LEAD PASTOR REPORT

Dear LifePoint Family,

Life moves quickly, and it's easy—at least for me—to forget to pause and reflect. Each year, this Annual Report gives me the chance to do just that.

As I reflected on this last year, the theme of “new things” came to mind. The last year was a year where we did a lot of new things and some old things in a new way.

The New

We have welcomed several new families to our LifePoint community over the last year. One of the things that has been so amazing to be a part of is hearing how welcomed many people feel. I would venture to say that every church in America believes they are “friendly,” but being welcoming goes beyond “friendliness.” To welcome people means we intentionally include and involve them. It means we find ways to integrate them into the life of our community. My hope is that we continue to welcome people and point them to life with Jesus.

We also tried some new ways of cultivating belonging. Our first “Sunday Table” in June gathered over 100 people around 10 host tables, sparking new connections and friendships. Our annual picnic, though not a new event, was held at a new location at Pringle Park. The splash pad, open field, and pavilion were a perfect setting for our gathering. We also celebrated in the service that morning the joy of two baby dedications and three baptisms. Every time we celebrate those two rituals as a community, we are celebrating New Life!

Another “new” thing that happened this last year was an update to our Live Stream equipment. Since 2020, we have been streaming our services. For the last four years, we used a stationary camera with limited capabilities. We now have two new cameras that have much more advanced zoom and angle capabilities. Our Live Stream has averaged about 29 views each week. For those unable to attend due to health or age, it has been a lifeline of connection. We're also reaching people beyond Goshen—some I've never even met.

As I reflect on all the new, I am just grateful for God's faithfulness. I am grateful for you. I am grateful that I get to follow Jesus in relationship with each of you. I am grateful for the community we are cultivating together and I have hope that the health of our church community will bless our Goshen community.

Looking Ahead

One of the clearest metaphors for the church, in my mind, is a garden. Jesus invites us to join him in cultivating little "Kingdom Gardens"—communities that bear fruit to bless the world.

As we cultivate a healthy, Jesus-centered community, we invite others to participate in the work. Participation involves surrendering to the Lordship of the Master Gardener, but it is voluntary. He will not force or coerce it.

Here is how I understand our work though: Participation in cultivating the Kingdom involves surrendering to Jesus, but its fruit still overflows to bless even those who have not yet joined in the work. In other words, the Kingdom work we do both calls people to surrender to Jesus and yet blesses people whether or not they surrender to Jesus.

My prayer has been for LifePoint to be a healthy church. Not a growing church. Cancer grows. Mold grows. Growth alone does not indicate health. As we continue to follow Jesus together and as we continue to be shaped by our worship and the word, my prayer is still that we would be a healthy church.

I pray for relational, financial, organizational, and ministerial health. If we focus on cultivating a Kingdom Garden, I believe the growth follows as God blesses the harvest. As Paul wrote to the believers at Corinth,

*I [Paul] planted the seed, Apollos watered it, but God has been making it grow. So neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God, who makes things grow. The one who plants and the one who waters have one purpose, and they will each be rewarded according to their own labor. For we are co-workers in God's service; you are God's field, God's building. **1 Corinthians 3:6-9***

Notice the gardening language Paul is using? Plant, water, grow. Also notice the partnership language? “We are co-workers” and working in the “field.”

So, we are co-workers (gardeners) in the field (garden) that God is growing. As “co-workers,” what part do we play in the health of this Kingdom garden? I believe our part is to be shaped by Jesus and shaped by love.

Shaped by Jesus

I believe our community will be healthy as long as we continue to be shaped by the life and teachings of Jesus. Ideally, each of us are doing that as individuals. Hopefully each of us are seeking to grow in our relationship with Jesus through Scripture, prayer, and obedience to his discipleship demands on our lives. And, hopefully that is happening as we gather corporately around worship and the Word.

Shaped by Love

As we are shaped by Jesus, I also believe we will be shaped by love. Love shows itself in many ways, but three indicators rise to the top for me: forgiveness, generosity, and hospitality.

Forgiveness

Forgiveness is hard, but it is quite central to the Jesus way. Paul emphasizes it in his letters to churches:

- Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as Christ God forgave you. **Ephesians 4:32**
- Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you.

Colossians 3:13

Forgiveness is something we practice in our friendships, marriages, and within the church. Forgiveness is just something we do because we are Jesus people.

Generosity

Paul also wrote to Timothy in 1 Timothy 6:18, “Command them to do good, to be rich in good deeds, and to be generous and willing to share.” Generosity is the opposite of a selfish, stingy, scarcity mindset. Generosity flows from self-giving love. I believe generosity is a fundamental heart posture of Kingdom people and therefore an indicator of health.

Hospitality

Hospitality, which means to show love to strangers, is repeatedly emphasized across the New Testament. Here are just a few examples from Paul, the author of Hebrews (scholars debate authorship), and Peter:

- Share with the Lord’s people who are in need. Practice hospitality. **Romans 12:13**
- Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it. **Hebrews 13:2**
- Offer hospitality to one another without grumbling. **1 Peter 4:9**

Hospitality is a practice of helping people feel “at home.” It involves walking with someone who was previously “outside” and welcoming them “inside.” Hospitality metaphorically and often literally involves pulling up a chair at the table.

My hope and intention is that we continue to grow in love, generosity, and hospitality.

Thank you for allowing me to be your pastor. For giving me the sacred permission to serve this community of believers. I want to invite you to continue following Jesus with me; to continue cultivating love, generosity, and hospitality; and to continue being the very reason LifePoint is such an amazing church!





TREASURER'S REPORT

As I write this, I am about 10 months into this new role as Treasurer. I have been learning a lot and have appreciated the opportunity to serve the church in this way. I've been overseeing and tracking our spending and giving, comparing it to previous years, and trying to gain an understanding of what is wise for future planning. I'll share some of my thoughts with you here. I'll talk about where we have been, where we are going, and what you can do to help.

First, let's look at the SPENDING side of our financial state.

In 2024, we ended the year with a deficit. For those of you who were not aware or don't remember, this was the result of two large projects: the parking lot repaving and the new HVAC system in the sanctuary. A portion of these costs was budgeted, and the rest was paid for from our cash reserves. Through the thoughtful planning of the Council and Staff, we were able to afford these projects and remain in a healthy financial position.

When I began this role, I wanted to understand how and why we ended with a deficit. The truth was that we just had some abnormally large expenses in places that were necessary. And even though there was a deficit, we had savings to draw from to take care of it. There were changes made to the 2025 budget to rebuild and compensate. Our budget has been combed through and planned out to be slim, trim, and efficient, and our staff has done a great job of staying disciplined and finding creative ways to keep their spending in line with the budget. This is especially helpful and impressive as the rising costs of just about everything have been our reality over the past few years.

We are currently income over expenses (which is great!) and just ever so slightly over the budget number. The reason for this involves a few factors that are out of our control. Our spending was boosted by some building repairs, but this is quite normal for a building of our age and size. We have funds designated in savings for this sort of thing, but it still affects the bottom line. Everything is costing more these days.

But the big one—the big spending change—came as an unexpected increase in energy costs, which was the result of a state-approved rate hike of about 16.75% by NIPSCO. Yeah, we didn't see that large of a jump coming.

All in all, our spending is good. It is tracking with our current giving and is well within what I consider to be responsible and frugal. Your giving dollars are being well managed and spent.

Now let's talk about our GIVING.

First of all, we have a generous church! Thank you for all of the ways you give, especially the financial ways!

Our giving has remained stable in recent years. (\$377K, \$373K, and \$376K in the last 3 years.)

Our "Free To Give" campaign to repay our remodel loan has been great! We have paid off over \$55,000 of principal this year and have cut the loan balance down to just under \$236,000. Now that's exciting! We continue to be able to support and partner with community organizations and are working in the direction of being the "Radically Generous" church that Pastor Anthony talks about. Thank you for your generosity that makes this all possible.

I'm going to be honest here: our giving has also remained flat over the last 3 years. We are on pace to finish 2025 with giving coming in at just over \$365K, which is a drop compared to last year. As costs increase, the Council and Staff have an increasing challenge to create a well-built budget. I would love to see that giving number move in the upward direction in the coming years. I will be praying for that. God will provide for us, and my hope is that we all can live in a plentiful and generous place.

TREASURER'S REPORT

So, HOW CAN YOU HELP?

We have been in a healthy spot financially. I want to see that continue. Our 2026 budget plan makes the necessary adjustments for what we can predict. We will have to trust Jesus to help us navigate whatever may come, as we take the responsible approach to the current reality. I believe that He will take care of us. If you have been giving, thank you, and please continue! If you haven't, please consider doing so. Pray for God's blessing and provision for each of us and for our church collectively. LifePoint Church has been a blessing to our community. Through your giving, you all have been a blessing to LifePoint. And God has blessed us all with a beautiful building and grounds, a great staff, and a wonderful congregation—and let's all be grateful for this. I look forward to seeing the great things God has planned for us in the next year. Again, thank you SO MUCH for your partnership in this aspect of our church.

At first, this person was timid and didn't seem to have much confidence in their ability. I know they've spent countless hours practicing—not only when scheduled to play on Sunday but also in their free time. Over the course of a year, I've watched this young person grow immensely in both confidence and skill. I've been so encouraged by their positive attitude and dedication to excellence in their role here. I am honored to be part of raising up the next generation of worship leaders!

Over the last year, we have sung 127 different songs. We have introduced five new songs and added four new team members. Some of my favorite tunes have been Simple Kingdom and Gratitude. Our top songs were Move of God, Graves into Gardens, Goodness of God, and This Is Our God.

Thank you, Lifepoint, for being a church that loves to worship and makes space for God to move among us. Here's to another year of lifting high the name of Jesus together!

2025 was a year of continued work towards promoting and encouraging the people of LifePoint to support and be involved in God's work both locally and internationally.
