In what ways might we be like the Israelites who compromised with foreign nations instead of fully obeying God, and what areas of our lives need complete surrender?

The lepers said 'we're not doing right' when they kept the good news to themselves. What keeps us from sharing the gospel with others despite having experienced God's salvation?

How does the warning that cowardice is listed among sins in Revelation 21 challenge our reluctance to speak up for our faith in difficult situations?

What does it mean practically to seek first the kingdom of God rather than running after things like the pagans do, especially in our consumer-driven culture?

The sermon mentions that fine linen represents the righteous acts of the saints. How should this understanding shape the way we prepare ourselves as the bride of Christ?

How have we as the church conformed to the pattern of this world rather than being transformed by the renewing of our minds, and what needs to change?

Why do you think we tend to cry out to God when we're hurting but live independently when things are going well, and how can we maintain consistent dependence on Him?

What does it mean that God is our King rather than government or any human authority, and how should this affect our daily decisions and priorities?

If Jesus could return at any moment, how would living with that anticipation change the way you spend your time, resources, and relationships today?
