

THE PERFECT MEDIATOR

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For there is one God and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself as a ransom for all men the testimony given in its proper time. — 1 Timothy 2:5-6

We do not need to have another human, no matter how mighty, pious, or special, to intercede for us before God. As God's children, we can go freely, knowing that God himself has provided the perfect mediator and intercessor between himself and us. That mediator is the Son, who is head of the Church, one with God himself, and our High Priest interceding before God on our behalf. O God, You are God, and I praise You for the incredible gift of access to Your presence. Left to myself, I have no righteousness, no strength, no worthiness to come before You. Yet in Your grace, You made a way. You provided the ransom for my sin through Jesus, making me clean and holy in Your sight. And even more, You gave me a Mediator—Your Son—who not only died for me but now stands at Your side, interceding on my behalf. Jesus, thank You for paying the price and for continually speaking for me before the Father. Because of You, I can come boldly, not in fear, but in confidence and gratitude.

Today, I rest in this truth: I am welcomed, heard, and loved—not because of who I am, but because of who You are and what You have done.
