternoons and evenings. We are blessed with a wealth of resources in our community and church, which provide opportunities to explore many different topics with expert presenters. The classes are scheduled around Wednesday night dinners and a time of fellowship.



This fall's offerings include two six-week classes, one on government and the other a Creation Care Bible study, plus one stand-alone session on the Constitutional amendments that will be on November's ballot. These hour-long classes begin at 6:15 p.m. and meet in room 305.

August 26-September 30 | Civics 101: From Capitol Hill to City Hall

If it's been a while since you studied how governments in the US are supposed to work, Trinity's Lay Academy is offering an opportunity to refresh your knowledge about the structure and operations of federal, state, and local government in "Civics 101: From Capitol Hill to City Hall" this fall. Speakers from the FSU Institute of Governance and Civics, the Florida League of Cities, and others will walk us through the different levels of government and discuss some of the controversial issues that are currently being debated and put into practice.

October 7 | Proposed Constitutional Amendments

Trish Neely, past president of the League of Women Voters, will lead us in understanding the purposes and implications of the Constitutional amendments that will be voted on in November. The League of Women Voters is a non-partisan organization. It does not endorse candidates, but it does study issues and sometimes takes positions on those issues.

October 14-November 18 | God's Renewed Creation: Call to Hope and Action

Join Rev. Bob Gibbs in exploring "God's Renewed Creation: A Call to Hope and Action." This Creation Care Bible study was designed by a task force of the Council of Bishops led by former Florida Bishop Timothy Whitaker and connects environmental stewardship with spiritual renewal.

Additional Opportunities on Wednesdays

In addition to these classes, **Richard Andrews** welcomes new members at **4:15 p.m. in the library** each week as he continues "**The Epic of Eden.**" This Bible study series by Dr. Sandra Richter explores the history, timeline, and geography of the Old Testament to reveal God's continual story of grace and redemption.

Parenting Village meets each week at **6:15 p.m. in the Conference Room** and welcomes new participants. Parenting Village is an opportunity for those in the process of raising children to support each other on their parenting journey. NETKids After Dark is available to children whose parents attend Parenting Village.

Wednesday Night Dinners are available at **5:30 p.m.** during Lay Academy season. We encourage you to participate in this time of fellowship as you enjoy a delicious meal prepared by Culinary Director Betsy Gingery. Payment for dinners can be made online or at the door, but we kindly ask that you **make reservations in advance**, either by using the app or website or by calling the church office.

Shaped to Lead: A Conversation with Pastor Matthew Williams About the Reynolds Program in Church Leadership

The Royce and Jane Reynolds Program in Church Leadership, housed within the United Methodist Foundation of Western North Carolina, is one of the most meaningful leadership development opportunities available to United Methodist pastors. A joint venture between the Foundation and the Center for Creative Leadership in Greensboro, the program brings theological grounding and serious leadership science into a year-long intensive experience for twenty-four clergy per cohort, drawn from six annual conferences across the Southeast and nominated by their Bishop. It exists because of the generosity of Royce and Jane Reynolds, and it has been shaped for many years by the gifted leadership of program director Janice Virtue. Recently, SPRC Chair Pamela Epting and the Staff Parish Relations Committee sat down with Pastor Matthew Williams to hear about his experience as a program graduate. Following the conversation, the committee congratulated Dr. Williams on completing the program and honored him with a meaningful gift in recognition of this significant accomplishment.

Pamela Epting: Give us an overview of this program.

Dr. Matthew Williams: The Reynolds Program is a year-long leadership development experience for clergy with at least five years of full-time ministry. We gather four times over the course of the year, twice at the Center for Creative Leadership in Greensboro and twice at the Rizzo Conference Center in Chapel Hill. Before the first gathering, you complete several personal and professional assessments, including a 360° assessment, the Myers-Briggs, and the FIRO-B. So, by the time you walk in the door, you already have a lot of data about yourself sitting in front of you. Each gathering builds on the last, moving from self-knowledge into vision discernment, then into leading change, and finally into where you go from here. You also have a personal executive coach throughout the year. It is rigorous, it is personal, and it is unlike anything else I have experienced in ministry.

Pamela Epting: Did you learn anything about yourself that surprised you?

Dr. Matthew Williams: Honestly, yes. The biggest surprise was finding out that I am an introvert. I know that may be hard to believe for people who see me up front every Sunday, but the assessments were pretty clear about it. That reframed a lot of things for me, including why certain seasons of ministry are more draining than others, and why I need more quiet and solitude than I sometimes allow myself. The 360° feedback also gave me a clearer picture of how my leadership actually lands with the people around me, not just how I intend it. That gap between intention and impact is where a lot of the real work happened.

More than anything, the program helped me learn to honor myself and the way I am wired. Trinity is a remarkable congregation, and we are blessed to have so many retired and accomplished clergy in our pews, men and women who have given their lives to the church at the highest levels. That can be a lot to sit with. It is easy to look around and start measuring yourself against extraordinary people. But through this program I have genuinely learned that I do not have to do that. I lead the way I lead, I am wired the way I am wired, and that is enough. More than enough. That may sound simple, but for me it was one of the most freeing things to come out of the entire year.

Pamela Epting: How has your leadership style evolved?

Dr. Matthew Williams: I lead with more patience and more curiosity now. I am quicker to ask questions and slower to assume I already know what someone needs or where a situation is headed. The program did a lot of work around conflict, not managing it or avoiding it, but understanding what is underneath it and how different personalities move through it differently. That has changed how I show up in hard conversations with staff and lay leaders.

Pamela Epting: Is there anything you will do differently as a result of the program?

Dr. Matthew Williams: Several things. I am more intentional about how I communicate with people whose personalities and processing styles are different from my own. I am more committed to vision development as an ongoing, collaborative process rather than something a pastor produces alone and delivers to a congregation. The fundraising and development content was also immediately applicable here at Trinity, and I expect that work to continue to bear fruit.

Pamela Epting: What can we do to continue to support your leadership journey?

Dr. Matthew Williams: The most important thing is exactly what you are already doing: asking the question. Having a congregation and an SPRC that takes leadership development seriously is itself a gift. Going forward, I would love for us to continue investing in opportunities for our staff and lay leaders to grow alongside me. The Reynolds Program made clear that a pastor's leadership only goes as far as the team around them. When we grow together, Trinity grows.

As Pastor Williams reflected on his experience, it was clear that the Reynolds Program has strengthened both his personal leadership and the future of Trinity United Methodist Church. His renewed clarity, deeper self-awareness, and refined practices are already enriching our shared ministry and laying a foundation for thoughtful, compassionate leadership in the years ahead. The SPRC celebrates this milestone with gratitude and pride and remains committed to supporting a culture where strong, faithful leadership can flourish.

Update on Trinity Facilities Renovation

When was the last time you actually viewed Trinity's large, sprawling facilities? Were you attending Sunday School, a worship service, a special dinner, Lay Academy, BFC exercise class, or a Bible study class? Did you take the opportunity to really consider the space you were in? Did it meet your needs? Was it welcoming, accessible and comfortable?

If your answer to any of those questions was "No", we invite you to consider the many challenges ahead. When our facilities were renovated 43 years ago, Trinity's ministry had vastly different activities and requirements. In order for our beloved Trinity to grow and thrive, it must be ready and able to meet current needs AND be prepared for the future.

What needs are we facing today?

Some of our greatest priorities are as follows:

- The **Welcome Center** must successfully balance hospitality, engagement, technology, and security.
- The **Youth Space** (The Underground) must be comfortable and inviting, with adequate access to help our Youth Ministry thrive. It must be able to host diverse activities, providing our youth with a sense of freedom, fun, and belonging. This includes improved audio equipment, improved kitchen space, and flexible, durable spaces and furnishings.
- The **Children's Ministry** area needs a designated entryway, welcoming our youngest participants into a secure check-in space that is light and bright with a spacious gathering area and flexible classrooms, as well as an infant and toddler space specifically designed to meet the developmental needs of these youngest church-goers.
- **Adult Education** could be greatly improved with universal technology for classrooms, a larger lecture area, and the relocation of the library. The library is frequently unavailable on Sundays, as it is in use as a classroom or meeting space. An additional elevator would be another great asset for the Education Building.
- **Moor Hall** is a wonderful space, overused and difficult to maintain because of the constant need to rearrange furnishings for many diverse activities — from worship and receptions to exercise classes and dining events.
- **Office Space** needs to accommodate a larger staff, appropriate technology, work spaces, an abundance of storage needs, and all the functions of a thriving ministry.

Trinity is blessed to have a large campus with many square feet of usable space. Our challenge is to do a better job of using that space. Future improvements must carefully consider ADA requirements, replacement of aging infrastructure, and all the ways technology is important for bringing the message of Christian love to our membership and the community at large. We can do better!

How You Can Share in the Process

To begin the process, the Facilities Renovation Committee invites you to participate in a survey that will be available to the congregation in August. Additionally, we invite you to join us on tours of the Trinity facility. Times of tours will be posted and designed to meet your busy schedules. Need a different time? Let us know. We will accommodate your needs.

What if we do nothing and continue to use current facilities "As Is"? In the last five years we have experienced major expenses because of our aging facility — burst pipes, HVAC problems, roof problems, programmatic challenges, and the diminishing effect of programs no longer effectively delivered for all ages of our membership. Should we allow this to continue? Come and learn with us. I think you will agree, we should begin today to address the needs of the Trinity facility and prepare for a better future!

Tallahassee Local Missions: From Downtown to Frenchtown

Just a few blocks north of Trinity, down the street from the Governor's Mansion, sits a small building on the edge of Frenchtown, known as Grace Mission. Many who race down Bronough Street toward Tennessee Street may not even notice the building and the people gathered there. But, to those who have crossed the threshold, Grace is a beacon of hope, welcoming them as they are — feeding both their physical and spiritual needs.



Grace Mission first opened its doors in 1997 and permanently relocated in 2001 to its current location on Brevard Street. Grace is a mission church of the Episcopal Diocese of Florida — one that reflects the radical love of God, a place where the wider body of Christ unites with others to serve and make a powerful difference in our community for those experiencing poverty and homelessness. These are many of the same individuals that Trinity serves with snack packs during the week and coffee on Sunday mornings.

Along with weekly church services, Grace provides meals five days a week, clothes two days a week, showers two days a week, and laundry services three days a week. Grace has recently been blessed with the addition of a social worker on staff who helps individuals with their specific needs.

If you are one of the many members of Trinity who have expressed interest in assisting Grace, please know there are ongoing opportunities for those who are led to support the ministries of Grace, either through prayers, donations, financial support, or volunteer time.

Matt, I understand you're not originally from Tallahassee. Would you mind sharing a bit about your background?

I moved around a fair bit growing up. My family's homebase is Monroe, Louisiana, but we moved to Branson, Missouri, when I was a small child, where I attended elementary school and where my Dad still lives. I attended middle and high schools on the Mississippi Gulf Coast, then Pearl River Community College, where I completed my Associate of Arts degree. I then attended Mississippi State University, where I completed my Bachelor of Science in Physics and Astronomy and performed undergraduate research in radiation detection for environmental cleanup applications. Following my graduation, I was employed by Mississippi State as a data analyst/software engineer within a nuclear quality assurance program. I came to Tallahassee to pursue a Ph.D. at FSU with the end goal of a career in science education.

You're on staff now, but you first found Trinity as your place of worship. What can you tell us about your faith background and about what led you to Trinity UMC?

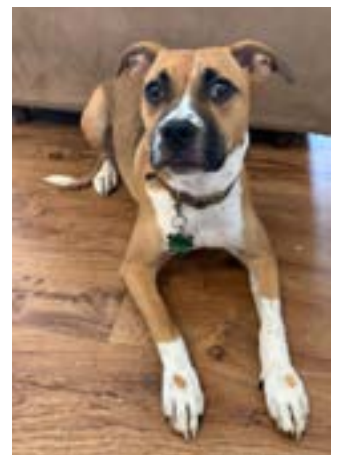
I grew up in the Southern Baptist tradition with Pentecostal influences. My faith drove me to pursue a career in physics, as the methodology of science allows me to spend every day in a state of worship through study of the creation. This context motivated me to rigorously evaluate the fundamentalist faith of my youth, and I realized how I had been taught to weaponize scripture against my neighbor, justified by a doctrine of inerrancy when convenient. The final straw motivating my departure came as I was teaching within a college ministry, where I refused to use the Sodom and Gomorrah story to demonize my LGBTQ+ neighbor. When I moved to Tallahassee, I was looking for a tradition where Jesus' radical inclusion was practiced, and I found Trinity and the weekly vigil for immigration justice.

It's great that you were able to find a spiritual home at Trinity that aligned with your conscience and belief system. I know you will remain active in worship and ministry, but what do you see as your new role as a staff member?

I am responsible for maintaining Trinity's facility and supporting the ministries it houses. This summer, I am a full-time employee, but I intend to drop to part time when I return to school this fall.

While you're spending all this time at Trinity, are there any pets missing you at home?

I have a Boxer/Pitt Bull, Madame Marie Curie. I bring her to San Luis Dog Park almost daily.

Before you get back to work, let's wrap up with a lightning round of favorites:

- **Favorite Food:** Jambalaya

- **A Superpower you'd like to have:** Ability to manipulate photons.
