Suppose your friend says to you, "I don't think there is a heaven. No one has ever seen it. How can we know about it? I just don't believe it."

🏠 **HomeWord** *For Parents*

As we learn of God's call to Abram (later renamed Abraham), we see more of the promise whose fulfillment is revealed throughout Scripture. God's eternal plan to bring redemption continued with the Abrahamic Covenant—God would make Abraham a great nation that would in turn bless all nations (Genesis 12:1–3). Abraham was called physically to be the father of the Jewish nation; but more than that, he was called to be the father of all those who believe by faith in the promised Messiah, both Jew and Gentile (Romans 4:9–12).

Abram was born in Ur, an ancient city that worshipped the moon god. His family left Ur and went to Haran. It was there his father died. Abram was commanded by God to leave Haran along with his wife, servants, and possessions. He obeyed and went to a land that he had never seen before. God promised Abram that he would be blessed and that any who blessed him would also be blessed. God promised Abram that the whole world would eventually be blessed through him and his descendants (Genesis 12:1–3). This promise was fulfilled in Jesus Christ, the Messiah.

It was because of Abraham's amazing faith—faith in things hoped for but not yet seen (Hebrews 11:1)—that he could obediently follow God's lead and believe the incredible promises made to him (Genesis 17:17). In fact, his faith provided the stamina for him to leave his home, go to a foreign country, and wait for his wife Sarah to conceive and bear a child. This was the child who would produce descendants as numerous as the stars of the sky and the sand by the sea (Hebrews 11:8–12). These descendants would become a new nation, appointed by God Himself, through which He would ultimately bring a Savior, Jesus Christ (Matthew 1:1).
