This powerful message challenges us to examine the uncomfortable intersection of faith and greed, asking a question that cuts to the heart of our spiritual lives: Are we rich toward God? Drawing from Luke 12, we're confronted with Jesus's stark warning to be on guard against all kinds of greed, followed by the parable of the rich fool who stored up earthly treasures but died before he could enjoy them. The central tension here isn't about whether we tithe or give occasionally—it's about whether we've truly surrendered our resources, our plans, and our futures to God's purposes. We're reminded that our life doesn't consist in the abundance of our possessions, yet how often do we live as if it does? The passage forces us to wrestle with difficult questions: Who will get what we've prepared for ourselves? Have we sent anything ahead to heaven? Are we making eternal investments or just earthly ones? This isn't about guilt or manipulation—it's about recognizing that everything we have, from our breath to our bank accounts, comes from God's hand. The call here is to move beyond comfortable Christianity into a faith that actually transforms how we view and use what God has entrusted to us, especially in sharing with those in need.
