JAMES CHAPTER 5 – STUDY QUESTIONS (Questions from "Joyful Life" – C. C. Costa Mesa, Kay Smith)

## **READ – JAMES CHAPTER 5**

1. We are appalled at the behavior of the people in James 5:1-6. What sins does this passage warn us to avoid? Why?
2. James uses the illustration of a farmer (husbandman) to emphasize his exhortation in verse 7a. BEHOLD – pause and intensely gaze – at the farmer. What parallels do you find between the farmer waiting for the harvest and the Christian's patience (longsuffering) in waiting for the LORD's return?
3. Connect Galatians 6:9 with James 5:8a. What is the challenge and the promise?
4. What do you recall from the following verses that prompts you to obedience to James 5:9.
a. James 1:26
h James 2:9h

c. James 2:12
d. James 4:11, 12
5. James 5:11a indicates that there are blessings in trials. How does James 1:2, 12 confirm this?
6. By the opening words of James 5:12, "But above all," we are clued into the importance of the instruction in this verse. What are we:
a. Not to do –
b. To do –
c. Why? –
7. Afflicted more literally means to suffer misfortune, experience what is bad, but primarily here it means to endure hardship; experience misfortune or calamity; trouble. It does not here indicate physical suffering, but mental or emotional heartache. Think about what you do when you are afflicted. What are some of the things a person is prone to do rather than pray?
a. What does James 5:13a tell us to do?
b. What instruction did Jesus give in Luke 18:1b?

8. If a Christian is sick, what does James 5:14 say we are to do?
9. As an example of fervent prayer, read Colossians 4:12. How is Epaphras described in
this verse? What do you learn about prayer from his example?
10. What is our responsibility when we see a believer wandering from the truth (James 5:19-20)? What does Galatians 6:1 add to this?
