2. How have you experienced God lowering you into a valley of humility? In those moments, what does it look like to respond to God’s invitation to “come let us walk in the light” (Isaiah 2:5)
3. In what ways have you wrestled with feeling both the weight of God’s judgement for sin as well as the depths of his love? How does Jesus’ parable in Matthew 21:33-39 help make sense of this tension?
