In what ways do we treat Jesus as Savior in crisis moments but fail to honor Him as Lord in everyday decisions, particularly in areas like voting, finances, or relationships?

The armor of God is described as essential, not optional. Which piece of spiritual armor do you most often neglect to put on, and what are the consequences in your life?

How does the story of Moses, Aaron, and Hur holding up Moses' arms challenge our individualistic approach to faith and ministry?

What does it mean practically to be a watchman on the wall in your specific context, whether at work, home, or in your community?

The sermon states that our legacy is measured not only in what we build but how we strengthen others. What legacy are you currently building, and does it reflect this biblical priority?

How do we reconcile the call to humble surrender with the simultaneous call to bold, armored readiness and spiritual warfare?

In what areas of your life have you chosen comfort over obedience, and what would it look like to 'stop petting lions' in those specific situations?

The message challenges us to vote and make decisions based on biblical alignment rather than personal benefit. How does this principle apply to

other areas where faith and culture intersect?
