God Can Use Your Brokeness

nother ones trash is another ones treasure. How many times have you heard someone say that? Unfortunately, when it comes to people, the world throws them away when they see someone is broken. They don't have time to invest in their lives. I'm thankful that there is someone I know well that will never throw you away. That is Jesus. He is One who loves the outcast and truly cares for the brokenhearted. God is a god of restoration and we ought to be like that too. We should be a church that restores individuals, not throw them away. I'd like to explore the idea that God can use your brokenness in a big way. Do you know that God is near the broken?

Psalm 34:18 tells us "The LORD is nigh unto them that are of a broken heart; and saveth such as be of a contrite (hurt or remorseful) spirit." And Psalm 147:3 lets us know that "He healeth the broken in heart, and bindeth up their wounds."

Consider the life of Paul to think how God loves the broken and how God can use the broken. The story in which we will reference is found in Acts 27.

The apostle Paul was on route to Rome. He was on his way to there to face the music – he was prosecuted for preaching this new Gospel; this Gospel created instability to the Roman Empire. He was going to face the music with Caesar. He had a date with destiny so he thought. In vs. 14 we see: "a wind came and the ship could not head into the wind." They were afraid they would run aground so they lowered the anchor and allowed the anchor to be driven by the storm. (vs. 17) Because of this the ship broke in pieces and they barely made it to Malta.

Perception is not reality

Rome was the United Nations of the first century. All roads led to Rome. It would not be coincidental that Paul was heading there. Paul was not ashamed of the gospel; he was in route to Rome because God wanted him to have the platform to amplify the narrative of a new faith. He wasn't going in the best of circumstances or traveling on the nicest boat. He was going as a prisoner on a prison ship. God many times uses circumstances that seem superficially impossible to show off His glory.

Paul was on his way to Rome to face potential execution – but to God Paul was on his way to preach the gospel of Christ. Perception is not reality. To us, he was going to face trial but God told Paul that He was going to get him to Rome and this gospel will be preached there. "And the night following the Lord stood by him, and said, Be of good cheer, Paul: for as thou hast testified of me in Jerusalem, so must thou bear witness also at Rome." Acts 23:11 God had preordained his trip to Rome. God has preordained something for us. Right now it may look like the devil is winning and hell is about to celebrate, but it is not what it seems because God is going to turn it around in our favor!

We need to determine we are going our way to Rome. What you are going through will catapult you to what God is taking you to. He will turn it around. "For the Lord of hosts hath purposed, and



who shall disannul it? and his hand is stretched out, and who shall turn it back?" Isaiah 14:27 No one can stop God. God's plan cannot and will not be stopped. The reason the enemy attacks you is not because of your past, but because of what you are going to do for Jesus in your future! If the devil isn't attacking, you aren't working! Don't be driven by what we see but be driven but what He has said. It is time we determine that we won't be driven our past or by what others think about us. We won't be driven by hell or by our mistakes, but we will be driven by the presence and the glory of the risen Christ! Our perception is not a reality and our blessing will overtake the brokenness. The devil says go ahead and pout, but Jesus says go ahead and praise. What will we do in our storms?

Do not lower your anchor until you've reached your destination

The ship was caught by the storm and they were afraid so they lowered the anchors in order to be driven along. They were far from Rome and their appointment. But because of fear they were prompted to lower their anchor. Have you ever been afraid of something? Their ship fell apart because of fear. What are you afraid of? Rejection? Failure? Being betrayed? Many of us struggle with fear and it is the enemy of faith. Fear makes us stop prematurely before we reach our destination. It can cause you to veer off course. They were way off course. Fear can take us off track.

Fear made Elijah hide from Jezebel. Fear made Peter deny Jesus three times. You must confront your fears today. Here is the antidote for your fear: "For God hath not given us the spirit of fear;

but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind." 2 Timothy 1:7 What are you going to do with it? These individuals gave into their fear and thought they were going to die so much that they were throwing things over board.

Because of the storms we have been in, we drop our anchors. We let go of our faith. We give up. We get stuck in the waters of life because we focus on the storm instead of the destination. We get stuck because of what we did to ourselves in the past or what others have done to us.

We experience no growth when we are stuck. We may convince ourselves that we are moving, but in reality we aren't. We are stuck! No joy – you know why? Because we dropped our anchor in the midst of our storm. Today is the day that we should raise our anchors. "And I, brethren, when I came to you, came not with excellency of speech or of wisdom, declaring unto you the testimony of God. For I determined not to know any thing among you, save Jesus Christ, and him crucified. And I was with you in weakness, and in fear, and in much trembling. And my speech and my preaching was not with enticing words of man's wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power: That your faith should not stand in the wisdom of men, but in the power of God." 1 Corinthians 2:1-5

Anchors are important but if used in the storm they can be dangerous. They can cause a ship to flip over, to take on water, etc. Our anchors can be dangerous too.

Together We Can

The Culture Wars And How Christians Should React To Them

All of us have heard the term "Culture Wars" in the news or at school or at work. America has been engaged in a culture war for some time now. What is a culture war and how did we get

If you would go back to the 1950's most of America had the same world view. By that I mean that most Americans believed in God (mostly Christians) and that our society was based on what is called the Judo-Christian ethic (Old Testament & New Testament). We freely prayed in schools and public events, prayers were offered at government meetings at all levels. The nuclear family and sexual purity were valued and children were raised to respect authority, God and the Bible. This does not mean that everyone in America were Christians, but that we did live by this same world view. American society basically backed up the church and the Bible. This was the American culture.

In the 1960's a rebellion, starting on the college campus' began to challenge the Judo-Christian ethic in America. No longer was sexual purity and the family seen as the norm. In fact they said it was harmful and oppressive. Practices such as public prayer and Bible reading were challenged and banished from our schools and public places. Respect for authority was ridiculed and parents were told that we have been wrong in the way we have been raising our children all these years! The Bible was refused as a standard for society and a distrust of authority became the

Fast forward to the present day. Those that were involved in the rebellion of the 1960's and their children are now in the leadership of our country, especially in our higher education and that filters down to all public education. We have become a secular society with a "moving standard" of what is right and wrong. The nuclear family is no longer the norm or is it desired to be. Purity and loyalty are not given the value it once did.

As a result of this casting off of God's unchangeable standard, young people are confused. Those who have not been taught or been disciplined seem to be unhappy and without hope or confidence. They have been given no boundaries, no fences and no fear. They have been told that they are an accident, that life does not really have an eternal meaning. They are told that they have not been created with a plan. That is why abortion makes sense to them. They do not see people as made in the image of God. Young people are confused about gender roles since they do not recognize the Designer of those roles. And because of the breakdown of the family, they don't have good role models for gender. In the unrest, distrust and unhappiness we see in our society, we are reaping what we have sown and we are paying a heavy price for it! This is nothing new. See (Romans 1) This happened in the ancient world and will always happen when man rejects the standards of the Lord.

In the Culture War-A rebellion against God's design, we see the areas of contention:

- 1. The Value of Believing in God
- 2. The Standard on Which Our Society Will Depend On to Be Our Rule
- 3. The Design of the Human Family
- 4. The Roles for Men and Women
- 5 The Value of Marriage
- 6. How to Raise Children
- 7. The Design of our Gender

This is the view of the modern day secularist, which would summarize by saying that they have a view of things the way secular man wants them to be. They deny human nature. They proclaim things like this:

- *Spanking children harms them. (Proverbs 22:15 & Proverbs 29:15) God's Word says it will help
- *Capital Punishment doesn't prevent crime.
- *Giving condoms to teens will help.
- *You can spend your way out of debt.
- *This world was made without a Creator.
- *Immorality hurts no one but the person who commits it.
- *Perversion is simply an alternate life style.
- *An unborn baby is not a person.
- *A family where the husband is the head of the home and the wife is subject to her husband as the Church is to Christ is outdated.

A person can be of great intellect, education, shrewd, or clever, but without the fear of the Lord they will not be able to possess true wisdom and will flounder in their lives. And many are! God can use your brokenness

God showed up and instructed Paul to tell them that everyone on the ship was going to make it, but the ship will not. Sometimes we lose the ship. Sometimes we think the ship will take us to meet our dream, sometimes we focus on what we are in instead of what He has put inside us. We may have had something stolen from us. We may not have what we thought we would have, but we have not drowned. We may have thought we should be on a particular ship, but God has a bigger ship for us. It is here and ready for us to board. Why haven't we drowned? Because of Romans 8:11 "But if the Spirit of him that raised up Jesus from the dead dwell in you, he that raised up Christ from the dead shall also quicken your mortal bodies by his Spirit that dwelleth in you."

Let's stop complaining or dwelling about the lost ship. We should not ask Him to restore our past. He is not interested in renovating our past, He is interested in releasing our future. We are going to make it! We are going to make it. Believe it! —We are going to make it!

We should not dwell on what we lost. We should remember where we are going. What we lost cannot compare to what God is sending our way. My worst day as a Christian is far better than my best day as a sinner.

Conclusion

How do we know we can make it? Paul answered in vs 25. He had been through storms and was still standing. I have been through my own shipwrecks and I'm still standing. You've been in your own shipwrecks and you are still standing too!

Some frightened sailors tried to lower the life boats – in case the word Paul gave them didn't work. They had a "Plan B." Paul said let the life boats be cut down and be allowed to drift away. In God there is no "Plan B." Either we trust Him for everything or we trust Him for nothing. Sometimes in life we have to learn to just let the lifeboats go.

They made it to Malta by holding on to a few pieces of the ship. Sometimes pieces are all we have. Sometimes it is just one broken piece of wood. It doesn't matter how broken or how shattered we may be, God does amazing things with broken pieces! They all made it to land. (Acts 27:44) God is greater than the brokenness of men. Each person on this ship made it, just as God promised.

If God is the Savior of your life, you aren't "going" to make it, you have "already" made it! You made it not because you perfectly held on to God, you made it because He perfectly held on to you!

Even if you are broken – your "stuck season" can be over today! Anchors are important, but when the seas are rough they are dangerous. Let's raise anchor today and trust God. We are not holding onto just any piece of wood. We are holding on to the wood that is your cross. Holding on to His saving grace – the life of Jesus, the death of Jesus, the blood of Jesus and bless God, the resurrection of Jesus!

Leading With Integrity 2017 Leadership Conference

One hundred seventy-two pastors, denominational officials, and church leaders from 19 states and a Canadian province gathered December 4-5 at Nashville Airport Marriott Hotel for the 2017 Free Will Baptist Leadership Conference. The two-day conference featured keynote speaker Clark Dickerson who explored the theme *Leading With Integrity*.

With 40 years of fund-raising experience (and more than three decades as a fund-raising consultant for Christian organizations), Dickerson has provided counsel for hundreds of organizations. For eight years Clark served as vice president of TCM International, a mission organization serving Eastern Europe prior to the fall of the Iron Curtain, traveling extensively throughout the Communist world to provide Christians a variety of spiritual and relief programs.

Clark founded Dickerson and Associates in 1985 and later merged with a friend to form Dickerson, Bakker, and Associates. As capital campaigns team leader for the compa-

ny, today he focuses almost exclusively on assisting ministries, providing guidance to other consulting team members, and sharing his knowledge and experience through teaching, writing, and presenting

Clark explored three important topics during his sessions: 1) the selection and training of board members; 2) effective governance by a board of directors; and 3) the importance of effective fund raising and public relations. The sessions were well received, sparking conversation and debate on these important topics.

"In a world where integrity is sadly lacking," observed Executive Secretary **Keith Burden**, "it is crucial for leaders to be reminded of its value. The world is watching every move the Church makes, and **Clark Dickerson** provided clear, straightforward, easy-to-understand advice to help today's Christian leaders live and lead with integrity."

In additional keynote sessions, **Will Beauchamp**, pastor of First FWB Church Tampa, Florida, shared two lessons a biblical servant must learn when facing discouraging situations: 1) when others try to distract you, stay focused; and 2) when others try to slander you, stay faithful. **Gene Williams**, pastor of Parkers Chapel FWB Church, Greenville, North Carolina, explored the importance of accountability in the life of a leader, sharing four "pillars" upon which this important characteristic are built—responsibility, answerability, dependability, and liability.



When ethnic Kazaks come to faith in Christ, they often face opposition from family and friends as well as pressure at work and in the community. It is important for "M" to understand Salvation, Sin, and the Holy Spirit, and to fully grasp the Scriptures, so that he will be able to withstand Satan's attempts to use his Muslim heritage and traditions to draw him back to Islam. He needs a strong biblical foundation on which to build his family, his ministry, and the church to be a shining light of Jesus to his people. This is true for "M" in Kazakhstan, but it's also true for all believers and churches around the globe. And that's where we come in!

Working through International Missions, we seek to strengthen the national church, her people, her leaders, and her outreach. 



First of all I want to thank all of you who have faithfully stood with us since we began traveling to raise money to come to Erie. It all began in August 2010 and we traveled thousands of miles and were in dozens of churches to share our vision for the Flagship City. Since then, so many of you have faithfully stood with us with your encouraging words, constant prayers and generous financial support.

In the last six years, since we have arrived in Erie, I have said very little about our personal account. Rather we have focused on raising money for our original building (paid off), the 2 1/2 acres of land that we purchased (paid off) and our Building Fund which we are still raising money for. However, the time has come to make our supporters aware of the needs of our personal account. It is from this account that I draw my salary and benefits. Over the last ten months our account balance has dropped over \$15,000! No, I am not panicking, but I am trying to discern God's plan to support my family and fund His work here until we are able to go "self-supporting."


We are praying for a great move of God and an influx of people. As we grow, so will our offerings. As we grow we will get closer and closer to self-supporting status. Unfortunately, I believe we are still several years away from this goal

If our account continues to decline at the pace it has been over the last 10 months our account will be depleted in just over a year. Although I am not opposed to getting a full-time secular job to support my family, I believe this would only hinder the process of





IM Board Year-end Meeting

The Board of Free Will Baptist International Missions met December 6-7, 2017, in the Antioch, Tennessee, offices. Board chairman **Jeff Manning** summed up the two-day meeting, saying, "This year's board meeting brought tears to our eyes several times, not because of deficits or disturbances, but because of stories about the undeniable, providential hand of the Lord working in the lives of our missionaries, staff, and board members."

The board heard reports from each of the leadership team, interviewed candidates, reviewed financial reports and budgets, considered and acted on proposals, approved handbook changes, and set the dates for the annual meeting in 2018 for April 16-17.

The reorganization of staff necessitated changes in the Mission's Official Handbook of Operational Policies and Procedures. The board reviewed and accepted the proposed changes.

The December 2015 adoption of a designated-funding system with individual missionary accounts also required new policies. Missionaries who retire or resign often have a balance left in their accounts. The board voted to funnel any remaining funds into a "restricted reserves" account. Missionaries who resign or retire with a deficit account will have their deficit "erased" through the restricted reserves funds. At the end of each calendar year, any balance over \$50,000 in the restricted reserves account will be dispersed among missionary accounts at the direction of the general director and leadership team.

"The student debt crisis headlines news on radio and television as well as print. Candidates for missionary service are far from immune to the growing trend," General Director **Clint Morgan** explained. "While the Mission continues to encourage candidates to make every effort to graduate without student debt, we also desire to provide a student debt relief system for those pursuing overseas, cross-cultural service with IM." The board voted to allow (within parameters) missionaries to include a budgetary line item to offset student debt.

"By far the highlight of this year's board meeting was hearing the intern candidates express how God has led them in each minuscule detail to overseas service," Morgan stated.

The board approved two couples as two-year interns to work with **Heath** and **Joni Hubbard** in Tokyo, Japan. They plan to begin a bilingual (English/Japanese) church plant in the Tokorozawa City area of greater Tokyo. **Daniel** and **Shelby (Blake) Culwell** split their time between Arkansas and Tennessee. Daniel, a 2015 Welch College graduate with a degree in youth ministry and minor in business, also studied mechanical engineering at Austin Peay State University in Clarksville, Tennessee. Shelby completed a year at Welch College before transferring to Austin Peay where she earned a degree in graphic design with a business minor. The couple works with youth at Bethel FWB Church in Ashland City, Tennessee, and Mt. Bethel FWB Church in Rose Bud, Arkansas. The Culwells have two sons: two-year-old Easton and one-year-old Barrett. **Jack** and **Ashley (Carter) Ketteman**, both originally from Nashville, Tennessee, reside in Bristol, Virginia. A 2001 graduate of Welch College with a B.S. in Bible, music, and youth ministry, Jack serves as family pastor of the First Free Will Baptist Church in Bristol. Ashley, a registered nurse, attended Welch College for two years before transferring to Aquinas and graduating in 2006. The couple has three children: daughters Jane (10) and Callie (7), and son Carter (2).

The board approved **Daniel** and **Katie Speer** for a second two-year internship in Tokyo, Japan. Their first internship period ended in August 2017. However, their daughter Audrey's battle with bacterial meningitis and other critical health issues, as well as Katie's health struggles, complicated the last eight months of internship. After returning to the States, the Speers reaffirmed their desire to pursue career missionary service in Japan. The couple will work primarily with **Don** and **Ruth McDonald** at the Good News Chapel in Tokyo during this internship.

The board regretfully accepted **Dale** and **Sandra Bishop's** request to retire. In a letter dated October 1, 2017, Dale and Sandra reflected on 44 years of service with IM saying, "It has been our privilege to minister with you for these many years." The couple will live in Georgia and care for Sandra's mother. They requested their retirement be effective as of December 31, 2017. "We desire your prayers for God's wisdom and leadership as we venture into this next segment of our journey," the couple wrote.

General Director **Clint Morgan** affirmed, "It is thrilling to see new missionaries join the team in Japan. This is especially important as we say goodbye to some long-time missionaries."

The board approved an operational budget of \$6.35 million for 2018. Projected self-funded programs carry the total budget to \$9.9 million. IMpact projects, The Hanna Project trips and projects, student missions, etc. require fundraising separate from the operational budget.

How well do you know your church's employees and volunteers? If they don't undergo a comprehensive background screening, the answer may

not be as clear as you think. Background screening is an essential part of keeping your ministry safe.

A proper screening process consists of the following:

Written application.

An application form should require the applicant to provide basic personal information, at least two personal references, and criminal history, among other information. The application should also ask the applicant to give permission to perform a background check and to contact his or her references.

Background check. Use an outside firm that is reputable and accurate. A thorough background check will search county, state, and national databases, as well as sex offender databases. If the job duties include driving, be sure to search BMV records as well.

References. The most useful references come from previous churches or employers. References can provide an additional perspective of the applicant's character.

Personal interview. A conversation can give you a feel for the person's personality. It's a good idea to ask why the individual applied for the specific position, and to ask about any issues that references may have raised.
