In what ways might we be guilty of praying like King Ahab, telling God what we want Him to do rather than seeking His will?

What does it mean practically to pray 'not my will, but yours be done' when we desperately want a specific outcome?

How can we develop the discernment that Jehoshaphat displayed when he sensed something was wrong despite 400 prophets speaking in agreement?

Why do you think God allowed a lying spirit to deceive Ahab's prophets, and what does this reveal about divine judgment and human responsibility?

What is the difference between a prophet who speaks what people want to hear versus one like Micaiah who speaks only what God says?

How does the contrast between Jehoshaphat's wholehearted commitment to God and his father Asa's incomplete obedience speak to the importance of finishing well?

When we analyze our prayer lives, what percentage would we honestly say is about our needs versus seeking God's perspective and will?

What are the dangers of forming alliances or partnerships with those who claim to follow God but whose hearts are not fully committed to Him?

How can we cultivate the humility to wait silently before God for His answer rather than filling every moment with our own words and requests?
