Ice Breaker

What is one thing that has genuinely left you in awe or amazement recently, whether it was something in nature, a piece of news, or a personal experience?

Key Verses

- Micah 2:12-13
- Micah 4:1-3
- Micah 5:2
- Romans 11:25-26
- Revelation 19:11-15

Questions

1. The pastor described a pattern in biblical prophecy as first the worst, then the best. How does understanding this pattern change the way you read the Old Testament prophets and think about the future?

2. Many Christians have been taught that Jesus came only to establish a spiritual kingdom. After hearing this sermon, how do you think about the nature of Christ's coming kingdom, and why does it matter whether it is spiritual, earthly, or both?

3. The sermon highlighted that figures like John the Baptist, Mary, and the disciples all expected Jesus to win a military victory at His first coming. What does it tell us about what is to come?

4. Micah 2:12 speaks of God gathering a remnant of Israel. What does the concept of a faithful remnant teach us about God's character, and how does it encourage you personally when you feel like you are in the minority for believing in Jesus?

5. The pastor said that God supernaturally protects His people, and that no evil can touch us unless God allows it for our growth and future reward. How does this truth affect the way you respond to fear, suffering, or uncertainty in your own life right now?

6. Romans 11:25-26 warns believers not to be wise in their own estimation about God's plan for Israel. In what ways might Christians today be tempted to think too highly of themselves or to misunderstand God's broader redemptive plan?

7. The sermon described Jesus as both the Lamb of God and the Lion of Judah. How do you personally hold both images of Jesus together in your daily faith, and which one do you tend to emphasize more?

8. The pastor challenged the group by asking, "Do you ever tremble before Jesus?" What would it look like practically for you to approach Jesus with greater awe and reverence in your prayer life, your worship, and your everyday decisions?

Life Application

This week, set aside at least 15 minutes on one day to sit quietly before God in prayer, specifically focusing on who Jesus is as King and coming Conqueror. Read Revelation 19:11-16 slowly and let the image of Christ as the all-powerful, righteous King sink in. Then ask yourself honestly: Do I approach Jesus with the awe and reverence He deserves? Write down one specific way you can adjust your attitude toward Him in prayer, in worship, or in how you talk about Him with others. Let the reality that the Breaker is coming reshape how you face any fear, discouragement, or evil you encounter this week.

Key Takeaways

Biblical prophecy follows a clear pattern: a period of great tribulation and suffering for Israel must come before the glorious establishment of Christ's literal, physical kingdom on earth.

God has not abandoned the nation of Israel. He will supernaturally protect a believing remnant during the final three and a half years of the tribulation, gathering them in a place called Bozrah, just as He protected Israel during the Exodus.

Jesus Christ is the Breaker, the conquering King who will return at His second coming to win a real military victory over all evil, rescue His people, and rule the nations from Jerusalem.

Christians today are called to live with genuine awe and reverence for Jesus, trembling before Him as King, rather than treating Him only as a gentle, comforting figure while ignoring His power and coming judgment.

Understanding Bible prophecy is essential for the church because it reminds us that the evil and corruption we see in the world today will not last forever. The Rapture and the second coming of Christ could happen at any time, and this truth should shape how we live right now.

Ending Prayer

Lord Jesus, we thank You for the time we have shared together today in Your Word. We confess that we do not always approach You with the awe and reverence You deserve. You are the Lamb who was slain for our sins, and You are the Lion of Judah who is coming again to break every evil and make all things right. Remind us this week that

You are the Breaker, that no enemy, no fear, and no darkness has any power over those who belong to You. Give us hearts that tremble before You in worship, that trust You in suffering, and that live with the urgent hope of Your return. May we go from this place more in love with You, more surrendered to You, and more eager to make You known to those around us. Come quickly, Lord Jesus. In Your mighty name we pray, amen.
