



Dear Prayer Partner,

On the very day Super Typhoon Bavi tore across Rota with winds over 150 miles per hour — the Northern Mariana Islands' second super typhoon in under three months — we found ourselves reliving what we lived through in April, when Super Typhoon Sinlaku struck while we were on Saipan. We watched a lush, green island turn to dry, splintered land almost overnight. Roofs were torn off, power lines snapped, and for days there was no electricity or running water. We paid roughly \$25 a day just for drinking water, and stood in line for four or five hours at a time — sometimes longer — for basic supplies.



Rota has now been hit even harder, by a Category 5 storm, while CNMI still has not finished recovering from Sinlaku: as of this week. Please pray urgently for food, water, shelter, and power to be restored; for the safety of first responders, and for the FEMA, Samaritan's Purse, and U.S. Navy teams — we personally watched their LCAC landing craft bring in generators and heavy equipment after Sinlaku — who are once again racing to help.



But our deeper burden is for souls. We planted Logos B

ible Church on Saipan because we believe these islands need more than generators and tarps — they need Jesus. Sharing the gospel there has cost us; we have been threatened and told to leave, told we do not belong. Many islanders have no assurance of eternal life: some trust in devotion to Mary rather than in Jesus Christ alone as Lord and Savior, and others believe death is simply the end, with no afterlife at all. Two catastrophic storms in twelve weeks are the kind of moment God sometimes uses to break through years of resistance — but that door will not stay open forever.

Please pray:

1. That grief and loss would turn hearts toward Christ instead of away from Him.
2. That fear would give way to faith, and that believers serving in CNMI would have courage,
3. and open doors to share the gospel amid the ruins.

We are grateful for every relief worker on the ground, and we ask you to pray for them as well. Pray also for those who see disaster only as an opportunity for profit or exploitation — that even their hearts would be softened toward the gospel, and that they would be saved.

Above all, join us in praying for **revival**: that out of this devastation, tens of thousands of people across Guam and the CNMI would come to a **saving knowledge of Jesus Christ**. “God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble” (Psalm 46:1). We believe He can turn even this storm into the moment CNMI turns to Him.
