Health Matters

***Thou art the Way, the Truth, the Life:
Grant us the Way to know,
That Truth to keep, that Life to win,
Whose joys eternal flow.*** George Doane

The poem above is a reflection on **JN 14:6**. Jesus is speaking to Thomas after Thomas expressed some uncertainty as to where Jesus was going, upon His death. Here’s the reply: **“Jesus answered, “I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me.”**

As I recently re-read a lot of Lutheran history in anticipation of the upcoming celebration of the REFORMATION at the end of October, I came across the above poem. I also recently noted a Psalm that also greatly interested me, in view of our church’s history. I’m not sure, in my limited time of research, and knowing Luther’s usual humility, whether Luther ever claimed the Psalm as a favorite. But, for me, it certainly speaks in part to the life and brilliance of this man.

It speaks to Martin Luther’s value to God’s pure message being *proclaimed* as Truth; True Life as we are to live it, prescribed by our Maker and Sustainer. And, the Joy we can know this side of Heaven. As well as more profoundly, in Heaven, itself.

We’ve spoken a fair bit about God’s Word recently. Not only the importance of us being regularly/daily in it. But, in bringing more awareness to how fortunate we are to have it to help us in our using it to discern many of our life’s **most vital choices**. God’s Word really matters. As does *how* we use it. Then the *choice* and *proper application* of the bible versions available to us.

Without consulting further references, that may have done my homework for me already, I was interested in whether a humble Martin Luther could have/should have been Godly if he claimed **PS 119:99** as a verse *for* himself. If so, hopefully he’d do so humbly and with a proper outlook.

So, I’ll share part of my **discerning research** with you, to *maybe* help stimulate you to get more into God’s Word yourself. **PS 119:99** in the **ESV**, a quite conservative version often used by many of the most

conservative Lutheran church bodies these days, reports it saying *this*: **“I have more understanding than all my teachers, for your testimonies are my meditation.”**



Our older traditional **NIV** version of the last 20-some years which we still use at St. Paul’s, has the same verse in *these* words: **“I have more insight than all my teachers, for I meditate on your statutes.”** Now I would have a harder time ascribing the **NIV version’s** word choice of reflecting well on Martin Luther. Despite his readily admitting his sinful nature more strongly in front of the leaders of the church of his day. More forthright than most all.

The **NASB** has the Psalm in these words: **“I have more insight than all my teachers, For Your testimonies are my meditation.”** Out of the three versions compared, I like the **NASB** translation for this verse. Why? Because the word “insight” for me implies something has some practical life application than mere *understanding*. And the word “*testimonies*” means there are life-lived examples that one can speak to, which illustrate the point they are trying to make. So these simple comparisons alone, easily done on <https://www.biblegateway.com/>, are only a small part of how you can get to a more helpful original bible understanding for you. One which makes a verse come alive.

Yes, you can easily go *even* much deeper and be *still more* objective in how you settle on a verse’s or passage’s original meaning. But, my already knowing where each of these three bible versions fall, on the scale of being *functional* versus *literal* bible translations, help me make a choice of a favored translation which I’m comfortable with. In this verse alone, I might add.

My choice may well change in studying other bible verses and/or passages. Your choice may well, too. My prayer this month for each of you is that you are diligent in your study of God’s Word and reap the blessings that will flow from all your efforts.

What We Can Offer

By the time you all read this, I will have been here a full year. It has flown by and, I hope, it has been as blessed for you all as it has been for me. Something I am becoming more and more convinced of the longer I have spent here not just at St. Paul's, but in ministry as a whole, is that I have nothing of substance to offer you. I'm not the most entertaining, the most educated, the craftiest, pick your adjective of choice and there is someone better.


Now, I'm not saying any of this as some self-deprecatory put down, or to fish for compliments. God only knows how massive my ego already is. I say this to set the stage for a transition. I have nothing to offer any of you, or your students, except one thing: Jesus. Someone said to me once that the way I describe the Gospel is like rehab. We can change, there is hope, life means something, there's more to life than this, there's a relationship where all we need to do is show up. Now, I think they said that as a way to show me that there's an issue. No one wants rehab.

But, I actually like that assessment. I don't have anything to offer other than that rehab. There's something deathly wrong with all of us, a sickness, a corruption, a deep seeded warping of who we are. Sin. And the only solution for that is Jesus. So, in a sense, they're right. The way I portray the Gospel is rehab. And I'm ok with that. Because I can't offer anything of substance. I can't motivate change. Neither can you. But Jesus can. Not only motivate it, but accomplish it. And, after all, what is rehabilitation if not change?

I think so often we fall into this trap of assuming we have to "sell" Jesus. I confess I often have, I still do. But, when I get honest, and maybe when you do too, we're left with the reality that you and I, we don't really have anything to offer. You and I, we can't compete with the world. It's flashier, more entertaining, more distracting. To give you an example, in the past decade the average attention span has shrunk by over 55%. We can't compete with that. So, let's stop trying to compete with it. Let's change the field instead. We can't compete with anything the world has to offer, but we know someone who can!

That's what I'm becoming more convinced of. To be perfectly vulnerable toward you all, I often worry about the size of the youth group. I'm keenly aware of it. I have nothing, nothing to offer. There're a billion places more fun, more entertaining than being around me. But what I can offer you is the Son of God. I can offer to you the one who says "eat of my flesh and drink of my blood that you may have life." I can offer you the one who says "Come to me all who are weary and heavy laden, and I'll give you rest." I can offer the one who says "In my presence is joy forevermore." I can offer the one who wastes nothing.

That is my commitment to you all. And I'd like to ask that you make that your commitment to those around you. Give people Jesus. Be authentic, be honest, be humble, and give people Jesus. We can't compete with the world, but He can, and He has overcome it. So, take heart, pray, give the people Jesus, and trust Him for the rest. I wanna challenge you to do the same. And I want you to challenge me to do that as well.

Living in the present

During Martin Luther's great struggle to reform the church in the 16th century, the Holy Roman Emperor sought to silence him. So he spent some lonely months in Wartburg Castle under protective custody. There, as he fought despair, Luther scribbled the words "I am baptized" on his desktop as a reminder that he was living according to an ongoing call from God. He did not write, "I was baptized" but used the present-tense verb. For he rightly understood that in his baptism, God had adopted him as his son, and no human could take that from him.

Later, in his Large Catechism, Luther wrote: "To be baptized in God's name is to be baptized not by human beings but by God himself. Although it is performed by human hands, it is nevertheless truly God's own act."

**Baby University (a Mosaic ministry)**



**What you do:**


1. Gather leaves of different shapes and sizes. On a table, arrange them flat without overlaps. Set the paper over them.
