

### Day 1 – Trust the God Who Knows

**Read:** Ecclesiastes 11:5; Deuteronomy 29:29

One of the hardest realities to accept is that we do not know everything. We want answers. We want explanations. We want to understand what God is doing and why He is doing it. Yet Ecclesiastes reminds us that there are mysteries woven into creation itself. Just as we cannot fully explain the miracle of life or the path of the wind, we cannot fully understand the work of God. That can feel frustrating at first, but it is actually an invitation to trust. Faith does not require us to know everything. Faith requires us to trust the One who does. God has never asked us to carry the burden of omniscience. He simply asks us to walk with Him one step at a time.

**Reflect:**

- What unanswered question are you most tempted to dwell on right now?
- How might trusting God change the way you carry that uncertainty?

**Prayer:** Father, thank You that You know what I do not. Help me trust Your wisdom when I cannot see the whole picture. Teach me to rest in Your faithfulness instead of demanding certainty. Amen.

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### Day 2 – Faithfulness Before Results

**Read:** Ecclesiastes 11:6; Galatians 6:9

We live in a results-driven world. We want to know if our efforts are working. We want immediate evidence that our obedience matters, but God often works differently. The farmer plants long before he sees a harvest. The gardener waters long before fruit appears. The faithful follower of Jesus obeys long before knowing how God might use that obedience. Ecclesiastes reminds us to keep sowing because we do not know which seed God will bless. Your prayers, encouragement, service, and witness all matter, even when you cannot see the results. Faithfulness is not measured by outcomes. It is measured by obedience.

**Reflect:**

- Is there an area where you have become discouraged because you have not seen immediate results?
- What would it look like to remain faithful in that area this week?

**Prayer:** Lord, help me to be faithful even when I cannot see what You are doing. Give me perseverance to keep serving, praying, and obeying, trusting that You are at work. Amen.

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### Day 3 – Stop Waiting for Perfect Conditions

**Read:** Ecclesiastes 11:4; James 4:17

Many opportunities for obedience are lost not because we intentionally reject God, but because we keep telling ourselves we'll obey later. We wait for a better season, a clearer opportunity, more confidence, or greater certainty. Over time, what begins as caution can become a habit of delay. The Teacher warns that the person who continually watches the wind never plants, and the one who constantly studies the clouds never reaps. There will always be reasons to wait and always be imperfections in our circumstances. Yet God often does some of His greatest work through ordinary moments and imperfect situations. The question is not whether conditions are ideal; the question is whether God is calling you to take a step of faith today.

**Reflect:**

- Is there something God has been prompting you to do that you have been putting off?
- What is one step of obedience you can take today?

**Prayer:** Father, forgive me for the times I have delayed obedience. Give me courage to trust You and act when You call. Help me be faithful today instead of waiting for perfect circumstances. Amen.

## **Day 4 – Living Before God**

**Read:** Ecclesiastes 12:14; Colossians 3:23-24

One of the most profound truths in Ecclesiastes is that our lives are lived before God. Every decision, every conversation, every act of obedience, and every hidden struggle is seen by Him. That reality can feel intimidating at first, but it is actually meant to give significance to our lives. Nothing done for God is wasted. The unseen act of kindness. The quiet prayer. The faithful choice when no one else is watching. God sees it all. In a world that often measures value by recognition and results, God reminds us that faithfulness matters even when nobody notices. Our lives are not performed for an audience of people; they are lived before an audience of One.

**Reflect:**

- How would your daily choices change if you consistently remembered that your life is lived before God?
- Are there areas of your life that look different in private than they do in public?

**Prayer:** Father, help me live with an awareness of Your presence. Remind me that You see every act of faithfulness, even when others do not. May my life honor You both publicly and privately. Amen.

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## **Day 5 – The Fear of the Lord**

**Read:** Ecclesiastes 12:13; Proverbs 9:10

When many people hear the phrase "fear God," they think of being afraid of Him. But Scripture paints a richer picture. The fear of the Lord is a life of reverence, awe, trust, and worship. It is recognizing God for who He truly is and responding appropriately. The fear of the Lord begins when we stop trying to sit in God's seat. It grows when we acknowledge that His wisdom is greater than ours, His plans are better than ours, and His ways are higher than ours. Ironically, fearing God is not a burden—it is freedom. We no longer have to pretend we have all the answers. We no longer have to carry the weight of controlling everything. We can trust the One who is wise enough and strong enough to hold all things together.

**Reflect:**

- Where are you most tempted to rely on your own wisdom instead of God's?
- How does remembering that God is God—and you are not—bring freedom into your life?

**Prayer:** Lord, teach me to fear You rightly. Fill my heart with awe for who You are and trust in Your wisdom. Help me surrender the things I was never meant to control. Amen.

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## **Day 6 – What Lasts Forever**

**Read:** Matthew 6:19-21; John 15:4-5

Ecclesiastes spends much of its time showing us what does not last. Wealth fades. Success passes. Pleasure is temporary. Life itself is brief. Yet the goal of Ecclesiastes is not to leave us discouraged. It is to help us invest our lives in what lasts. Jesus points us toward treasures that cannot be lost and a life that bears lasting fruit. When we remain connected to Him, our lives become part of something eternal. The things we do for Christ, the people we love in His name, and the Kingdom we help build will outlast everything this world offers. The answer to life's brevity is not to chase more experiences or accumulate more possessions. The answer is to build our lives around Jesus, the One who remains forever.

**Reflect:**

- What temporary things are most likely to distract you from what lasts?
- What is one way you can invest in eternal things this week?

**Prayer:** Jesus, help me build my life on what lasts. Keep me connected to You and focused on Your Kingdom. Teach me to spend my time, energy, and attention on things that will matter for eternity. Amen.

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
