

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
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STACK OF STONES

A WORD FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Westies,

We are two weeks into Lent as you read this, which means many of you have already taken back whatever you gave up. Don't worry. So have I.

I say that not to make fun of us but to make a point. Lent is not a self-improvement program. It's not a spiritual fitness challenge. Lent is the Church's annual invitation to tell the truth about ourselves - that we are finite, fragile, and deeply dependent on a God who is none of those things.

If you're struggling with the discipline you chose, good. That's the discipline working. The whole point is to bump up against the edges of our self-sufficiency and discover that God's grace was already there, waiting. We don't fast to prove we're strong. We fast to discover that God has been sustaining us all along.

But I want to shift gears for a moment, because something else is happening this spring that I cannot stop thinking about.

On February 10, Westminster Presbyterian Church turned 80 years old.

Eighty years. Think about that. In 1946, a group of people in Oklahoma City decided they needed a church. The war had just ended. The world was trying to figure out what came next. And in the middle of all that uncertainty, a handful of folks said: "We believe God is doing something here, and we want to be part of it."

They didn't know what this church would become. They didn't have a strategic plan or a capital campaign or a website. They had each other and they had a conviction that the gospel was worth building something around. That's it.

I find it fitting that our anniversary falls so close to Lent this year. Lent reminds us that we are dust - but dust that God chose to breathe life into. An 80th anniversary does something similar. It reminds us that this church is not the product of anyone's genius or any one generation's effort. It is the accumulated faithfulness of hundreds of people over eight decades who kept showing up, kept giving, kept praying, kept loving their neighbors even when the world made it hard to do so.


That's what we're going to celebrate. Not perfection. Not an institution. We're going to celebrate a community that has been sustained by the Spirit through every season - through growth and decline, through conflict and reconciliation, through cultural upheaval and quiet Sunday mornings when only a few dozen people showed up and the gospel was preached anyway.

Mark your calendars: April 10-12 is our 80th Anniversary Celebration Weekend. I want you there. We'll have more details soon, but start making plans now.

Between now and then, let Lent do its work. Let it strip away the pretense that any of this depends on us being impressive. And then, when Easter arrives and we shout "Alleluia!" for the first time in six weeks, let it land differently this year. Let it land as a word of gratitude - for a risen Christ, for a faithful God, and for eighty years of this community's stubborn insistence on being the Church.

SPIRITUAL FORMATION

As we enter the season of Lent, we are invited to pay intentional attention to how we prepare for Easter. Lent calls us to slow down and to engage ancient faith-formation practices such as prayer, fasting, reflection, confession, and repentance. These practices help us notice where we may have drifted from God and gently invite us to return, to serve God more faithfully with our whole hearts. What I love about the liturgical Season of Lent, is that it allows us to peel back the layers of our own shortcomings and to confess an essential truth: everyone messes up. As Christians, we can do better but despite all the ways we disappoint God and others, God's unfailing love remains constant. Lent unstops our ears, so we can hear again, that the good news of the gospel remains, everyone is forgiven. Even as Lent invites us to reflect honestly on our human frailty and mortality, it also proclaims that we are, indeed, held in God's grace and care. At its heart, Lent reminds us that we are not perfect, and yet...even when we fall short, we are always already loved. I am reminded of Henri Nouwen's simple prayer, *"O Lord, make this Lenten season different from the other ones. Let me find you again. Amen."*

I love this quote as it highlights that Lent is a season demanding intentionality within our faith practices, encouraging us to take on a Lenten posture means pausing, listening more carefully, and considering how we might follow Jesus more closely by returning to God's path of love, kindness, and care for others. In this way, Lent gently turns our attention outward and Godward, inviting us to release perfectionism and reorient our lives toward love. Lent offers us space to acknowledge, in thought, word, and deed, that we are held in God's grace as we practice honest self-knowing, deeper reliance on God, attentiveness to the Holy Spirit, and the gentle letting go of striving to get everything right. To encourage these practices, the Adult Spiritual

Formation Committee and the Children's Ministry Team invite you this Lent to experience an **intergenerational, family-friendly Spirituality Center** in **Room 105**, open throughout the Lenten season and welcoming to all ages. This space is designed to help individuals and families explore faith formation practices such as prayer, confession, contemplation, and reflection. While Lent is often described as a season of "giving something up," the Spirituality Center also invites us to see Lent as a season of making space. Space to pause. Space to breathe. Space to listen. The Spirituality Center will open on **Ash Wednesday** and close on **Wednesday, March 25**, offering opportunities—whether for a few minutes or longer—to experience stillness, curiosity, unexpected insight, or meaningful connection with God. You will encounter simple prompts, tactile and sensory-friendly experiences, and self-guided practices designed to meet you where you are. Whether you come on your own, with children, or as a family, this space is an invitation to slow down and remember that you belong to God.

So, as we journey toward Easter, I hope that this season of Lent may help us uncover once again the amazing grace and gift of hope freely given, as we reflect on the depth of God's mercy, forgiveness, and abiding love.

This quarter has been an exciting season of growth, collaboration, and meaningful engagement for Big Faith Resources. We are continually inspired by how much churches value resources that support inclusion, celebrate neurodiverse children and families, and help congregations embody God’s expansive welcome.

Here’s a look at some of the ways we’ve been sharing, learning, and connecting recently:

Sensory-Friendly Candy Cane Hunt

In December, we hosted a Sensory-Friendly Candy Cane Hunt designed for children who benefit from a calmer environment. Families enjoyed reduced noise, smaller groups, crafts, and hot cocoa. Thank you to everyone who helped make this inclusive celebration such a success.



Wonder Box

Since our last newsletter, more than 200 Wonder Boxes have shipped to churches and ministries nationwide. Another 200 are being packaged to send in March.



Phillips Theological Seminary

In January, we hosted Phillips Theological Seminary at Westminster Presbyterian Church for a day of learning and collaboration. We shared updates on our grant project and included a hands-on DIY session creating sensory-friendly items.

The Association of Presbyterian Church Educators Annual Event

At the APCE Annual Event in Pittsburgh, we connected with ministry leaders and received strong interest in our work. Our team also led two full-capacity workshops on sensory-friendly options and equipping volunteers to support neurodiverse children.

Winter Meeting of the Oklahoma Presbyteries

In February, we attended the Winter Meeting of the Oklahoma Presbyteries in Stillwater. We met with leaders from across the state to share practical strategies for sensory-friendly, inclusive ministry.



Synod of the Sun Meeting

In February, we shared grant updates at the Synod of the Sun Meeting in Dallas with leaders from across the region. We also shared that traveling equipment for churches will be available soon.



InterGenerate Global Online Conference

At the end of February, we presented virtually for the InterGenerate Global Online Conference on neurodiversity. It was an opportunity to share practical guidance for creating inclusive, sensory-friendly faith spaces with a global audience.



Flagler College

In early March, we presented at Flagler College in St. Augustine, Florida, on the overlap between sensory-friendly spaces and trauma-informed worship. We explored how calm, predictable environments can support neurodiverse needs and foster safety for those impacted by trauma.



Sensory-Friendly Easter Egg Hunt

We will host a Sensory-Friendly Easter Egg Hunt on Saturday, April 4 at 10 a.m. Children will enjoy a calm, structured egg hunt plus festive crafts in a supportive environment.

CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

Hello to Our Families and Youngest Friends at WPC!

As we begin the season of Lent, we are excited for the ways we can grow closer to God together through prayer, reflection, and simple faithful practices. Lent lasts 40 days (not counting Sundays), beginning on Ash Wednesday and ending on Holy Saturday, the day before Easter Sunday. It is a special time when churches around the world prepare for Easter by slowing down, reflecting, and making intentional space to notice God in our daily lives.

In Chapel, after focusing on types of prayer, we shift our attention to learning all about Lent and why we engage in spiritual practices during Lent. For example, Why We Put "Alleluia" Away During Lent? We have the children understand that in worship and in our Children's Chapel, we "put away the Alleluia" during this season. Some wonder, why do we take a break from it? It is a good question. Alleluia is a very joyful word—it means "Praise the Lord!" We take a break from using it because by refraining from saying Alleluia, we are reminded that Lent is a time for reflection, prayer, and getting ready for Easter. It helps us notice the ways we need God's help and the ways we can grow closer to Jesus. When Easter comes, we welcome Alleluia back with joy! That first Alleluia is extra special because we have waited for it. It reminds us that God's love and new life are worth celebrating with all our hearts. So during Lent, even though we are a little quieter with our Alleluia, we are still singing in our hearts, learning, growing, and preparing for the big celebration of Easter.

In Sunday School this Lent, children will hear Godly Play stories each week that help them walk with Jesus from the beginning of Lent to Holy Week. Each week introduces a part of Jesus' life and ministry leading toward Holy Week and Easter. These stories help children walk with Jesus through Lent—listening, wondering, and noticing how God's love unfolds in Jesus' life. Each week offers an opportunity to reflect, wonder, and connect the story to children's own experiences.

Something new this Lent, we especially invite you to visit our family-friendly Spirituality Center in Room 105! Open to all ages, it offers a gentle, creative space to explore prayer, confess, reflect, and listen for God's voice. This is a place that incorporates space for engaging in a variety of prayers, prompted experiences, quiet reflection, and space to engage in a variety of activities in a meaningful, hands-on way as you explore faith together this Lenten season, remembering that we belong to God.

Mark your calendar noting that our Children Chapel singers will perform on Palm Sunday at the 10:30am service. Later next week, you are invited to our annual Easter Egg Hunts. The first opportunity is a Sensory-friendly Hunt offered on Saturday, April 4th and a traditional Egg Hunt is offer on Easter Sunday, April 5th. After Easter, be on the lookout for details coming soon, all about VBS at WPC!



WORSHIP AND THE ARTS

*My song is love unknown,
My Savior's love to me,
Love to the loveless shown
That they might lovely be.
O who am I,
That for my sake
My Lord should take frail flesh and die?*
My Song Is Love Unknown" (stanza 1)

It's the most wonderful time of the year.

This isn't the first time I have used those words here as we have entered the seasons of Advent or Lent together - the two great preparatory seasons of the Christian year that, perhaps counterintuitively, tend to inspire in me a deeper joy than our Christmas and Easter celebrations. There is something about the honest, unhurried work of preparation - the willingness to sit with longing, with penitence, with questions - that I find both bracing and beautiful.

This year we will join our voices during worship on the first Sunday in Lent to sing "My Song Is Love Unknown," the favorite hymn of our Co-Director of Worship and the Arts, Jan McDaniel. And we will find ourselves asking the question posed by Samuel Crossman in the first stanza of that text: *O who am I, that for my sake my Lord should take frail flesh and die?*

Who are we, indeed? We look around and see a world divided. A world that seems filled with depression and anger. A world that has highlighted the chasm between socioeconomic groups and religious groups and political ideologies. A world whose temporal conflicts have infiltrated our houses of worship. But that is not our identity. No matter how loudly we find ourselves shouting labels (at ourselves and others) born of what divides us, it is God's matchless love - made incarnate in the person of Jesus Christ and poured out in the life, death, and resurrection we recognize through the seasons of Epiphany, Lent, and Eastertide - that defines us. Even when we cannot hear it, see it, or feel it. Even when we deny it.

So let us open our eyes during this season and realize that God has already loosed the chains that have bound us to allegiances that have sown division. And let us join not just our voices but our hearts in declaring the final stanza of this great hymn:

*Here might I stay and sing,
No story so divine!
Never was love, dear King,
Never was grief like thine.
This is my friend,
In whose sweet praise
I all my days could gladly spend.*

These small groups will not only allow us to serve but also engage with the friends we are serving. We will be able to share Jesus with them and be present to listen to their stories. All these opportunities will culminate with a Maundy Thursday dinner and church service. I hope that you will all choose to participate in one of these activities. Signups will be posted soon!

This year we will have 93 Children's Easter baskets. Please sign up online. There will also be cooking days to prepare our Easter meals. We will be serving 45 families, which cost approximately \$75 each. Your contributions are so appreciated and are what makes Feed My Sheep work!

Meals on Wheels is always a constant! There are always opportunities to deliver and cook.

Sudden Infant Loss continues to meet at Westminster monthly.

Feed My Sheep is actively serving 38 families at this time. Most are large families. We continue to pack groceries on Thursday mornings before the third Saturday of the month.

On the third Saturday we always **need delivery drivers** willing to deliver to a few families that live on the South OKC. Both days are a great way to form friendships with other church members!


On the fourth Saturday we are at **White Fields** distributing groceries for our Hope house moms and kids. It is a great time to get to know the moms and play with some sweet kids.


Summer Mission Trip: Broken Bow

OKC Memorial Water Stop: VOLUNTEERS NEEDED


April 26 | 6:00am | WPC

Once again The Oklahoma City Memorial Marathon route goes right down Shartel past Westminster. Westminster sits at mile 7 of the marathon and half marathon. We are a vital and very visible water stop. As we have done for more than a decade, in place of normal worship services that morning, we have the opportunity to support the marathon runners rain or shine as a water stop.

We continue to partner with "Hope is Alive" to serve as a water stop along Shartel in front of Westminster. Gatorade, water and encouragement have always been aplenty for the thousands of runners who passed our church that morning. The energy and people power HIA provides helps us set up, hydrate and cheer on those participating.

We need volunteers and table captains for this early morning endeavor. We gather at 6 am to unload the marathon supply truck, set up the water tables, cheer on and hydrate the runners and finally clean up after the last runner passes which usually happens by 10 am. There is no childcare available that morning, but children 10 and older are welcome to participate. Students who need service hours can work the water stop for credit as well. 

