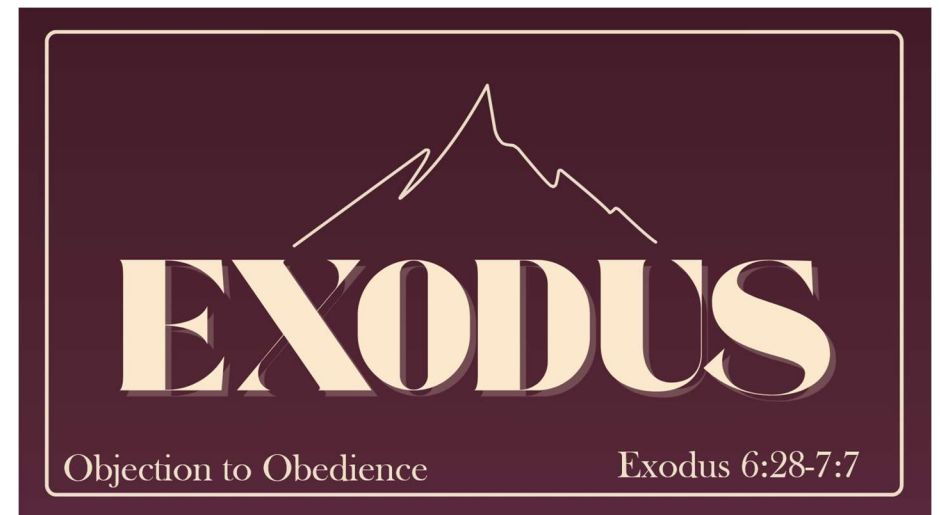


## Vs. 6-7 – Moses and Aaron Obeyed God's Command

1. Think about the idea that God is more concerned about what He does *in you* than what He does *through you*. How does that reframe the way you think about your own calling or season of life?
2. Often we desire "microwave" growth when God uses a "crockpot" approach. Where in your spiritual life do you feel impatient with how slowly God seems to be working?
3. How does surrendering our objections to God and choosing to walk in obedience help us grow?
4. What is one area where God may be calling you to move from objection to obedience right now? What would the next step look like?

**Read Exodus 6:28-7:7 – After his initial meeting with Pharaoh didn't go as Moses planned, he again voiced his objection regarding the calling God had given him. Moses will eventually submit to God's plan even though it means facing his own insecurity. Pharaoh will discover that God will use him for a purpose whether he submits or not.**

1. Think of a time you hesitated to do something you knew you God was telling you to do. What was your biggest "objection"? How did it turn out?

### Vs.28-30 – Moses' Insecurity Caused Him to Question God's Calling

---

1. Moses kept repeating the same objection — that he was "of uncircumcised lips." Why do you think we return to the same insecurities even after God has already answered them?
2. What does Moses' insecurity reveal about how we often view ourselves versus how God sees us?
3. Moses magnified his own insecurity about his ability to speak to the point that his disability loomed larger than God's ability. Where in your own life have you let a personal weakness feel bigger than God's power?
4. What do we learn about God's patience and character in how He deals with Moses' objections?
5. Read Ephesians 3:20. How does this verse challenge the way you view your limitations?

### Vs. 1-2 – Moses was God's Vessel to Use How He Saw Fit

---

1. God used Moses in ways that were "far more difficult and far more glorious" than Moses expected. How have you experienced God using you differently than you planned or expected?
2. How do you typically respond when God's plan turns out to be harder than you expected?
3. In what ways might you be trying to control *how* God uses you rather than simply being available?
4. Read 2 Corinthians 4:7–10. What does it mean practically to be a "jar of clay"? How does weakness actually point people to God?

### Vs. 3-5 – God Gave Pharaoh Over to a Hard Heart

---

1. There is a difference between God *forcing* Pharaoh to harden his heart versus God *allowing* Pharaoh to have what he chose. Why does that distinction matter?
2. Romans 1:24–25 describes God "giving people over" to their desires. What warning does this carry for us in our daily choices?
3. "Far more frightening than God not giving someone what they want can be God *giving* them what they want when they are in rebellion against Him." Why is this such a dangerous place to be?
4. Exodus 7:5 describes what the result of Pharaoh's rebellion would be. How does this show that God's purposes will be fulfilled no matter what?
