This powerful message confronts us with a challenging question: Are we consumers of Christianity or consecrated followers of Christ? Drawing from Luke 7:36-50, we encounter the profound story of a woman with a sinful past who crashes a Pharisee's dinner party to worship Jesus. Her brokenness is on full display as she weeps over His feet, wipes them with her hair, and pours expensive perfume on them. This wasn't about earning salvation—it was about authentic surrender. The contrast between her extravagant love and Simon the Pharisee's cold hospitality reveals two approaches to faith: one rooted in religious duty, the other in desperate devotion. Jesus makes it clear that her many sins were forgiven because she loved much, while those who think they need little forgiveness love little. The message challenges our American tendency to approach faith as consumers, looking for what God can do for us rather than living as broken vessels poured out for Him. We're reminded that God is not just a giver of grace but also a consuming fire who demands holiness. The call isn't to perfect performance but to passionate pursuit—to be so undone by our unworthiness and so amazed by His mercy that we become undignified in our worship. Are we willing to be broken like that alabaster jar, releasing the fragrance of devotion regardless of who's watching?
