

What does it look like to truly follow Christ beyond the moment of salvation? That question sits at the heart of this powerful message drawn from Mark chapter 6, where Jesus sends his twelve disciples out two by two with nothing but the clothes on their backs and a command to preach, heal, and drive out evil. The disciples had watched Jesus work miracles, heard his teachings, and walked closely beside him, yet the moment he sent them out on their own, they had to confront a defining question we all face: do we trust that what God has placed in us is enough to do what he is asking of us? The spiritual lesson here cuts deep. Following Christ was never designed to be a passive experience. It was always meant to move us from observation into action, from receiving grace into participating in something far greater than ourselves. There is a kind of faith that believes Jesus can do anything, yet quietly hopes he will not ask us to do anything. This message challenges that comfortable posture and invites us into the kind of obedience that feels impossible until we take the first step and discover we were never meant to take it alone.
