Holy Fire in Dark Places

The phrase “*Mississippi Burning*” was born out of one of the darkest seasons in Mississippi’s history. It became associated with hatred, violence, fear, injustice, division, and racial darkness. The image of a state burning carried the symbolism of chaos, destruction, and human corruption unleashed without restraint. Fire became the picture of anger, conflict, and devastation.

When Moses encountered God in the wilderness, it was through a bush that burned yet was not consumed: “And the angel of the Lord appeared unto him in a flame of fire out of the midst of a bush.” — Exodus 3:2

The fire revealed a holiness that could not be approached casually: “Put off thy shoes from off thy feet, for the place whereon thou standest is holy ground.” — Exodus 3:5

Yet the bush was not destroyed. This is one of the mysteries of holy

violence, fear, gangs, addiction, manipulation, rage, hopelessness, and spiritual darkness. Men arrive wounded, angry, broken, afraid, intoxicated with pride, shaped by chaos.
