

What does it truly mean to be a worker in God's harvest field? This message pulls us into one of the most convicting tensions in the Christian life: the gap between what we know we ought to do and what we actually do. Drawing from Mark 6 and Matthew 9, we are confronted with the reality that Jesus looked out at crowds of harassed and helpless people and felt a gut-level compassion for them. His response was not to do it all himself, but to turn to his followers and say, the harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Then he did something even more striking. He sent his disciples out with nothing, no bread, no money, no extra clothing, only authority and a mission. This passage challenges us to ask an honest question: are there areas of our lives where God is unable to move because of our lack of faith? The disciples were not sent because they were fully prepared or naturally gifted. They were sent because the harvest demanded it. That same call echoes into our everyday lives, whether we are sitting in a restaurant, spending time at a lake, or simply going about our routines. The harvest is not somewhere far away. It is all around us, and we are the workers being called into it.
