

## 2026-06-24 Discussion Questions

How can we discern the difference between being confidently assured of our salvation in Christ and being presumptuously comfortable with sin in our lives?

In what ways might we be like the Israelites in Amos, believing we are godly while remaining unaware of those around us who need help or of areas where we have stopped truly seeking the Lord?

The pastor mentioned that God's kindness leads us to repentance. How does understanding both God's love and His discipline help us grow in holiness rather than taking His grace for granted?

Samson repeatedly compromised his vows and convictions in small ways before his ultimate fall. What small compromises might we be making that could lead to greater spiritual weakness over time?

How does the concept of forgiveness as an ongoing act, forgiving seventy times seven, challenge our natural tendency to harbor resentment, and what freedom might we experience by releasing others repeatedly?

The sermon contrasts seeking God versus seeking for ourselves. What practical steps can we take to ensure we are truly seeking God's kingdom first in our daily decisions and priorities?

How does the image of God standing by the altar in Amos, knowing He would one day become the sacrifice Himself, deepen our understanding of His justice and mercy working together?

Hebrews 10 warns about deliberately continuing in sin after receiving knowledge of the truth. How do we honestly evaluate whether we are growing in holiness or becoming comfortable with patterns of sin?

What does it mean to strengthen our feeble arms and weak knees spiritually, and what specific disciplines or practices might God be calling

you to embrace for spiritual strengthening?

Caleb asked for the mountains in his old age, remaining vigorous in faith. What mountains is God calling you to tackle that require renewed dependence on His strength rather than settling for easier plains?
