If you are tuning in to Cherry Creek,
welcome and thank you for worshipping
with us on this Sunday morning.

Why is it called “communion?” What
we do during communion isn't merely
a symbolic act or a remembrance—
it's more than that. 1 Corinthians
10:16-17 teaches us that we are
actually communing with Christ
Himself as we partake of the ele-
ments. We mysteriously “participate
in the body and blood” of Jesus. As
we take communion, let us remem-
ber that Christ is spiritually present
in a special way for us in this sac-
rament. Let's enjoy the feast!

The Lord's Prayer has been a part
of worship from the beginning.
One of the reasons we value incor-
porating the long-standing tradi-
tions of Christian worship is that it
allows us to connect our worship
with other saints over time. It helps
us to realize that we are part of one
Church, not only across the globe,
but across the centuries. Praying
the Lord's Prayer in our worship is a
way that we connect with some of
the earliest worship traditions of the
Christian church. One of the earliest
records of Christian worship is found
in a document called the *Didache*,
which dates back to as early as the
first or second century. One of its
passages encourages the use of the
Lord's Prayer in worship (Didache 8:2).
So when we pray the Lord's Prayer, we
can remember, as we attend to the pray-
er itself, that we are praying “with the
