Icebreaker:

Share something good that happened this week, something hard or something you didn't like from this week, and something you are looking forward to in the coming weeks.

Discussion Questions:

1. Read all of Habakkuk: Habakkuk begins by asking God why He seems to tolerate injustice (Hab. 1:2–4). What do Habakkuk's questions teach us about bringing our doubts and frustrations to God?

2. What kinds of injustice—whether personal, local, or global—tempt you to ask, "God, where are You?"

How can Habakkuk encourage us in those moments?

3. Habakkuk 2 reminds us that God sees evil, acts in His timing, and will ultimately bring justice. How does knowing that God's justice is certain—even if delayed—change the way we respond today?

4. Read Habakkuk 2:4: "The righteous shall live by his faith." What do you think it means to live by faith while waiting for God to act?

What does that look like in everyday life?

5. Compare Habakkuk's attitude in chapter 1 with his prayer and worship in chapter 3. What changed?

What does this tell us about the power of prayer and encountering God?

6. Habakkuk ends by rejoicing in God even if the crops fail and everything is lost (Hab. 3:17–19). What would it look like for you to trust God even when your circumstances don't improve?

7. Is there an area of your life where you've been focused more on the injustice around you than on the character of God?

What is one practical way you can "call upon an extraordinary God" this week instead of relying only on your own perspective?
