



Dear Pastor Pyle and Members of First Lutheran Church:



Our History

A meeting of the Swedes in Amery to organize an Evangelical Swedish Lutheran Church took place on April 4, 1892. The meeting opened with song, bible readings, discourse, and prayer by Pastor A. Bengston.

The following announced themselves as Charter Members:

A. J. Staffenson and wife G. M. Staffenson and wife P. A. Staffenson and wife W. J. Bennon and wife Peter Nelson and wife Swan Patterson and wife A. J. Johnson and wife Ed Asberg and wife C. A. Staffenson

The church was named Swedish Evangelical Lutheran Ebenezer Congregation. Any who applied for membership within two weeks would be accepted as charter members.

The congregation applied to Balsam Church with a request that Pastor C. J. Youngberg would visit. Dues were set at \$5.00 for a family, \$3.00 for a man, and \$2.00 for a woman. Also, the congregation demanded entrance in the conference and synod fellowship at the next annual meeting.

G. M. Staffenson was chosen as representative to the conference and A. J. Staffenson as substitute. Also elected was C. A. Staffenson as secretary for a year. A prayer closed the meeting.

At a special meeting on October 12, 1892, several things were decided. The congregation would join the one in Balsam with the right to maintain their own teacher, and the congregations would build a church. A committee would be chosen to acquire a lot. Another committee would be formed to take up subscriptions (a pledge type system) to build the church.

Annual meetings always began with devotions and an election of a chairman. At that first annual meeting of "little" Ebenezer on January 14, 1893, much time was spent on building concerns. They preferred a corner lot on which to build and would meet in Charles Manson's home for the time being. Each church service should bring in \$85 with \$3.00 going to the pastor.

Two extra meetings were held in 1894 to discuss possibly buying a roller skating rink that was for sale. It was decided that it was "too long, too low, and too small." They also requested joining with Balsam in calling a pastor, but

could not pay more than \$100.

In 1895 we get a flavor for how people served the church. Trustees were appointed for 3, 2, and 1 year terms. The caretaker was elected for one year and paid by an offering Christmas Day or some other church holiday. The organist position was for one year and was paid in the same fashion. Auditors and Sunday School teachers were also elected for one year. Sunday School was taught in Swedish and the pastor came every fourth Sunday. His pay was \$1.00 a time or \$100 yearly.

In 1896, besides the usual elected positions, a subscription committee was added and, along with a "free will" offering there would be no set dues needed.

It was decided to join the Chisago district in the Minnesota Conference, but they requested a pastor visit one Sunday every other month with some weekly visits between. All pastor's costs would be paid.

This was the year Ebenezer decided to rent to the Norwegians. It was for one year for \$25 and the Swedes would warm the church and provide the lighting. A schedule was worked out and the situation continued for many years.

Starting in 1897, we find Ebenezer supporting the Swedish Gustavus Adolphus College because the pastor sometimes would attend. They applied for "student help" during busy Advent and Lenten seasons. They also had to face finding a new cemetery and had to sell their building in order to build their new church. The Norwegians were behind in their rent that year.

The building was sold to the school for \$600 in 1898. They would build a church in block 8, lots 11 and 12. The lots were purchased for \$100. Even though Ebenezer wanted to join with the Clayton and share a pastor, the District said that Amery, Clayton, and Star Prairie were to form an alliance.

Over the next few years they reverted back to dues, Sunday school teachers were still elected, and women could now teach. The women were also important in budgetary matters. The Ladies Aid raised money regularly for the Building and running of the church.

The building took up a lot of time of the members in 1899. They took great pride in their accomplishments.

The church now actively reported on members who were not acting in a Christian manner, periodically "striking" people from the rolls. Dues still fluctuated and the Norwegians needed occasional prompting to pay their rent. Ebenezer had to quite regularly ask "meekly" for help from the Minnesota Conference to pay the pastor's salary, though they did not always get it. They had furnace problems. They wallpapered and had money-raisers such

as ice cream socials. They also had festivals such as their Fourth of July service. The children would give declamations at Christmas festivals. A basket social was held during the summer to celebrate their church family.

Ebenezer decided to share a parsonage with Clayton and Star Prairie.

In 1905, dues for Ebenezer's members were \$5.00 for a man and wife, \$2.00 for a boy and \$1.00 for a girl. Church income and expenses that year totaled \$490.85 and the pastor's salary was \$250.

People requesting membership must be certified, or if they accepted the synod's constitution, confessed to the creed, and were not members of secret societies or lodges, they were welcomed in membership. They would share both the "strife and the victories of the church."

The children's Christmas Program was discussed by the council each year. The date set in 1905 was December 25 with 10¢ admission charged. Special ushers were always chosen. The trustees usually provided the tub of apples and sacks of candy and peanuts. Decoration responsibilities were decided.

Trustees had a wide range of responsibilities to "take care of things in general." Of course, this included keeping wood on hand.

If members continued in arrears for payment of dues, council decisions led to dropping their names from the rolls.

Swedish summer school was held for four to six weeks at the public school building. The teacher was often obtained from Gustavus Adolphus College.

The ladies and young people were active and contributed financially to the church. By 1909 the choir and Sunday School teachers also received a recognition of thanks. The organists from 1905 to 1911 were the pastors' wives. They received \$25 and an offering. By 1911 the salary was \$40. The "guardian" or janitor received \$25 and an offering.

Often a student from "our dear school in St. Peter," Gustavus Adolphus, was called on to assist the pastor with the "pressure of Christmas activities" in the congregations of the parish. Salary for this was usually a "good offering".

Among decisions made in 1905 were stalls to be built for horses on the north side and trees to be planted on the south side. The council decided the times of day and number of tolls the new bell should be rung. It was decided to install electricity in 12 lamps in the church.

Over the years 1906-1911, Ebenezer "humbly" re-

quested money from the conference to help pay the "leader's" salary and go toward the debt. This amount ranged from \$100 to \$250 over these years.

In 1907, Pastor Gustafson's annual report stated that church services and communion opportunities (usually around five times a year) were well attended with young people being the most diligent. He traced the reason for this to their Swedish summer schooling. In January of 1907 there were 121 members, 67 of voting age.

Sometimes the church had to deal with a wayward member. One male member had been talked to and warned for drinking. He had promised to improve. Unfortunately he "has continued to become drunk and to swear, etc." It was decided to call him to appear before the church council on March 11, 1907, at 7 p.m. That Christmas he was appointed usher for the Sunday School program! By January, 1908, council members called on this member to "lay on his heart the dishonor he puts on the church with his drinking and life of sin". In May, 1908, he was called on again. The council again pointed out how sinful and harmful to himself, his family, and his church his drinking was. He admitted his life was not as it should be and promised to do better. The council expressed to him that the only way to improve was to turn to God to save himself. On December 17, 1908, the council discussed how this member had been warned time and again about his drinking and swearing but continued his annoying way of life. He was struck from the church rolls.

In 1908, pastor's report included reference to a "materialistic self-centered item." A scolding was given to sinners. Dancing and drinking were condemned.

A Fourth of July festival as well as a mission fest for "Chinese Heathens" was to be held. The congregation was thankful that some of their festivals could be held at J. G. Burman's hall.

The council decided to promote wider reading of the synod's newspapers *Augustana and China Missions*.

Since Pastor Gustafson had been called to another parish, the new pastor's report of 1910 included his conclusions that "those brought up in our church were most devoted to church attendance, but many women fail to show up." He reported 46 children attended Sunday School.

A call was sent out to farmers to bring in stones to reinforce the basement walls.

Delegates to district, conference, and synod meetings were chosen as usual. Ebenezer joined the Apple River district. The trustees bought half a lot at \$40 for stable construction.

Joint meetings had been held in Clayton and Amery to choose the new pastor and decide his salary. Immanuel and Ebenezer paid \$400 and former Pastor Gustafson's house was rented for a parsonage.

In 1911 it was decided to jointly purchase the parsonage.

Pastor Andren reported his concerns about Sunday School attendance. He stated that most members are wellbehaved Christians, but some are going to the theater and

dancing. Drinking is a problem, "God help us." Seventeen children were confirmed the previous year.

The young people had purchased a picture for the altar and also gave \$50 toward pews. The Ladies Aid donated the rest. The pews were ordered at \$190.

Dues in 1911 were \$8.00 for a family, \$5.00 per young man and \$3.00 for a young woman with half dues if under eighteen. Summer Swedish School continued.

During the years of 1912-1920 the struggle of the young church continued. In a written report, Pastor Andren referred to the congregation as "Little, Fighting Ebenezer Church of Amery."

The congregation struggled in their relationship with their sister congregation, Immanuel of Clayton. There was tremendous effort expended to increase attendance, attend communion and bring children to Sunday School. There was a struggle to get members to pay their dues. The young church needed financial help from all their members in order to continue the work.

During these years, there was concern for the youth of the church. With school and jobs, they were poor in attending and participating in the youth group. There was concern because many were fraternizing with young people of other nationalities.

Drinking continued to be a problem area. At that time there was a movement in Amery to close down the bars, and Ebenezer made a stand in support of that movement.

In spite of the struggle, little Ebenezer continued to grow and make progress. Total membership in 1912 was 127 and by 1920 there were 135 members, 87 of whom were communicants.

Together with Immanuel of Clayton, Ebenezer church purchased a parsonage. Amery businessmen also donated to the cause, and the debt was paid in five years. A new organ was purchased for \$137 plus trade-in of the old organ. In 1917 the congregation planned a twenty-fifth anniversary celebration with a speaker from Minneapolis invited to lead the service.

The salary for Pastor Andren stood at \$500 a year. Ruth Andren was the organist and was paid \$40 a year. The caretaker's salary was \$30 a year plus a special offering.


The ladies' group was active and several times it is mentioned that the church could not have survived and met its obligations without the financial support of the ladies. The total budget for the congregation was just over \$1,500 a year, and the ladies of the church contributed between \$300 and \$400 of that amount.

On several occasions the council requested financial aid from the Minnesota conference again in order to pay the Pastor's salary. Dues were \$10 a year and people were sent to collect from those in arrears. Members who did not pay were contacted and then dropped from the rolls for this reason. Requests for memberships were taken seriously and voted on at council meetings.


The Sunday School continued to operate with faithful teachers and usually around 35 students. The Sunday School year ran from the first Sunday in March until Christmas. The children's Christmas program continued to be held Christmas Day evening with admission charged and gifts and treats provided for the children. The Swedish School continued to be held until 1917 when it was dropped for lack of interest. Swedish classes were instituted again in 1920.

The decade of the twenties brought another kind of struggle for Ebenezer. That was the struggle with language. In 1923 the council voted to have an English afternoon service once a month. The Sunday School opening and closing was to alternate between Swedish and English. On the other hand, a Pastor Magney was granted permission to give a speech on Africa on the condition that he use the Swedish language.

A remodeling project for the parsonage was undertaken and was quickly completed with the help of volunteer labor. Fourth of July celebrations were still popular with the women serving a dinner and the pastor being in charge of the program. The Sunday School continued to be active and grew in numbers. The young people were very active and presented programs that were well attended. Ruth Andren led an orchestra that proved to be quite an attraction.

In 1921 the envelope system was instituted. In 1927 the church was remodeled and a basement put under it. In 1926 and 1927, Immanuel of Clayton and Ebenezer entered into a spirited conflict over the choosing of a new pastor. Finally, after calls to several pastors, Pastor M. A. Melford accepted the call to serve Ebenezer.

As the decade of the twenties came to a close, more and more familiar names begin to appear. A. R. Sjobeck is

listed as the church treasurer and the pastor announced he had received a certificate of membership from a Mrs. Stearns with "joy and gratitude."

During the decade of the 30's, First Lutheran was served by two clergymen, Pastor A. P. Almen and Pastor C. J. Karl. The council minute book for this era is missing so we have no detailed information for this period except for information in the Ladies Aid history.

The fiftieth anniversary of the church was in 1942 and was the year Pastor L. K. Anderson succeeded Pastor Karl. Mrs. Olga Sjobeck, organist, was appointed to be in charge of music the day of the anniversary celebration, September 20th. A. R. Sjobeck and Al Stenberg were appointed to take care of publicity. L. E. Bragstad, church secretary, was instructed to invite previous pastors to take part in the celebration. The minutes recorded a very successful day.

The 1943 Council members were: President A. R. Sjobeck, John G. Burman, John Froshaug, Elmer Olson, Herb Olson, Joe Hazelquist, Chas. Sjoblom, W. Lovegren, Gilbert Carlson and Dave Palmer.

An electric organ was purchased to replace the reed organ in 1943. The purchase arrangement was interesting. The organ was to be purchased through C. W. Stenberg, a merchant. He was to deliver the organ and the \$1,200 debt was to be paid at \$200 a year with payments starting in two vears!

Pastor Anderson, like previous pastors, served three churches; Amery, Clear Lake and Clayton. The church was assessed \$8.00 a member for the Augustana Synod's Centennial Celebration. The pastor's salary was raised \$10 a month for the next year.

The synod allocation for 1944 was \$273. Student pastors were hired to help during the summer months. Clear Lake started sharing a pastor with East Immanuel, leaving two churches for our pastor to serve. The council decided that they really should start payments on the organ! In response to an appeal to the members, money flowed in! The Ladies Aid contributed \$500; Nels Johnson, \$100; and A. R. Sjobeck, \$100; leaving \$500.

Because the pastor was shared, he served Amery with a 9:30 service and Clayton with an 11:00 service. Total church membership at this time was 142. The organist and sexton were paid yearly salaries of \$150. New council members that year were: Ira Lindgren, Dave Palmer and C. W. Stenberg.

In 1945, Art Sjobeck and Ira Lindgren, council members, were authorized to have a porch built over the front entry of the church. An anonymous donor paid up the balance of \$500 on the organ. A new electric range replaced the wood burning cookstove in the parsonage. New council members that year were: Arvid Nelson and Willie Nelson.

Church membership in 1946 was 186. A building fund was started with a \$25 memorial from Mrs. Lawrence Hedlund. The council set \$30,000 as a goal for the building fund.

Pledges were taken in May of 1947 for the building fund. The 55th anniversary of the church was celebrated. A fund drive to support our church college, Gustavus, netted \$970. New council members were: Palmer Sondreal and Lewis Bragstad.

The synod allocation in 1948 was \$498. Devotional books were ordered and distributed to the members. Pastor Anderson accepted a call to another church. Pastor Ander instructed our confirmands during the pastoral vacancy. New council members were: Chet Johnson and Palmer Theige.

Pastor Magnuson started serving our congregation in 1949. He was paid a salary of \$3,000. It was proposed that the church should have a new organ. A committee consisting of Wm. Rasmussen, Lester Sjobeck, Olga Sjobeck and Adele Stearns was selected. They were to accompany Pastor Magnuson to the Twin Cities to listen to and price electric and pipe organs. The congregation agreed to purchase a pipe organ and a fund drive was started. The first payment to the Moller Organ Company, \$489, was in August.

Council members at this time were: Chester Johnson, Palmer Theige, Herbert Olson, Willie Nelson, Palmer Sondreal, Arvid Nelson, Elmer Olson, Ira Lindgren, Gilbert Carlson and Lewis Bragstad. The Sunday School Superintendent was Ellie Johnson and the sexton, Chas. Sjoblom.

New council members in 1950 were Rolf Marck and Les Sjobeck. The council recommended to the congregation that a basement be added on the east side of the church. This proposal was discussed over a period of time. There was discussion on purchasing another site for the future building program. It was decided to remain on the same site and pledges were received in February of 1952 for a basement addition. At that time our congregation was supporting Lutheran World Action, Gustavus College and the synod. Mrs. John Edmond contributed \$300 to start a church library. The decision was made that it was time to have a full time pastor for our congregation. The Clayton Congregation was approached to merge with us, but they declined.

In 1953, Pastor Ander served as our vice pastor until

our new pastor, Clarence Seburg arrived. John Norman presented new offering plates in memory of his wife.

Because we were no longer sharing our pastor with Clayton, we were able to have two church services each Sunday during the summer of 1954 and thereafter. Our synod allocation that year was \$1,179.

The annual family picnic was held at the Wood Lake Bible Camp in the summer of 1955. Pastor Seburg accepted a call to another congregation and Pastor Trued of Balsam Church was our vice pastor in the interim. A call was issued to Pastor Marvin Johnson of Alcester, S.D. Tentative plans for a building program were discussed at the November meeting.

In January of 1956, the deacons attended church services in Pastor Johnson's church in Alcester. They recommended Pastor Johnson to our congregation, and he arrived in June. It was decided to sell the first parsonage, across the street from the church, and purchase the Watzke residence on Hyland Avenue.

In 1956, Otis Huset succeeded Elmer Olson as financial secretary, a position Elmer had served faithfully for over 15 years.

Pastor Johnson explained the need for an evangelism committee in 1957, and the following were appointed: Lewis Paulson, L. E. Bragstad, Henry Johnson, Olga Sjobeck, Pauline Larsen and Mrs. John Normand. The Stewardship committee included: Dr. Whitlark, D. K. Lien, Ira Lindgren, Glynn Nelson and O. K. Bergquist. The council voted to support Lutheran Welfare of Wisconsin, the Wood Lake Chapel Fund, Lutheran student work at the state colleges, Augustana Churchmen, Augustana missions and Gustavus. The next year's budget: \$13,900. The council members and appointed helpers made every member visit in 1958. The synod had revised the hymnal and 125 were purchased. A Sunday School Altar was given by Mrs. D. K. Lien and her sister, Mrs. Henry Folkerds, in memory of their father, L. E. Bragstad. There was talk of a possible merger with Our Savior's Congregation.

The following names of council members appeared in the minutes of the 50's. Les Sjobeck, Chet Johnson, Palmer Sondreal, Willie Nelson, Arvid Nelson, Rolf Marck, Elmer Olson, Ira Lindgren, Lewis Bragstad, Gilbert Carlson, Herb Olson, Palmer Theige, Fred Whitlark, D. K. Lien, Art Palmer, George Taylor, Alton Anderson, Richard Viken, John Burman, Milt Simon, Donald Johnson, Al Haney, Lewis Paulson, O. K. Bergquist and Glynn Nelson.

The 1959 council meetings were devoted to plans for a new church. They discussed the proposal to build elsewhere in the city, but decided to remain on the original site. Art Palmer was elected to serve as treasurer for the building fund and the council authorized the trustees to approve all bills before payment. In October of 1960, Cohn and Peterson were engaged as architects. A budget and finance plan were adopted that would net \$120,000 for the building fund by 1963,

In 1961 it was estimated that the church would cost \$135,000. Supply pastors were paid \$25 plus 5¢ a mile to serve Sundays during Pastor Johnson's vacation. The parsonage was redecorated with Walter Peterson doing the work.

The 70th Anniversary was celebrated in March of 1962. Mr. Stoll of Minneapolis was engaged to dismantle the old pipe organ and re-assemble it later in the new structure. The date for starting removal was set for April. The little white church was advertised for bids with removal set for May 1. The pews were sold to Apple River Church.



During the construction period, church was held at the Stenberg Mortuary. Church groups held their meetings at the Amery City Hall, the Congregational Church Fellowship Hall and the American Legion Hall. Bids were opened on March 27, 1962. The building was bid in at \$101,371.63; mechanical at \$23,487; electrical at \$10,371.63 by Kerwin Erickson of Amery. An additional \$20,000 was allowed for architectural fees, pews, altar, pulpit, communion rail, etc., for a total of \$155,158.63.

The new church was dedicated on April 28, 1963. A three year pledge program was set up to apply on the new debt. Since some extra payments had been made by members, retirement of payments were ahead of schedule. The stewardship chairman, Win Johnson, reported a successful response had netted \$15,300 for the general fund. It was a busy year with many decisions relative to curtains, carpet in the balcony, church sign on the south side and other fixtures.

Christmas in the new church was very special. The following were in charge of the program: JoAnn Johnson, Onilea Sondreal, Nancy Haselhorst, Catherine Johnson, Lavone Nielsen, Wilma Palmer, Ruth Jerdee and Adele Stearns.

Harvey Hanson was supply pastor for four Sundays in the Summer of 1964 while Pastor Johnson was on vacation. The balance due on the building fund was \$80,833 on the \$90,000 loan. The council authorized the construction of a redwood church sign on the south side of the church. Aluminum siding was installed on the parsonage. The Don Winchells took over the custodial duties.

Council members in 1965 were: President Jim Brackin, Dr. Harry Hansen, Dr. O. N. Arneson, Win Johnson, Art Palmer, and Ralph Hegg. Pastor Johnson accepted a call to Marshalltown, IA and Pastor Loberg accepted the call to Amery. Gary Park, Pastor of Balsam Lutheran, was our vice pastor in the interim. Mrs. Olga Sjobeck was sent a letter of appreciation for 30 years of teaching Sunday School. Gerry Bieniasz was financial secretary.

There were 370 adult members in 1966, and the number of family units was 227. The building loan balance was \$64,200.

Floyd Matson was sent a letter of appreciation for serving as Sunday School Superintendent. Norm Osero was the organist.

New members on the council in 1967 were: Paul Dzubay, Walt Olson, Floyd Matson and Les Gullickson. The other members were Jim Brackin, Ralph Hegg, Ralph Mickelson, Jack Larsen, Win Johnson, Jerry Carlson, Dave Johnson and D. K. Lien. The council considered carpeting the aisles of the church.

The 75th anniversary was celebrated May 28, 1967. The ladies groups, led by president Adele Stearns, and typist, Evelyn Dzubay, had prepared an anniversary book and a cookbook for the occasion. Special guests were Dr. Matson from the synod and the Reverend Norman Magnuson. The M & M Club started a nursery for the 10:30 service. The FLCW had a stand at the Amery Fall Festival. A tape recorded slide show of the activities of the church was produced. Lou Williamson received the Pro Deo et Patria Award. He was the first Boy Scout from our church to receive this honor. It is awarded for service to the church.

Council members in 1968 were: President Les Gullickson, Paul Dzubay, Dave Johnson, Jerry Carlson, Ralph Mickelson, Duane Kittel, Bob Lee, D. K. Lien, Floyd Matson, Jack Larsen and Jim Brackin. The building loan balance was \$53,261. The council voted \$25 to the fund to send the Amery High School Band to Winnipeg. The senior choir director was Clint Gjerde; the junior choir director was Catherine Johnson, the organist was Norm Osero; the Hi-League President was Terry Christopherson. Cottage meetings were held to promote the stewardship drive.

New council members in 1969 were Harold Pearson, Les Sjobeck, Elmer Nielson and Marlin Swanson. The head usher was Roy Gilbertson with Bill Nacey assisting. Another three year pledge period was conducted with \$22,000 pledged. The FLCW sponsored a Mother-Daughter Banquet on May 14th and a Father-Son Banquet on November 10th. The Hi-League attended a retreat at the Lutheran Bible Camp, and attended a Twins ball game. John Larsen received the Pro Deo et Patria Award.

Other members who served on the council in the 60's were: John Burman, Richard Viken, Lewis Paulson, Rolf Marck, O. K. Bergquist, Melvin Carlson, Al Haney, Vince Erickson, Harry Bodsberg and Ray Larsen.

Mrs. Ray Larsen was FLCW President in 1970 when they placed the ladies in work groups. A folk service was held in June with the youth participating in the writing of the liturgy and in the presentation. Dennis and Brad Nelson accompanied on guitar.

There were 361 adult members and 155 children on the church roll for a total of 536 members.

Chuck Williamson and Mark Larsen received the Pro Deo et Patria Award.

Pastor Loberg accepted a call to Wisconsin Rapids and Pastor Bingea became our vice pastor. Our congregation sent \$657 to the Carthage College Fine Arts Center. Pastor Nygaard joined us in 1971. Allan Anderson was the Sunday School Superintendent with Dr. Howard Fischer assisting. A contemporary service was held on November 21st.

The parsonage was sold in 1972 for \$21,000. Mr. and Mrs. Thornton Cole took over the custodial duties from the Doug Gundersons. The 80th Anniversary was celebrated with a dinner on April 9th. A tri-county Bible Conference was held in our church. Paul Bieniasz received the Pro Deo et Patria Award.

New floor covering was installed in the kitchen with funds from the FLCW. They also purchased six new folding tables. Pledges were received for the purchase of stained glass windows for the west side of the sanctuary.

The stained glass windows were installed in 1974. Steve Bieniasz earned the Pro Deo et Patria Award.

Ordination services were held for Gregg Stoddard on February 9th of 1975. New council members were: Elaine Meyers, Jon Buss and Jerry Carlson. Jeff Claussen received the Pro Deo et Patria Award the same year. On December 28th of 1975, the church mortgage was burned.

New council members, including a youth representa-

tive were: Bob Johansen, Wanda Johnson and Barbara Bieniasz, who represented the youth of the congregation. The junior choir presented a cantata on April 7th. The council approved starting of a food bank to be sponsored by the Couples Club. Fourteen members of the Hi-League, with the Nygaards as chaperones, journeyed to New Orleans for the national convention. The council voted to pay their airfare. The Hi-League members had raised \$1,700 in preparation for the trip, with bake sales and pancake breakfasts. Tom Nacey took care of the August 15th and 22nd services while Pastor Nygaard was on vacation. The council voted to pay for Tom Nacey's tuition at the NW Theological Seminary. The FLCW had a successful Fall Festival stand with a profit of \$257.

New members on the council in 1977 were: Phil Kluge, Bruce Johnson, Arild Matson and Roy Beecroft. The FLCW funded new suspended ceilings in the restrooms. There was discussion about purchasing the Burman property to the north of the church for a parking lot. The 85th anniversary of the church was celebrated with a special service and a dinner. Pastor Norman Magnuson returned to give the sermon and Pastor Marvin Johnson was present also. The west parking lot was blacktopped. Steve Dierke became the next recipient of the Pro Deo et Patria Award. Our first intern, Chip Bouzard, joined us on May 7th of 1978. The choir journeyed to Orchestra Hall in the Twin Cities, for musical entertainment. A program was initiated to take pictures of the members using a polaroid camera. The pictures were displayed on a bulletin board in the hallway. The hand rails were added next to the steps to the altar. Copies of the newly revised hymnals were ordered and it was decided to start using the second setting. The Velkommen Club volunteered to purchase the Christmas gifts for the Sunday School.

Irv Maas became the next custodian in 1979. A special offering was taken on July 8th for Luther Point Bible Camp. Kevin Trandum became the next scout to receive the Pro Deo et Patria Award. A new church sign was placed on Main Street, pointing the direction to First Lutheran.

Kathryn Herman, our second intern, joined our staff. The Hi-League served a chili supper on Ash Wednesday. The next Sunday School Superintendent was Judy Nygaard, who followed Kathy Krogh in that position. Other council members of the 70's not previously mentioned were: Paul Dzubay, Dr. Jack Larsen, Les Sjobeck, Les Gullickson, Elmer Nielsen, Duane Kittel, Vern Smith, Marlin Swanson, Floyd Matson, Ben Jacobson, Jim Dierke, Jim Yoder, Harold Pearson, Bob Lee, Roger Young, Dave Forrest, Arild Matson, Glen Clausen, and Jon Buss.

In 1980, Intern Robin Pierson was welcomed at a congregational dinner on September 7th. Gregg Dierke received the Pro Deo et Patria Award. Pastor Gustav Ander was honored on his 50th anniversary in the ministry. Seventeen youths attended Confirmation Camp at Luther Point. The pipe organ was upgraded to 10 ranks at a cost of \$36, 470. They began taping Sunday services for the shut-ins.

New council members in 1981 were: Bob Lee, Duane Wolden, Roger Smith and Sally Pickard. The church budget was \$80,000. An overhead projector was purchased for the Sunday School. An evergreen was planted in front of the church by the Velkommen Club with plans to decorate it each year at Christmas. The members who did the planting were Jim Brackin, Roland Mittelsdorf and Freedolph Wahlstrom. A full time financial secretary was hired to replace Mildred Johnson, who had served that

position for 18 years. Evelyn Dzubay retired after serving 25 years as church secretary. Evelyn and Mildred were honored at a coffee hour between services.

The synod convention representatives studied plans for a merger of the ALC, LCA, & AELC. Tom Nacey completed studies at the seminary and was ready for a call. Bulletins were used in the Sunday School on a trial basis for a short time and then discontinued. Jon Buss donated a much needed copy machine for the office. Our next intern, Tim Dusenberg, was welcomed on Rally Sunday, September 18th at a pot luck dinner. Katie Herman was ordained on August 30th.

Kathy Wiliamson took over the directing of the junior and senior choirs. Just in time for Christmas sales, the HI-League received their shipment of Christmas cards with a picture of the church on the cover.

Cushions for 8 pews were made in 1981 and at the same time, the material to finish the rest of the pews was purchased. The food pantry was reactivated. The council voted to take care of Diane Blahauvietz's seminary fuition.

New council members in 1982 were: Gary Ganje, Ray Norsted, Karen Christopherson and Erin Gjerde (youth). Tom Nacey was ordained in January and in April the 90th anniversary was held. A Scandinavian pot luck dinner followed the special church services. A collection of confirmation and church photos were on display. Don Clifford started his internship on September 1st and Neil Pickard was engaged as our youth director. Phyllis Espegard and Kori Swanson were the Sunday School Superintendents.

New Council members in 1983 were: Kay Erickson, Duane Espegard, Les Sjobeck and Mick Larsen. Ann Bergstrom was our next intern. Douglas Johnson was ordained.

Ceiling fans were installed in 1984 and the ramp from the Fellowship Hall to the Church level was installed. Funds from the D. K. Lien memorial were used to purchase junior choir robes.

The next year our intern was Dan Alexander. The Hi-League earned money to donate to Barneveld Lutheran Church, which had suffered tornado damage. Transportation was provided for both services and the PA system was upgraded. Dorothy Hochstettler completed cataloging materials in the church library. Al Stenberg donated a Wurlitzer Piano for the sanctuary in memory of his wife, Agnes. A Baldwin piano was purchased for the loft.

New council members in 1985 were: Dr. O. N. Arneson, Gerry Bieniasz and Julie Lindberg. First Lutheran was named beneficiary of the Anna Nelson will. Pastor Nygaard resigned on April 20th, and a dinner was held and recognition given for his 14 years of service. Pastor Lawrence Day was issued a call. Melissa Larsen was elected to be the youth member on the council.

The senior choir received new robes in 1986. Norm Osero was honored for 20 years of dedicated service as an organist. The Burman property to the north of the church was purchased for a parking lot.

New council members in 1987 were: Barry Clark, Vicki Ganje, Marvin Maxon and Kathy Timm. Rice Lake was established as our synod headquarters, with Bishop Gerhard Knutson in residence there. Dave Teig was selected as our youth director. Diane Blahauvietz was ordained here on June 28th. Audio tape ministry enabled shut-ins to receive the Sunday services.

A special program was initiated in 1988 called "Multiply your \$5.00 and bring it back tenfold". Those interested received their money in July to invest in money making activities. On Rally Sunday in September, the original \$5.00 and the profit earned were returned to be applied on the synod allocation. Louise Lundbeck's memorials were used to purchase new tables for the Fellowship Hall. New council members were: Dr. Q. N. Arneson, Colleen Fansler, Gary Taxdahl and Allan Stoddard. Others serving in the 80's were: Norm Osero, Richard Rehm and Arild Matson.

With our centennial just two years away, the board selected Dan Lien chairman of the activities. New Council members in 1989 were: Dr. Fred Whitlark, Sheryl Burkel and Mary Lou Swanson. The Velkommen Club researched

and ordered the lighted outdoor sign with funds from the Ira Lindgren memorials. Karen Christopherson started duties as the next church secretary. Pastor Day resigned to accept a call to Cross Lutheran in Roberts. Pastor Emil Dockter was named interim pastor.

New furnaces were purchased and the lighted sign was installed in 1990. New council members were: Kay Erickson, Clint Gjerde, Harold Munkholm and Jon Buss.

Pastors Wilbert Johnson and Emil Dockter were honored at a reception in recognition of 40 years in the ministry. The Sunday School Children raised \$900 with the Haiti Hunger Hike. The centennial committee announced plans to have at least one centennial event per month for the year preceding July 4, 1992. Dave Teig, our youth director, started attending seminary.

In 1991, Pastor Marcia Pyle accepted our call to serve our parish, and she was installed on May 19th. A centennial kick-off picnic was held at the home of the Terry Christophersons. In August an ice cream social and auction were held at the church and north parking lot. September activities included: the Fall Festival Stand hosted by Gene & Wanda Johnson and Marv and Donna Noha: a centennial float in the parade and the church replica was displayed in the parade and in the church. The planners and builders of the scale model were: Dave Bieniasz, Larry Nicholas, Clint Gjerde, Duane Kittel, Paul and Gene Johnson. October activities included: confirmation, a bazaar, a reformation play, a hay-ride/wiener roast and the youth sponsored chili supper. November activities were: All Saints Day observance, a Lutheran Men in Mission Banquet and a joint Thanksgiving Service with the Congregational Church members who are also celebrating their centennial. December was very busy with Soup/Song and Advent, Christmas Program, Adult Manger Scene, 8:00 a.m. "Come as you are" Christmas service on December 25th. New members of the council that year were: Darrel Nelson, Elaine Meyer and Bobbie Clausen.

In January, a celebration of the Baptism of our Lord Sunday and Martin Luther King Day were planned.

February of 1992 brought a marriage enrichment retreat and renewal of vows. March and April celebrations included; Soup/Song/Story on Wednesday evenings, a Lenten Cantata, a Charter Day Organ Recital, a Seder Meal on Maunday Thursday, a 6:00 am Easter Service, a 7:00 Easter Breakfast and the 9:00 am and 10:30 am Easter Services.

May included a "turnaround" service with the children and a Memorial Day Service at the cemetery. Pioneer Bible School was in June and included a carnival and box lunch auction.

Finally, July 1992 brought the end of the 100th year with an Alumni Choir Concert, an historical service, a picnic, centennial communion and a formal dinner.

And so LITTLE FIGHTING EBENEZER LUTHERAN CHURCH celebrated 100 years of life in our community. We look forward to the next century with excitement as we continue our Christian journey together.

GILBERT CARLSON REMEMBERS 85 YEARS AT FIRST LUTHERAN

Gilbert became a member of First Lutheran in 1906 when his parents, Charlie and Ida brought him to the Lord in Holy Baptism. He has remained a life-long member of this church. His early recollections are of going to church and Sunday School in a platform buggy pulled by one horse. It took about an hour and a half to get to Amery from their farm which was 5 1/2 miles NE of town. He remembers that many of the members in the early 1900's were farmers who came in to Amery to worship, and that they brought hay and oats for the preacher's horse and cows. It was a way to supplement the meager salaries of the pastors in those days. It definitely was the Swedish Lutheran Church in the early years as reflected by the names Gilbert remembers well as fellow members. There were the Carlson brothers, August and Charlie, and families of Pete Johnson, Pete Linner, Otto Swanson, Adolph Carlson, Charlie Peterson, along with the Burmans, Stenbergs, Gust Nelson, and others with a distinct Scandinavian sound.

Gilbert recalled that the rides to church were long, but not too bad, except that it was mighty cold going to the Sunday School Christmas program at night. He also remembered that there were times when they had to walk to church because the third horse (the one they used for the buggy) had been used for field work all week and needed to rest on the Sabbath.

When the kids were old enough they went to church on Saturday to read for the minister (Confirmation instruction). There was quite an age span in the class because families wanted to bring more than one child at a time. Gilbert was 15 when he was confirmed in 1921 by Rev. M. Th. Andren, But his brother Roy was in the same class and he was only 13, and Burman brothers, Bill and John were probably 12 and 14. It didn't seem to be a problem to have the age difference, but the pastor might have had different thoughts on that, however. Six members of the class were confirmed **on** Swedish. They were Alma & Gust Carlson, Gilbert & Roy Carlson, Elsie Swanson and Agnes Carlson. John & Bill Burman, Alton Anderson and Emmett Stephanson were confirmed in English.

When asked why the church changed its name from Ebenezer Lutheran to First Lutheran, Gilbert recalls the discussion of wanting to indicate that of the three Lutheran churches in Amery, this one was the first to be established, but that there was also concern to make it less Swedish and more inclusive as the population in the area began to change, and families not of Swedish background were interested in joining the church.

In response to questions about the church building,

Gilbert told about the original church building that had been erected before he was born, but remained unchanged until 1925 when they began to dig a basement under the existing building (that first frame structure no longer exists as it was torn down in order to build the present sanctuary). Gilbert was working for John Edmond that year and helped with the excavating process which was done with horses and scoop scrapers. This project came about because the women of the church wanted a kitchen where they could prepare church dinners. It became much more than that, however, as it served as Sunday School space, meeting area, kitchen and fellowship hall. One of the big events of the year was the annual Armistice Day dinner that was served for 50 cents and later the price was raised to \$1.00. These dinners provided the needed funds for many projects in the church and also served as wonderful time of fellowship. Gilbert's mother often served as the chairman of these events and he can almost see her and Olga Sjobeck in the old kitchen with the wood stove. (One can imagine the aroma of Swedish meatballs and fresh bread wafting through the doors).

In 1930, Gilbert was married, and his bride Ruby joined the church soon after their wedding. Although she had not been raised Lutheran, Ruby became an active and faithful member of First Lutheran, and she and her mother-in-law were regular attenders of Ladies Aid and Women's Missionary Society activities. When Gilbert and Ruby moved to the farm across the road from his folks, it provided transportation for Ida to church activities, because Ruby knew how to drive and wasn't afraid of the country roads even in the wintertime.

Gilbert also told about the original parsonage on Elm Street being built by the minister, J. A. Gustafson who later sold it to the congregation for a parsonage.

First Lutheran has been the church home to four generations of the Chas. E. Carlson family. During those years Gilbert has witnessed many baptisms, confirmations, weddings and funerals of members of his family at this church, and he is privileged to have some of his immediate family as current members. When the new church was built in 1963, Gilbert's mother had the distinction of having been a member for the most years. Now as the church celebrates its centennial, Gilbert claims that place and he feels it is a very special honor.

It is good to know that this church which was established 100 years ago has ministered faithfully to its people, and that the people continue to serve their God in this fellowship.

CONCORDIA SOCIETY

1943 - 1959

The earliest information on the Concordia Society was found in the minutes of November 15, 1943. This group of fourteen ladies met evenings in the homes. Annual dues of fifty cents per member and monthly offerings were sent to the district treasurer for missions at home and abroad. There were also work and flower funds. Hand work included dish towels, stuffed animals, quilts, baby bibs, kimonos, diapers, crib covers and other items.

A Mother's Day Supper was held in May, 1944, for First Lutheran mothers and daughters. The proceeds were sent to China Relief. This became an annual event involving all Concordia members who were assigned to one of four committees: Food, ticket, decorating or program. Proceeds of Mother-Daughter banquets were used to buy window shades, flower vases, hymnals, large and small tables and chairs, a hot water heater, electric roasters, silver service, table trucks, and carts.

Back yard pot-luck picnics were held once each summer in place of formal meetings.

In 1953, Ellie Johnson, Marion Marck, Pearl Larsen, Mary Lindgren, Beverly Viken and Ivadene Bergquist volunteered to serve on a committee to make Wisemen costumes for the Sunday School Christmas programs. Shepherds costumes were made later.

A Bridal Review and Tea were sponsored in 1957 to raise money for missionary, Alice Turnblad.

Each December, Christmas boxes were made up and sent to needy families, as well as cookie boxes to around twenty shut-ins.

At the February 5, 1959 meeting, a motion was made, seconded and carried to dissolve Concordia Society in favor of Augustana Lutheran Church Women.

WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY 1920 - 1959

The Women's Home Foreign Mission was organized in June, 1920, with twenty members. The monthly meetings were held afternoons in the homes. Dues were fiftycents a year, along with offering, pledge boxes and work fund donations. Meetings usually opened with a hymn, followed by Pastor-led scripture reading and prayer. Offerings were sent to foreign and home missions.

To celebrate their 25th anniversary, the Society met in the church the evening of June 22, 1945, with the congregation invited. Officers at that time were Mrs. Adolph Hedlund, Mrs. John Edman and Mrs. Herbert Olson.

In December 1948, a food sale was held jointly with the Concordia Society to raise money towards the support of missionary Alice Turnblad in Africa. A junior Missionary Society, started in 1951, met monthly with the Sunday School.

Over the years the ladies made quilts, aprons, pajamas, bed shirts, dresser scarves, napkins, pillowcases, towels and bandages. Most items were sent to Bethesda Invalid Home & Hospital and to Vasa Children's Home. Afghan Squares were knit and carpet rags sewn.

The Women's Missionary Society met for the last time on February 5, 1959. Motion was made and seconded to dissolve and join the Augustana Lutheran Church Women. Officers at that time were Mrs. A. R. Sjobeck, Mrs. Marvin Johnson and Mrs. Herbert Olson.

LADIES AID AND FIRST LUTHERAN CHURCH WOMEN

1906 - 1920 Translated from Swedish by Adele Stearns

The Ladies Aid of Ebenezer Church of Amery was organized in 1906 at a meeting in the home of Mrs. P. Wiberg. A committee was chosen to go through the list of women of the church to determine who to invite to join the group. Pastor Gustafson was elected president; his wife was named secretary; and Mrs. Staffenson was the first treasurer

The group continued to meet in homes of members. Roll was taken at each meeting and dues collected. There were 15 members at the second meeting and \$14.35 in dues were collected. At the third meeting, Deacon Anderson, from Clayton, led the worship. Lunch was a part of each meeting and it was decided that only three things and coffee should be served, and anyone serving more than three items would be fined \$5.00!

Some of the projects for the year included purchasing an ice cream freezer so they could have ice cream socials, and a collection of items for an auction to raise funds to purchase pews.

Johnson, Otto Johnson, P. Linner, P. Lundquist, William Lovegren, Gust Nelson, P. Nelson, August Olson, August Peterson, F. A. Peterson, C. A. Staffenson, Theo. Swanson, P. Wilberg, Otto Holsten, J.

G. Burman, C. W. Stenberg, Otto Swanson, Theodore Swanson, John Edman, Andrew Clemmens and August Olson. Other names listed in the early years were: Mesdames Tom Lovegren, Swan Lambert, Albert Anderson, Peter Nelson, Viola Elmgren, Frances Elmgren, Knute Stone, Hans Bottolfson, Eric Fredrickson, Ole Johnson, Charles Carlson, Pete Johnson, C. A. Carlson, Axel Sponberg, N. V. Sandin, V. H. Christensen, E. M. Fay, Walter Carlson, Albert Peterson, Carl Lovegren, and Nels Johnson.

In 1907, Pastor Gustafson and his wife continued as president and secretary, and Mrs. Gust Nelson became treasurer. Most of the meetings must have been in the afternoon because it is mentioned in the minutes that the hostess for an occasional evening meeting would sometimes serve supper. The 1909 minutes stated that the Ladies Aid members served an oyster stew dinner for the public in the Smith Building on Keller Avenue.

The second Pastor, Reverend Andren, became a part of their meetings in 1910. In 1911 they had a stand at the Amery Street Fair and took in \$54.80. They also had income of \$51.25 from an afghan sale.

In 1914 the members donated one dollar each to help pay the parsonage electric bill. They also had a summer festival and an ice cream social stand at some city celebration, in July, most likely on the fourth. A new fund raiser was introduced, the making and selling of aprons. In 1916 a quilt raffle netted \$99.82.

The meetings continued with the same format up to 1920. Each meeting was opened with a prayer by the pastor, followed by a business meeting and a short program. Fund raising activities were discussed and monthly dues collected. Apparently, some hostesses tried to outdo the others by serving more elaborate lunches because from time to time it is mentioned in the minutes about limiting lunch to three items and coffee. If a member did not take a turn at her home she would have to contribute \$5.00 to the treasury. One member contributed \$5.00 frequently.

It is interesting to note that one of the oldest living members, Olga Sjobeck, was secretary of the Ladies Aid in 1920. During the years 1921-27 they continued to meet in the homes of the hostesses. Fund raisers included luncheons, with sale of handiwork, and bake sales. They purchased four dozen sets of dishware and silverware for the kitchen. Some of the summer meetings took advantage of the nice weather by having outside picnics at the home of the hostess... Mrs. A. R. Sjobeck was their treasurer in 1923 and 1924.

A basement was added to the church in 1927 so the ladies had a new place to meet. A motion was passed in 1928 that all future meetings would be conducted in English! A successful dinner and bazaar netted \$151 that year and they contributed to furnishings and curtains for the basement. The next year they held the summer dinner, a fancywork sale, and a chicken dinner and bazaar in the fall. The dinner was priced at 50¢ a plate, and the \$153 profit was used to purchase table cloths and Sunday School Books and to help with church expenses.

During the 30's they had the usual fund raising activities; the summer dinners, craft sales, fall chicken dinners and bazaars each year. Up to this time, the pastor usually served as president of the group, but starting in 1932, the ladies were elected to serve all the offices. Julia Hillbery, Julia Olson and Alma Palmer were the first to serve the top office. Other members mentioned in the minutes from this period included Blanche Isaacson, Alma Halverson, Olga Sjobeck, Julia Hillbery, Olga Hedlund, Amanda Stenberg, Elga Edmond, Hanna Hazelquist, Ellie Johnson, Sadie Burman, Alma Palmer, Harriet Bragstad, Adele Stearns, Irene Karl and Louise Olson. Projects included painting and decorating the parsonage, painting the basement and purchases for the Sunday School. In 1939 they hosted the annual meeting of the Apple River District.

The period of the 40's were very busy times for the ladies of the church. Sugar was rationed during those war years and the women had to beg sugar from members to make cookies to send overseas to our servicemen. Activities included collecting clothing to send to Europe and making bandages. They served a convention of Sunday School Teachers, a dinner for the district pastors and wives, and the annual chicken dinners and smorgasbords.

Pastor L. K. Anderson was with us from 1942 to 48. Ladies serving as president were: Mrs. Dave Palmer, Mrs. Lewis Bragstad, Mrs. Ellie Johnson and Mrs. Rolf Marck. With the usual fund raisers, they contributed to the organ fund, purchased hymnals, purchased five dozen place settings of dinner dishes, and in 1947 pledged to pay \$500 a year the next three years towards a building fund.

The decade of the 50's opened with plans to add a basement on the east side of the church. The dedication of the new structure was in 1952 and coincided with the celebration of the 60th anniversary.

The group continued to be very active with fund raising projects and pledged to continue a minimum of \$500.00 a year to the building fund. Some of the activities were as follows: they served Community Club Dinners, pie and coffee lunches, pot lucks and High School Jr-Sr- Banquets. They hosted the Fall Festival Stands and the 1957 Area Luther League Convention.

In 1958 they joined with the Congregational Church Members to celebrate World Day of Prayer. They supported the Apple River Memorial Hospital and the Gustavus Chapel Funds with monetary gifts, and purchased additional silverware and place settings to bring the service up to 175.

On January 14, 1959, the members of the Ladies Aid, Womens Missionary Society and the Concordia Society met to discuss a merger of the groups into one organization called the Lutheran Church Women. They all had been members of the Minnesota Conference, a part of the Augustana Synod. A reorganization had taken place that made us part of the Apple River District of the Upper Michigan Synod. By merging the former groups into one organization, they conformed to the new policy and were called FLCW, First Lutheran Church Women.

Elected to serve as the first officers were:

President: Ellie Johnson Education: Beverly Paulson Vice Pres: Marion Marck Service: Mildred Johnson Treasurer: Julia Olson Membership: Dorothy Johnson Secretary: Wilma Palmer

At the time of the March meeting there were 85 members. They voted to divide into Bible Study units named Martha, Rachael, Ruth, Esther, Miriam, Dorcas and Naomi.

One unit met mornings, two met afternoons and the rest preferred evenings. Some of the activities were: making quilts, hospital gowns, pillows, blankets, serving Jr-Sr Banquets, Father-Son Banquets, wedding receptions, sponsoring clothing drives for Lutheran World Relief, holding rummage sales, making baked goods and jellies for the rest homes, serving birthday parties at Golden Age Manor, packing and delivering food boxes to the needy at Thanksgiving and Christmas.

In 1960, Helen Floreen, Faith Lutheran of Balsam Lake, and Mildred Johnson, Amery First Lutheran, were selected to represent the Apple River District at the National Convention of Lutheran Church Women at Kansas City. Because of the success of their fund raising projects, they contributed \$1,100 to the building fund and purchased a slide projector for the Sunday School. They contributed \$1,370 to the building fund, \$400 to the synod, \$25 to the Head Start program, \$50 to the organ chimes fund, purchased a 75 cup coffee pot and contributed to a piano fund.

Mrs. Lewis Paulson was their delegate to the ALCW Conference at Wilmar, Minnesota in 1961. They made donations to the March of Dimes, Wood Lake Bible Camp, the Volga Rest Home and the building fund. They sponsored the area Lutheran Welfare Society Workshop which was held in our church and attended by more than 100 delegates.

In 1962 the 70th anniversary was celebrated with a dinner. Sadie Burman and Onilea Sondreal were host-

esses. They served the usual receptions and banquets up to April when the little white church was demolished to make room for the new church. A very successful Christmas Fair earned \$1.700.

For the period 1967 to 69, Adele Stearns was president and other active members were: Bea Stoddard, JoAnn Johnson, Lila Ward, Mary Lou Swanson and Kris Arneson. Activities: they supported a Korean Orphan, made rugs and blankets from nylon stockings, knitted squares for afghans, produced a cookbook, made cookies and favors for Golden Age Manor, made layettes for Polk County Indian Women, distributed Christmas boxes of food, and with the assistance of the school nurse, supplied Christmas gifts for needy children.

In the decade of the 70's the following served as presidents: Elaine Meyers, JoAnn Buss, Mary Lou Swanson, Diane Blahauvietz. Other officers were: Lila Carlson, Kris Arneson, Judy Nygaard, Ruth Young, Bea Stoddard, Mildred Johnson, Julie Lindberg, Gerry Bieniasz and Wilma Palmer.

The proceeds from the many fund raising activities were used as follows; contributions from the Ladies Aid plus memorial funds in honor of Elmer Hillberry and Kenneth Anderson totaled \$1,200 and were added to the carpet fund. They gave a donation to Meals on Wheels, \$100 to Lutheran World relief, \$75 for hymnals for Golden Age and Crestview, \$1,000 for church projects and the stained glass windows, purchased white table cloths and stainless steel serving sets for the dining room, carpeted the nursery and the choir loft, and purchased a full length mirror for the downstairs hall. In 1977 they served a dinner as part of the celebration of the 85 church anniversary.

Adele Stearns represented First Lutheran at the 9th annual convention of LCW. The 1979 Christmas Bazaar netted close to \$3,000!

In the decade of the 80's, the FLCW was led by the following presidents, each serving two year terms: Kathy Krogh, Bobbie Clausen, JoAnn Buss and Co-Presidents: Kay Erickson & Sally Pickard and Mary Lou Swanson & Wilma Palmer. Other officers included Kathy Williamson, Julie Lindberg and Adele Stearns.

The activities included all the usual projects plus: a mini-retreat was held at the home of Diane Blahauvietz. Kay Erickson presented a program in 1983 on the work of the Social Ministry from her experiences as district chairperson. The 1984 bazaar netted \$1,900. They donated \$75 to the Community Referral Agency to help support the program for battered women in Polk County. The Mother-Daughter Banquet had an attendance of 175 in 1985.

Kay Erickson related her experiences of her trip to Germany. Care packages were prepared for farm families in 1989, and \$50 was given to support Exodus House. They drew up a new constitution for the local LCA to conform to the new ELCA Constitution.

Francis Cotch, from Clayton, Vice-President of ELCA, reported on her experiences as delegate to the Synodical Women's Organization meeting in Anaheim, California.

The Chairmen of the Fall Festival Stands from 1980-91 were Kay Erickson, Rick and Pat Troff (5 yrs.), Glen and Bobbie Clausen (2 yrs.), Win and Mildred Johnson, Gene and Wanda Johnson with Mick and Leslie Larsen, and Gene and Wanda Johnson with Mary and Donna Noha.

The 1991-92 Officers were: Co-Presidents: Wilma Palmer & JoAnn Clark; Secretary, Kathy Timm; Treasurer, Julie Riemenschnieder. A very successful bazaar was chaired by Gerry Bieniasz and Barb Henry netting over \$4,000. In summary, each of the following activities have been sponsored since 1967 or before: A Compassions Child had been supported, rummage sales held, delegates have attended convention and an Advent Program has been held.

For a century, the women of the congregation have demonstrated willingness to support God's work in all phases of church growth.

Now as they look to the future, they pledge as a community of Lutheran Church women, created in the image of God, called to discipleship in Jesus Christ, and empowered by the Holy Spirit, to commit themselves to grow in faith, support one another in their callings, witness to the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and promote healing and wholeness in the church, society and the world.

M & M, COUPLES AND VELKOMMEN CLUBS 1950-1992

The M & M Club was organized on January 31, 1950. At the February meeting the following officers were elected: Graham Frear, President; Harriet Huset, Vice President; Ruth Jerdee, Secretary; and Eunice Johnson, Treasurer.

At the April meeting the group selected the M & M name. The other names considered were Mr. and Mrs. Club, Couples Club, Twosomes and King's Kupples. To join the club the couples had to have a combined age of less than 80! There was no stipulation that when couples reached that age that they would have to leave the club.

Some of the activities enjoyed by the club were: sleigh rides, hay rides, tobogganing, family picnics, all day outings square dancing, progressive dinners, ping-pong, shuffle board and fish fries.

The club helped with many community and church projects. They served community club dinners, established and staffed a nursery, provided nursery toys, helped welfare families, helped with church painting, decorated for Christmas, served coffee after lenten services, helped purchase choir robes and stage curtains. They also helped with Little League, Bible camp, cub scouts and books for the library. In the early 70's the club was not active and a new group selected a steering committee to organize a new start. The committee consisted of Cal and Ann Sprain,

Freedolph and Marian Wahlstrom and Vic and Gerry Claussen. They continued under the M & M banner until 1978 when they ruled to allow all ages and singles to join and then changed the name to Velkommen Club.

Some of the activities were: theater outings, Christmas parties, nature trips, picnics, slide shows of members trips, museum trips, monthly potlucks, and trips to dinner theaters.

Their service projects included helping with Easter breakfasts, food baskets for needy families at Thanksgiving and Christmas, decorating the church for Christmas, purchasing coffee and other supplies for the kitchen and supported many other church projects such as the new lighted sign.



LUTHER LEAGUE OF EBENEZER LUTHERAN CHURCH ORGANIZED JANUARY 19, 1922

The membership of this organization was to consist of all people who are members of the Lutheran Church and all people who endorse the purpose of the League, who upon application have been regularly admitted. Meetings were to be held once a month with the church library open during the meeting hours.

At the first meeting the following officers were elected: President, Esther Andren; Vice President, Roy Flood; Secretary, Deborah Swanson; Treasurer, Arvid Nelson.

In 1927, Rev. Melford became the new pastor. The Clayton Lutheran League traded programs back and forth with Amery in these years as well as with other Luther Leagues. The New Years Eve meetings were called "New Years Wakes." Olga Sjobeck's name was regularly seen in the minutes as providing part of the program.

In 1931, the League voted to pay for the piano tuning which amounted to \$3.50. In August of that year the League voted to have an ice cream social in the city park.

Cost for the ice cream and cake was \$0.10 and the proceeds were \$14.06.

All of the meetings in the next years were very much the same with opening prayer, scripture and a program of some kind followed by lunch in the church basement. There evidently was an orchestra in the church which played at many of the meetings.

In 1941 the League voted to give the church \$75.00 toward remodelling. They also voted to purchase some carpeting for the church.

During the War, there were many reminders to write to our boys in the service.

The last minutes we have for the Luther League are for December 31, 1945. Many of the members of the Luther League from the 30's and 40's are still active members of our church. Many others are still in Amery, but became members of other churches after marriage.

JUNIOR LUTHER LEAGUE 1945 - 1955

The Junior Luther league was active in the years from 1945 to 55 under the direction of Pastors L. K. Anderson, N. I. Magnuson and C. Seburg. The 1945 officers were: Pres. Beverly Hedlund; V. P., Ardel Hazelquist; Treas., Genevieve Olson; Secretary, Richard Rehm.

The members mentioned in the minutes during this period were: Deloris Pearson, Marilyn Stearns, Marie Stenberg, June Pearson, Betty Higgins, Donna Peterson, Betty Burke, Lorraine Rehm, Jerry Carlson, Burnam DeLong, Phyllis Peterson, Joan Bulow, Marilyn Van Hyfte, Irv Madsen, Ronnie Marck, Dick Bale, Bill Bale, Dave Johnson, Bruce Johnson, Jackie Bergquist, John Madsen, Rodney Nelson, Mary Lien, Kay Larsen, Sharon Haney, LaVern Burke, Melvin Carlson, Duane Booth, Vince Chelstrom, Kenny Madsen, Bob Marck, Bob Nelson, Kent Warhol, Jan Luke, Jay Luke, Marvin Mattson, Charlotte Stenberg, Marlys Lundbeck and Corrine Bulow.

They sent delegates to the district meetings and occasionally to the national convention, one of which was attended by Bill Bale, Dave Johnson and Wayne Olson.

The meetings followed a general format; The meeting was opened with scripture reading and prayer by the pastor, followed by readings, discussions, and hymn singing. There apparently were some fine voices in the group because they sang a number of hymns at each meeting. For entertainment they presented skits, put on a play, and played the piano and musical instruments.

During the spring and fall they sponsored picnics, wiener roasts and hay rides and in the winter they had skating and tobogganing parties. They frequently invited leaguers from Clayton, Clear Lake, Range, Balsam and St. Croix to join them. Each year they sponsored a Youth Sunday Church Service.

HI-LEAGUE

The youth of our congregation are a very important part of our church and have been very active over the past 25 years.

Potluck suppers, ice cream socials, the Easter breakfast and chili suppers have been some of the events the Hi-League have participated in. A yearly youth service, and lefse bake have also been part of the youth involvement.

Sponsoring Korean orphans, hunger lock-ins to raise money for world hunger, as well as our own food pantry, and helping persons in areas in the United States where natural disasters occurred, were some of the social issues the youth have dealt with. In 1974 they also sponsored a talent show entitled "You'll Never Walk Alone" to raise money for cystic fibrosis.

The summer of 1976 found 14 of our young people attending a national youth convention in New Orleans, Louisiana. 1985 found our youth at Purdue University and 1988 they were headed to Texas for the youth convention there. A synod ski-in in Northern Michigan was also among the events our youth have participated in. The congregation has been very supportive when it came time to raise the money needed to send our youth to these events.

Interns became a part of First Lutheran and the Hi-League in 1978 and along with them came the annual canoe trip. A trip down the Namekagon River, near Hayward, became a yearly event until 1985. Since that time, Journey of the Cross has been a focal point for our youth.

Many changes have taken place over the past twenty-five years, but the importance of the youth in this congregation has remained the same. As we look forward to our next 100 years of faith, let us pray that same importance continues.

Sunday School

Sunday School has been a very important part of our church life throughout the past century.

The early minutes of the church council indicated that the parents had a vital interest in the spiritual education of their children. The congregation was organized in 1892 and the first few years the religious instruction was in the members homes. In 1893 they met in Charles Manson's home.

In 1894 or 95 they acquired a building and made arrangements for Jonas Magney, pastor of Balsam Lutheran, to spend one Sunday a month here for Sunday School and church. The Sunday School instruction was in Swedish up to 1923.

The Sunday School year was from the first Sunday in March through the Christmas season and the highlight of the year was the Christmas program. Those attending to view the Sunday School Christmas Program were charged 10¢. The trustees provided for the treats for the Sunday School Students; a tub of apples for bobbing and a bag of candy & peanuts.

Summer school was held in the spring for 4 to 6 weeks. The classes were held in the public school and the teacher was usually a student from Gustavus Adolphus College.

Superintendents who served prior to 1925 included: Solomon Anderson, Charles Staffenson, C. A. Staffenson, and Theo. Swanson.

In 1916, there were 46 students in Sunday School

and 17 were confirmed that year.

Up until this time most of the instruction and sermons were in Swedish. In 1923 the Council agreed to have the Sunday School opening and closing in English on alternate Sundays.

During the Pastor Andren era, Sunday School was conducted among the pews and Saturday confirmation instruction was held at the parsonage. Two weeks of Swedish instruction was held in the summer at the church and a few times in the "Pine Hill" School because quite a few rural members lived in that area. Several people worked with the children in the early Sunday School, but much of the burden was carried by the Staffenson family.

After 1926, during the Pastor Melford era, Sunday School was still held in the pews, but summer Swedish classes were discontinued. Alma Halverson served as superintendent, and Pastor Melford usually conducted the opening and closing ceremonies. During these years some of the confirmation instruction was combined with churches in Clayton and Clear Lake.

The next era was during the tenure of Pastor Almen. In 1932, with L. E. Bragstad as superintendent, Sunday School was conducted in the church basement. Saturday confirmation classes were held in the kitchen at 10:00 am and usually lasted past noon. The early arriving boys would fire up the wood range and in a short time it was a perfect setting for matters concerning "Hades". Sometimes we would ask when we would be confirmed and Pastor Almen said, "When you know it". Vacation Bible School was begun during this era. The first year it was conducted by a Gustavus student, Russell Nelson. Due to the hard times and lack of funds, Pastor Almen conducted the summer sessions thereafter.

In the period of the 40's and 50's, Mrs. Chet (Ellie) Johnson served as Sunday School Superintendent over 15 years. She was followed by Ivadene Bergquist, Floyd Matson, Allen Anderson, Dr. Howard Fischer, Kathy Krogh, Judy Nygaard, Connie Madsen, Phyllis Espegard, Alesia Nielsen and Leslie Larsen. The 1991 Co-superintendents were: Kori Swanson and Cheryl Williamson.

In the recent history of First Lutheran Church, Sunday School has been comprised of 65 to 90 students, 11 to 20 teachers, on or two superintendents, and two or more music leaders. The parish education committee makes decisions concerning curriculum or major changes.

A few years ago the concept of team teaching of Sunday School classes was developed to accommodate the busy life-styles of the two-career families. Two teachers share the duties of teaching one class, putting less pressure on one person , and providing two different perspectives for the students.

Our time each Sunday starts with a 15 to 20 minute opening, with the three year olds thru second grade meeting together, and third through eighth graders meeting in the sanctuary. During opening worship, the children sing songs, listen to stories, learn finger plays, watch videos and

pray together. After opening, students go to their classrooms for lessons and memorization work. Lesson time has been extended to 45 minutes.

Curriculum for Sunday School at First Lutheran has changed through the years. Most recently, we have used the "Proclaim" series from Augsburg, and the David C. Cook series. Members of the Parish Education Committee, teachers and people from the congregation studied the materials and made suggestions, with Parish Education making the final decision. Teaching materials have been expanded to include games, Christian tapes, and videos.
