How does the command in Amos 5:14 to 'seek good, not evil' challenge the small sins and compromises we tolerate in our daily lives?

In what ways might American Christianity reflect the religious festivals and assemblies that God despised in Amos 5:21-23, and how can we ensure our worship is genuine?

What does it mean practically to live as 'foreigners and exiles' in modern culture while still submitting to earthly authorities as described in 1 Peter 2?

How can we show proper respect to everyone, including those we strongly disagree with, while still standing firm on biblical truth?

When have you brought offerings to God while knowing you were taking sin back with you, and what would true repentance look like in that situation?

What is the difference between seeking validation from others and truly submitting yourself before God, and how does this impact your spiritual walk?

How does reflecting on Christ's suffering and wounds change the way you view your own sinful desires and the cost of your salvation?

What does it mean to 'die to sins and live for righteousness' in concrete, daily actions rather than just as a theological concept?

Are you more focused on maintaining a minimal Christianity or actively bearing fruit that lasts, and what needs to change in your life to align with Jesus' command?

How can we as a church community move from gathering to worship inside these walls to actively discipling the lost within ten miles of where we sit?
