Faithful To Lead His People

Key Scripture

Exodus 13:21-22

“The LORD was going before them in a pillar of cloud by day...” (NASB)

Supporting Scripture

Psalms 32:8

“I will instruct you and teach you in the way which you should go...” (NASB)

Isaiah 58:11

“And the LORD will continually guide you...” (NASB)

Proverbs 3:5-6

“In all your ways acknowledge Him, And He will make your paths straight.” (NASB)

Devotional Thought

One of the clearest proofs of God’s faithfulness is that He does not merely save His people and then leave them to find their own way. He leads. He directs. He goes before. From the opening pages of Israel’s wilderness journey, we see a God who was not distant, passive, or silent. He was present in front of them—guiding by cloud in the day and by fire in the night. His leadership was not occasional; it was continual. His direction was not partial; it was enough for every step.

God’s people have always needed guidance because God’s people have always faced uncertainty. The wilderness was unfamiliar. The road was long. The dangers were real. Yet the faithfulness of God was seen in this: He did not ask them to navigate life without Him. He made His presence their compass.

The same remains true for us. God is faithful to lead His people still. He leads through His Word, through His Spirit, through His wisdom, and through His providence. He does not always reveal the whole map, but He always gives sufficient light for the next step. We often want advance details; God promises faithful direction. We want full explanation; God offers His presence. We want certainty about tomorrow; God calls us to trust Him today.

There are times when His leadership seems slower than we want. There are seasons when the path feels confusing, and we wonder why He has not moved more quickly or more clearly. But the Lord’s faithfulness is not measured by how quickly He satisfies our impatience. It is measured by how

perfectly He leads us according to His wisdom. He knows where danger lies. He knows what we are not ready to carry. He knows how to form our character on the journey. His guidance is not only about getting us to a destination; it is about shaping us into a people who trust Him.

Sometimes God leads us beside still waters. Sometimes He leads us through wilderness stretches. Sometimes He leads us by closing a door. Sometimes He leads us by opening one we never expected. But always, He leads faithfully. He never abandons His people to blind chance. He never misguides those who surrender to Him. He never loses His way, and therefore those who follow Him are ultimately safe in His hands.

Today, be reminded that you do not have to force your own path. You do not have to carry the burden of pretending you know everything. Your responsibility is not to control the road but to trust the Shepherd. The God who led Israel through the wilderness is the same God who leads His people now. He is faithful to lead you.

Illustration

A group of travelers hiking through a mountain trail in heavy fog would be foolish to trust their own instincts over an experienced guide who knows every turn, ridge, and drop-off. The fog may keep them from seeing very far ahead, but it does not trouble the guide. He has walked the trail before. He knows where it narrows, where it climbs, and where it opens into safety.

That is what it means to follow the Lord. We often live in fog. We cannot see far ahead. We do not know how every detail will unfold. But our Guide is never confused. He is never disoriented. He is never late. Faith does not mean we see the whole trail. Faith means we trust the One who does.

Reflection

1. Where in your life do you most need God's guidance right now?
2. Have you been demanding a full explanation from God instead of trusting His next step?
3. How has the Lord shown His faithfulness in leading you through past seasons of uncertainty?
4. What would it look like today for you to follow His leadership with greater surrender?

Prayer

Father, thank You that You are not only the God who saves Your people, but the God who faithfully leads them. Thank You that I do not have to figure out life on my own. Thank You for going before me, walking with me, and directing my steps even when I cannot fully see the way ahead.

Forgive me for the times I have leaned on my own understanding, resisted Your direction, or become impatient with Your timing. Forgive me for wanting control more than trust. Teach me to rest in Your wisdom. Teach me to follow with humility, obedience, and confidence.

Lord, guide me by Your truth and by Your Spirit. Keep me from paths that would harm me. Lead me in ways that honor You. When the road is clear, help me thank You. When the road is uncertain, help me trust You. When the journey is long, help me remember that Your presence is enough.

Thank You that You are faithful to lead Your people. I place my future, my decisions, my burdens, and my fears into Your hands. Lead me step by step, and make my life a testimony to Your steady and unfailing faithfulness.

In Jesus' name, Amen.

Day 30 — April 10

Faithful Through Trials & Testing

Key Scripture

1 Peter 1:6–7 (NASB)

“In this you greatly rejoice, even though now for a little while, if necessary, you have been distressed by various trials, so that the proof of your faith, being more precious than gold which perishes though tested by fire, may be found to result in praise and glory and honor at the revelation of Jesus Christ.”

Supporting Scripture

James 1:2–4 (NASB)

“Consider it all joy, my brothers and sisters, when you encounter various trials, knowing that the testing of your faith produces endurance. And let endurance have its perfect result, so that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing.”

Devotional Thought

Trials are not pleasant, easy, or welcome. They expose weakness, uncover fear, and force us to face how little control we actually have. But they also reveal something glorious about God: He is faithful in the fire.

God never promised His people a path without pain. He promised His presence in the pain. Trials do not mean God has abandoned you. Testing does not mean He has withdrawn His hand. In fact, some of the deepest work God does in us happens in seasons we would never have chosen for ourselves.

Peter says our faith is tested like gold in fire. Fire does not destroy true gold; it refines it. In the same way, trials burn away self-reliance, pride, false security, and shallow belief. What remains is a stronger, purer, more steadfast faith. What feels like breaking may actually be God purifying. What feels like delay may actually be God developing endurance. What feels like loss may actually be preparation.

The faithfulness of God shines brightest when circumstances grow darkest. He is faithful when prayers seem unanswered. He is faithful when the diagnosis is serious. He is faithful when the door closes, the burden grows heavy, or the future looks uncertain. He does not waste pain. He does not abandon His children in the testing. He walks with them through it and uses it to shape them into the image of Christ.

Do not judge the faithfulness of God by the difficulty of your moment. Judge it by His unchanging character. The same God who led Joseph through betrayal, David through caves, Job through loss, and Paul through suffering is the God who holds you today. He is not nervous about your trial. He is not absent in your testing. He is faithful through every bit of it.

Illustration

A blacksmith places metal into an intensely hot fire, not to ruin it, but to strengthen it. He knows exactly how long to leave it in and exactly when to take it out. If left alone, the metal could be damaged. But in the hands of a skilled craftsman, the fire serves a purpose. It shapes, purifies, and prepares the metal for useful service.

So it is with our heavenly Father. The fire is real, but it is never random. The trial is painful, but it is never purposeless. The God who allows the testing is the God who watches over the process and will not let go of His own.

Reflection

1. What trial or testing are you walking through right now?
 2. How might God be using this season to strengthen and refine your faith?
 3. Have you been interpreting your hardship as God's absence instead of an opportunity to trust His faithfulness?
 4. What would it look like for you to respond to this trial with endurance and confidence in God today?
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Prayer

Father, thank You that You are faithful through every trial and every test. When life feels heavy and the fire grows hot, help me remember that You have not left me. Strengthen my heart when I am weary, steady my faith when I am shaken, and keep me from believing that hardship means You are far away. Purify my heart through every difficulty, produce endurance in me, and make me more like Christ. Teach me to trust Your hand even when I do not understand Your plan. I declare today that You are faithful in the valley, faithful in the storm, and faithful in the fire. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Day 31 — April 11

Faithful In Deliverance

Key Scripture

Psalm 34:17 (NASB)

“The righteous cry out, and the Lord hears
And rescues them from all their troubles.”

Supporting Scripture

2 Timothy 4:17–18 (NASB)

“But the Lord stood with me and strengthened me, so that through me the proclamation might be fully accomplished, and that all the Gentiles might hear; and I was rescued from the lion’s mouth. The Lord will rescue me from every evil deed, and will bring me safely to His heavenly kingdom; to Him be the glory forever and ever. Amen.”

Devotional Thought

One of the most comforting truths in all of Scripture is that our God is a delivering God. He is not distant from the cries of His people. He is not unmoved by suffering. He is not passive when His children are overwhelmed. He hears, He sees, He knows, and in His perfect way and timing, He delivers.

Deliverance does not always come how we expect it. Sometimes God delivers by removing the burden. Sometimes He delivers by giving strength to endure it. Sometimes He opens the prison door like He did for Peter. Sometimes He walks with His servants through the fire like He did with the Hebrew boys. But in every case, His faithfulness is on display. He is never absent, never late, never careless with the pain of His people.

We often want immediate rescue, but God is after more than our comfort. He is after His glory and our growth. The Lord’s deliverance is not merely about getting us out of trouble. It is about showing us who He is in the middle of it. Many of us can testify that we knew God as Provider after a need, as Healer after sickness, as Sustainer after heartbreak, and as Deliverer after the battle. Some revelations of His faithfulness are only learned in the valley.

Paul testified that the Lord stood with him and strengthened him. That matters. Before God changed the circumstance, He gave His presence. Before He brought Paul out, He stood beside him in it. That is often how the faithfulness of God works. He meets us in the dark place, reminds us we are not

alone, and then shows Himself mighty in a way that leaves no doubt that He was the One who brought us through.

There may be times when you are praying for God to deliver you from fear, grief, temptation, opposition, or uncertainty. Do not lose heart. The God who delivered Israel from Egypt, Daniel from the lions, Jonah from the deep, and Paul from evil is still faithful today. He may not work according to your clock, but He will always work according to His character. And His character is faithful.

Your deliverance may be physical, emotional, spiritual, or eternal. But one thing is certain: God does not fail His people. He may allow a season of struggle, but He will not abandon you in it. He is faithful in deliverance.

Illustration

A child trapped in a rushing current does not need a swimming lesson in that moment. He needs someone stronger than the water to reach down and pull him out. In the same way, when we are overwhelmed by life, we do not merely need better ideas or stronger effort. We need a Deliverer. And that is exactly what God has always been for His people.

His arm is not too short to save. His strength is not limited by the size of your problem. What sweeps you away does not intimidate Him. He is able to reach into the deepest trouble and bring His children safely through.

Reflection

1. In what area of your life are you currently needing God's deliverance?
 2. How have you seen the Lord deliver you in past seasons of trouble?
 3. Are you trusting God's timing in your present struggle, or growing impatient with His process?
 4. How does remembering God's past faithfulness strengthen your faith for today?
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Prayer

Father, thank You that You are faithful in deliverance. Thank You that You hear me when I cry out to You and that You are never indifferent to my pain. When I feel overwhelmed, remind me that You are near. When I feel trapped, remind me that You are able. When I grow weary in the waiting, help me trust Your perfect timing. Deliver me from fear, doubt, temptation, and every work of the enemy.

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Strengthen me while I wait, sustain me in the battle, and glorify Yourself through every rescue You bring. I place my trust in You again today, believing that You are still the God who saves, rescues, and brings Your people through. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Day 32 — April 12

Faithful To Provide Daily Bread

Key Scripture

Matthew 6:11 (NASB)

“Give us this day our daily bread.”

Supporting Scripture

Lamentations 3:22–23 (NASB)

“The Lord’s acts of mercy indeed do not end,
For His compassions do not fail.
They are new every morning;
Great is Your faithfulness.”

Devotional Thought

One of the great lessons of the Christian life is learning to trust God not only for the big miracles, but also for the daily provision. We often celebrate the dramatic breakthroughs, the unexpected answers, and the overwhelming blessings. But the faithfulness of God is just as present in the ordinary bread as it is in the extraordinary miracle.

When Jesus taught His disciples to pray, He told them to ask, “Give us this day our daily bread.” That is simple, but it is profound. It reminds us that God is not merely the Lord of eternity; He is also the Lord of today. He cares about what His children need right now. He is faithful to sustain, to nourish, and to provide what is necessary for each day.

Daily bread is about more than food on the table. It speaks of everything needed to walk with God through the next twenty-four hours. It is strength for the weary heart, wisdom for the hard decision, peace for the anxious mind, grace for the difficult assignment, and provision for the legitimate need. God does not always hand us tomorrow’s supply in advance, but He promises today’s mercy right on time.

That is often where faith is tested. We want stockpiles; God teaches dependence. We want certainty for the next year; God often gives enough light for the next step. We want the full plan; God says, “Trust Me for today.” The wilderness taught Israel this lesson when manna came one day at a time. If they tried to hoard it against His instruction, it spoiled. Why? Because God was teaching them that His faithfulness is not a one-time event. It is a daily reality.

Many believers live burdened by tomorrow while missing the bread God has already placed before them today. Worry says, "What will happen later?" Faith says, "My Father will provide what I need when I need it." This does not make us passive or irresponsible. It makes us prayerful, humble, and dependent. It teaches us to work diligently, trust deeply, and rest confidently in the care of God.

Never mistake daily provision for small provision. The breath in your lungs, the strength in your body, the truth of His Word, the mercy that met you this morning, and the grace that will carry you tonight are all evidence of His faithfulness. God has been feeding His people for a very long time, and He has never failed. He is faithful to provide daily bread.

Illustration

Imagine a father walking with his child on a long journey. The child keeps asking for enough food, water, and supplies for the whole trip. But the father, who knows the road ahead, keeps giving exactly what is needed at each stop. Not because he is careless, but because he is wise. He knows that carrying tomorrow's load today would only wear the child down. That is often how God cares for us. He does not always show us the entire journey. Instead, He faithfully meets us at each bend in the road with what is needed for that moment. His provision may seem simple, but it is never accidental. It is the careful kindness of a faithful Father.

Reflection

1. In what area of your life do you most need to trust God for daily provision right now?
 2. Are you asking God for today's bread, or are you consumed with fear about tomorrow?
 3. How have you seen God faithfully provide for you in ordinary, everyday ways?
 4. What would it look like for you to live today with greater dependence on God's faithfulness?
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Prayer

Worthy and Faithful God, thank You that You are faithful to provide daily bread. Thank You for caring about my needs, my burdens, and my weaknesses each day. Forgive me for the times I have worried about tomorrow instead of trusting You today. Teach me to depend on You for strength, wisdom, peace, and provision. Help me to see Your hand in the ordinary blessings I too often overlook. Remind me that Your mercies are new every morning and that Your faithfulness never runs dry. Give me what I need for this day, and help me walk in confidence that tomorrow will also be in Your hands. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Day 33 — April 13

Faithful In Protection

Key Scripture

Psalm 121:7–8 (NASB)

“The Lord will protect you from all evil;

He will keep your soul.

The Lord will guard your going out and your coming in

From this time and forever.”

Supporting Scripture

2 Thessalonians 3:3 (NASB)

“But the Lord is faithful, and He will strengthen and protect you from the evil one.”

Devotional Thought

One of the great comforts of the Christian life is knowing that we are never left to defend ourselves alone. We live in a fallen world filled with danger, temptation, evil, uncertainty, and spiritual opposition. Yet in the middle of all of that, Scripture gives this steady assurance: the Lord is faithful in protection.

God’s protection does not mean His children never face hardship. It does not mean we are exempt from trouble, immune to pain, or untouched by attack. It means that through every danger, visible and invisible, our lives remain in the hands of a faithful God. He watches, guards, strengthens, restrains evil, and preserves His people according to His wise and sovereign purposes.

Psalm 121 reminds us that the Lord keeps us. That word is full of comfort. He keeps watch when we are unaware. He guards when we are vulnerable. He sees what we cannot see and knows what we do not know. There are dangers the Lord has protected us from that we will never even recognize this side of heaven. Many times we thank Him for the burdens we can see, but we have no idea how many traps He has already prevented, how many attacks He has restrained, or how many unseen mercies have surrounded our days.

His protection is not only physical. Sometimes His greatest protection is spiritual. He protects our minds from despair, our hearts from total collapse, and our souls from the destroyer. The enemy may attack, tempt, accuse, and oppose, but he is never sovereign. God alone is sovereign. The Lord places boundaries around what the enemy can do, and He supplies grace that the enemy cannot overcome. We are not at the mercy of darkness. We are under the care of a faithful Shepherd.

This truth gives us courage. We do not need to live in fear, panic, or constant anxiety. We should be wise, prayerful, and alert, but not enslaved to dread. Why? Because our security is not ultimately in our own strength, awareness, or planning. It is in the faithfulness of God. He is our refuge, our shield, our defender, and our keeper.

There will be moments when life feels exposed and uncertain. You may not know what lies ahead. You may not understand every threat around you. But you can rest in this: the One who holds your life never sleeps, never fails, and never loses sight of you. The Lord is faithful in protection.

Illustration

A small child can sleep peacefully during a violent storm, not because he understands the weather, but because he trusts the one watching over the house. The winds may rage, the thunder may shake the windows, and the rain may pound the roof, but the child rests because his father is near.

That is what the faithfulness of God does for His children. We may not understand every storm. We may not know how fierce the winds will become. But we know who watches over us. Our peace is not in the absence of danger. Our peace is in the presence of a faithful Protector.

Reflection

1. In what area of your life do you most need to trust God's protection right now?
2. How has the Lord protected you in the past, even in ways you did not fully recognize at the time?
3. Are you living with wise faith or with fearful anxiety?
4. How does remembering God as your Keeper change the way you face uncertainty?

Prayer

Father, thank You that You are faithful in protection. Thank You for watching over me in ways I can see and in ways I cannot. Thank You for guarding my life, strengthening my heart, and protecting my soul from the evil one. Forgive me for the times I have lived in fear instead of faith. Teach me to rest under Your care and to walk with confidence in Your keeping power. Place Your hand upon my life, my family, and those I love. Guard our going out and our coming in, and help us remember that our safety is ultimately found in You. You are my refuge, my shield, and my faithful Defender. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Day 34 — April 14

Faithful In Calling Ordinary People

Key Scripture

1 Corinthians 1:26–29 (NASB)

“For consider your calling, brothers and sisters, that there were not many wise according to the flesh, not many mighty, not many noble; but God has chosen the foolish things of the world to shame the wise, and God has chosen the weak things of the world to shame the things which are strong, and the insignificant things of the world and the despised God has chosen, the things that are not, so that He may nullify the things that are, so that no human may boast before God.”

Supporting Scripture

Exodus 4:10–12 (NASB)

“Then Moses said to the Lord, ‘Please, Lord, I have never been eloquent, neither recently nor in time past, nor since You have spoken to Your servant; for I am slow of speech and slow of tongue.’ But the Lord said to him, ‘Who has made the human mouth? Or who makes a person unable to speak, or deaf, or able to see, or blind? Is it not I, the Lord? Now then go, and I Myself will be with your mouth, and instruct you in what you are to say.’”

Devotional Thought

One of the most encouraging truths in Scripture is that God delights in calling ordinary people to accomplish extraordinary purposes. He is not limited to the gifted, the polished, the powerful, or the impressive. Again and again, the Lord reaches for people who feel unqualified, overlooked, weak, and inadequate. And in doing so, He displays the greatness of His own faithfulness.

Moses stuttered. Gideon was fearful. David was the youngest. Amos was a herdsman. Peter was a fisherman. Matthew was a tax collector. The disciples were not the elite of their day. Yet God called them, used them, and worked through them in ways that made it unmistakably clear that the power belonged to Him.

That is how God often works. If He only used the naturally strong, people might trust in talent. If He only called the obviously gifted, people might praise human ability. But when God chooses ordinary people and accomplishes uncommon things through them, He gets the glory. His faithfulness becomes the story.

Many believers spend too much time disqualifying themselves. “I am not educated enough.” “I am not eloquent enough.” “I am too broken.” “I do not have the right background.” “Surely God could use someone else better than me.” But God has never been dependent on human impressiveness. He is looking for availability, surrender, humility, and faith. The issue is not whether you are enough. The issue is whether He is. And He is.

God does not call people because they are naturally sufficient. He calls them because He is faithful. He supplies what He demands. He strengthens whom He sends. He equips whom He appoints. His call is always joined to His presence. When He says, “Go,” He also says, “I will be with you.”

That means your weaknesses do not have to become your excuse. They can become the very stage on which God displays His strength. Your ordinary life is not a barrier to His purpose. In the hands of a faithful God, ordinary people become instruments of eternal impact.

Do not underestimate what God can do through one yielded life. The God who called shepherds, fishermen, and reluctant leaders is still calling people today. He is faithful in calling ordinary people.

Illustration

A master craftsman does not need expensive tools to create something beautiful. In skilled hands, even simple tools can produce remarkable work. The value is not ultimately in the tool, but in the one who holds it.

That is true of us. Left to ourselves, we are limited. But in the hands of God, ordinary lives can become powerful instruments for His purposes. The miracle is not that the tool is impressive. The miracle is that the Master is faithful.

Reflection

1. In what ways have you felt too ordinary or unqualified for what God may be asking of you?
2. What excuses have you been giving that may actually reveal a lack of trust in God's faithfulness?
3. How does it encourage you to remember the kinds of people God used throughout Scripture?
4. What step of obedience might God be calling you to take today, trusting that He will equip you?

Prayer

Father, thank You that You are faithful in calling ordinary people. Thank You that You do not wait for me to become impressive before You use me. Forgive me for the times I have focused more on my weakness than on Your strength. Help me to trust that when You call, You also equip. Give me courage to obey, humility to depend on You, and faith to believe that You can work through my life for Your glory. Take what seems small, ordinary, and insufficient in me, and use it for Your great purposes. Let my life point not to my ability, but to Your faithfulness. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Day 35 — April 15

Faithful In Restoring The Broken

Key Scripture

Psalm 147:3 (NASB)

“He heals the brokenhearted
And binds up their wounds.”

Supporting Scripture

Joel 2:25–26 (NASB)

“Then I will make up to you for the years
That the swarming locust has eaten,
The creeping locust, the stripping locust, and the gnawing locust,
My great army which I sent among you.
You will have plenty to eat and be satisfied,
And you will praise the name of the Lord your God,
Who has dealt wondrously with you;
Then My people will never be put to shame.”

Devotional Thought

Few things in life feel more final than brokenness. A shattered heart, a ruined season, a fractured relationship, a moral failure, or a dream that collapsed can leave a person wondering whether anything whole can ever come again. But Scripture reveals a God whose faithfulness is not intimidated by wreckage. He is faithful in restoring the broken.

God does not turn away from shattered lives. He moves toward them. He is near to the wounded, attentive to the crushed, and merciful toward those who know they cannot put themselves back together. What is broken in our hands is not beyond repair in His.

Psalm 147 says He heals the brokenhearted and binds up their wounds. That is tender language. God is not harsh with the hurting. He is not careless with pain. He does not rush the healing process, but neither does He abandon it. He binds wounds carefully. He restores patiently. He works with compassion and power at the same time.

Sometimes the brokenness comes through suffering done to us. Sometimes it comes through sin committed by us. Sometimes it is a painful mixture of both. But in either case, the faithfulness of

God remains. He is able to restore what sin damaged, what grief crushed, what betrayal fractured, and what years seemed to waste away. Joel's promise reminds us that God can make up for years the locusts have eaten. That does not mean the past never happened. It means the past does not get the final word.

Restoration is one of the signatures of God's faithfulness. He restores joy after sorrow, usefulness after failure, hope after despair, and praise after long seasons of emptiness. Peter denied Christ, yet Jesus restored him. David fell deeply, yet God did not cast him off. Naomi returned empty, yet the Lord filled her story with redemption. This is what God does. He takes what appears ruined and writes grace all over it.

That does not mean restoration is always instant. Some healing comes slowly. Some rebuilding takes time. Some scars remain as reminders of where grace met us. But delayed restoration is not denied restoration. The God who begins healing is faithful to continue it.

Perhaps today you feel bruised, ashamed, exhausted, disappointed, or spiritually worn thin. Bring that brokenness to the Lord. Do not hide your wounds from the One who can heal them. Do not assume the ruined places of your life are useless. In the hands of a faithful God, broken things are often the very places where His glory shines brightest.

He is faithful in restoring the broken.

Illustration

A skilled restorer can take an old, cracked, neglected piece of furniture and patiently bring it back to beauty and usefulness. What others would throw away, the restorer sees differently. He notices what it can become, not just what it has been. He strips away decay, repairs damage, strengthens weak places, and brings out beauty that had long been hidden.

So it is with God. He does not discard broken people. He restores them. He sees beyond the damage, beyond the loss, beyond the shame. His faithful hands do not merely patch us up; they redeem, renew, and make us useful again.

Reflection

1. What broken area of your life most needs God's restoring touch right now?
2. Have you been hiding your wounds from God, or honestly bringing them before Him?
3. How have you seen God bring healing or redemption out of painful seasons in the past?
4. What would it look like for you to trust God's restoring work, even if the process is slow?

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Prayer

Father, thank You that You are faithful in restoring the broken. Thank You that You do not turn away from my wounds, my failures, or my grief. Thank You that You are near to the brokenhearted and that nothing in my life is beyond Your healing touch. I bring You every shattered place in me—the pain, the regret, the disappointment, and the loss.
