Rector's Message

September 11th marks twenty-five years since the terrorist attacks of 2001. Like many of you, I can still remember exactly where I was when the news began to unfold. I was practicing law in New Orleans. That morning, we gathered around a television in the office and watched, almost unable to comprehend what we were seeing. As the enormity of it became clearer, work seemed increasingly beside the point. Eventually, I left the office.

I remember calling Trinity Episcopal Church in New Orleans, my church, to ask the question that seemed most natural: "Are we having a service?" We were. That evening, people poured into Trinity. The church was packed. I do not remember much about what was said. There were prayers, the familiar words of our liturgy. Most of all, I remember being in that holy place among people just as confused as I was.

There are moments when we need holy places. Places set apart from ordinary life, places where, when words fail us, the Church gives us words, and when we do not know what to do, we can simply gather before God.

On September 6th, we will gather for our final Sunday in our present church building. We will give thanks for all that has happened within its walls and commend the building to God. Then we will carry our altar, Gospel Book, Prayer Books, hymnals, and other signs of our common worship into the Parish Hall. The following Sunday, we will gather there for the Holy Eucharist and Rally Day, beginning a new chapter in the life of our parish.

We have reminded ourselves throughout this transition that the Church is the people of God, not the building. That is true. But I also do not want us to diminish the importance of sacred space. Our church *is* a holy place, made holy by the prayers and worship of generations and by the presence of Christ among his people.

We are about to experience something wonderful. We are going to discover that holiness is not confined within those walls. The Parish Hall, already a sacred space where we have found refuge from hurricane damage in the past, will be our place of worship.

Twenty-five years ago, on a terrible September evening, I went looking for the Church because I needed a holy place and people with whom to pray. I found both. This September, we will leave one holy place for a time. But we are not leaving holiness behind. We are carrying our worship with us, and more importantly, Christ is already waiting for us.



Our Resilience Journey

The journey toward a new church is unfolding in carefully planned phases designed to preserve our ministry while preparing for the future.



City and Regulatory Approval

Our first priority is securing the necessary city approvals, permits, and regulatory clearances. During this phase, architects, engineers, and consultants have been work closely with local authorities to ensure the new church meets all applicable building, safety, and flood-resiliency requirements while honoring the beauty and character of our historic church. We have secured unanimous approval from the Planning Advisory Board, the City Council and the Design Review Board.

Commencing Our Building

Once approvals are obtained and with funding goals met, construction can begin. We anticipate this to begin in September. Site preparation will be undertaken with great care, including measures to protect the surrounding churchyards and preserve treasured elements of the current building. The new elevated structure will incorporate modern flood-resistant design while faithfully reproducing the architectural beauty, craftsmanship, and sacred atmosphere that have long defined Trinity-by-the-Cove.



Interim Worship

Throughout construction, worship and parish life will continue uninterrupted. Services will be held in the Parish Hall, allowing our congregation to gather, celebrate the sacraments, and remain connected while the new church rises around us. Though our location may be temporary, our common life and mission will remain largely unchanged.



Dedicating Our New Building and Organ

The final phase will include the installation of furnishings, completion of interior finishes, landscaping, and the placement of the replacement organ. Many cherished elements from our current church—including the altar, pews, pulpit, bells, weather vane, and other salvaged features—will find new life in the completed building. When construction is finished, we will gather in thanksgiving to dedicate our new church and organ, celebrating God's faithfulness and the beginning of a new chapter in Trinity-by-the-Cove's history.

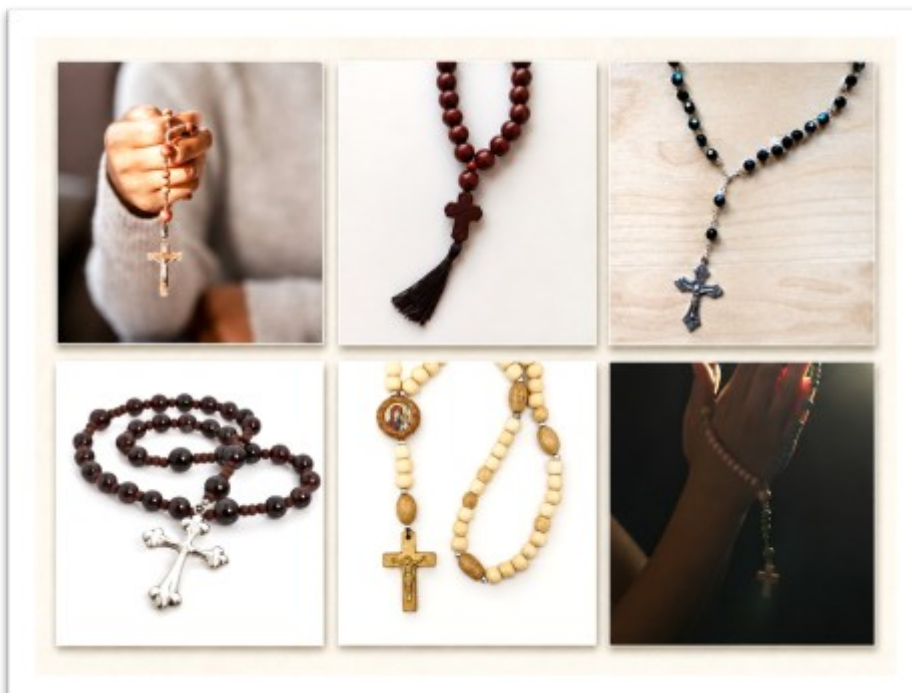
Prayer Beads

The Way of Love

For centuries, Christians have used beads as a simple aid to prayer. The Rosary is perhaps the best-known example, using the movement of the fingers from bead to bead and the repetition of familiar prayers to quiet the mind, focus the heart, and draw us more deeply into the presence of God. Anglican Prayer Beads follow much the same pattern, offering a simple rhythm for prayer and meditation.

I have found myself returning again and again in my prayers to St. Paul's words about love in 1 Corinthians 13: *"Love is patient; love is kind . . . Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things."* These familiar words are beautiful, but they are also challenging. Paul is not simply describing what love feels like; he is showing us what love looks like when it is practiced.

I created this meditation as a way to engage these words and to ask what they might mean in the particular relationships and circumstances of my own life. Moving through the beads, we pray for the grace not simply to understand love, but to practice it: to become more patient and kind, to bear and believe, to hope and endure, and, above all, to love as Jesus loves. - *Father Edward*

Pastoral Care

Pastoral Care for this Moment

As a church family we have been laying the groundwork for rebuilding our church for many months. In our sermons for the past month, clergy have addressed the pastoral and sacramental aspects of our life together as the Church, shoring us up for what is to happen in the coming months. Now the time is near to begin the physical process of that reconstruction, but first we will need to bring down the beautiful building that has served us so well for generations. And that work will be difficult to bear. There will be sadness and grief in those moments. I have only been at Trinity for five years and I know that it will be tough for me when that day comes.

While thinking about the changes we will go through, I am taken back to the days after Hurricane Ian when clergy, staff, and parishioners were forced to discard the smelly waterlogged prayer books, hymnals and Bibles. I thought about the thousands of hands that held each book, and the worn pages in each Book of Common Prayer that marked where the Eucharist is written. And I was sad. The physical items that had aided Trinity in worship since the 1980's were now in the dumpster.

Later, after the church was put back in order, as Fr. Nicholas and I were placing new prayer books, hymnals, and Bible into the pews, I thought about the hands that would use these *new* books. Those hands would provide that link with future worshipers, the same link that the old books had offered us, and I was refreshed by this revelation.

Certainly, taking down and rebuilding a church has a far greater impact on one's emotions, but like those new prayer books, hymnals, and Bibles, we will have the opportunity to provide for our church family far longer into the future than we could have otherwise with our current church structure. I believe that is something we "get" in our heads, but our hearts ache in anticipation of the physical, emotional, and spiritual process.

On any journey unexpected things happen and this journey toward a new church building will be no different. Fr. Edward, Fr. Nicholas, Fr. Steve, and I will be here for you in prayer, in conversation, and in presence. Please seek us out to talk about what you are feeling. We want to know your concerns and questions. We also are interested in your insights about what God is doing in our church family during this time. We want to know how you are doing.

And though we may worship God in a building, whether in the Parish Hall or a "proper church building", on the waterfront, or in the children's courtyard, always remember...the people are the Church...we are the body of Christ.

Formation News

Our Sunday formation offerings will begin again in September, when we return to three services on Sundays. We have an exciting year planned and hope you'll take advantage of these opportunities for spiritual growth. Here's a preview of coming attractions!

Faith Seeking Journey (September to May)

Perhaps you have heard people talking about the Faith-Seeking Journey with Fr. Steve, or you know someone who has been through the program? I would like to invite you to learn more about this special offering and to consider joining this year's class.

This series is the way we at Trinity-by-the-Cove prepare people for baptism, confirmation, reception into the Episcopal Church – or the re-affirmation of baptismal vows. It is also a shared journey for those who would simply like to grow in their faith and understanding of the beliefs and practices of the Episcopal Church. The first part of the Faith-Seeking Journey is called the Inquiry Period. It begins on September 20th, during the Sunday Formation Hour. During the Inquiry period, Fr. Steve will present the story of the People of God from Old Testament times to the present day, over ten classes. You will have an opportunity to ask questions and learn from others in the class.



You do not need to commit to attend the full series in order to participate in the first part; although I have found that most people who join the first part of the Faith-Seeking Journey choose to participate in the full series. The sessions of the later parts will cover our weekly liturgy, daily prayer, and sacraments. The focus of the whole course is on using the resources of the Christian tradition to live a meaningful Christian life in the world today.

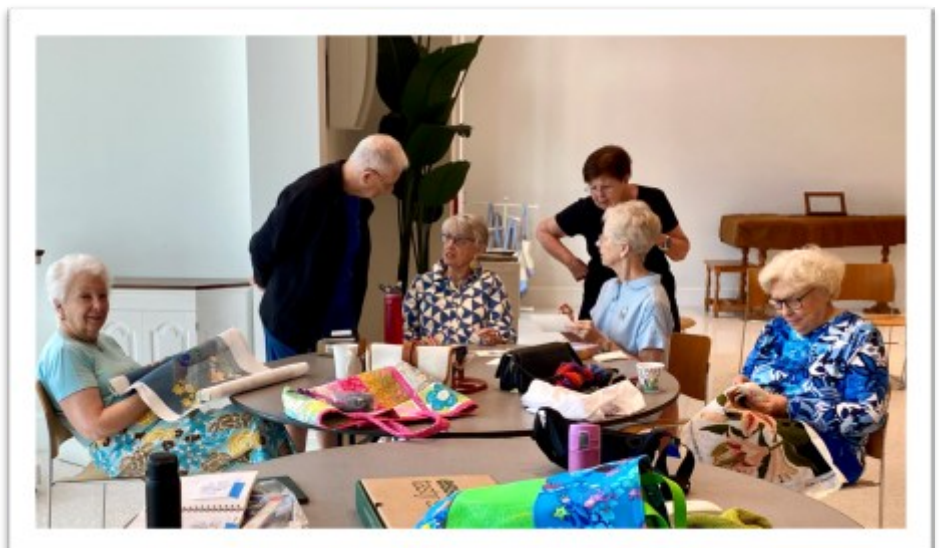
Something New for Solo Friends!

Children ages 3 through 5th grade will return to their atria for age-appropriate opportunities to explore Scripture, worship, prayer, and our faith.

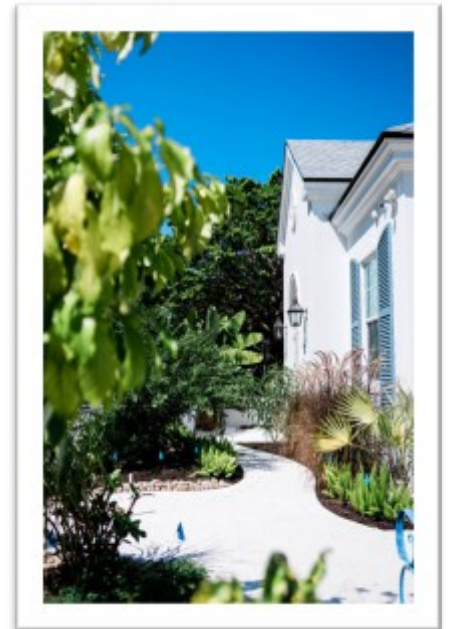
Middle and high school youth will begin their formation year with Father Edward and their parents. This opening forum is also open to young families and may be of interest to any parent or grandparent.

Music at Trinity

I'm writing this article at the conclusion of a truly remarkable time in the UK on our choral residency. Rather than give you a full recap here in the Trinitarian, you'll have to come to Trinitarians Together on October 25th to hear more about our pilgrimage!

Thank you to everyone who has already responded to the Friends of Music mailing, which was sent at the beginning of August. We are off to a nice start in anticipation of what is sure to be a wonderful concert season. If you did not receive a concert brochure and would like one, please take one from the welcome center or contact the church office.

As we prepare for our transition to interim worship in the Parish Hall, Fr. Edward asked me to tell you a little bit about how we are going to use the electronic organ once it's moved to the Parish Hall.

Some of you have commented that the organ sounds louder in the church since the organ pipes were removed, and you're not wrong! Simply put, the many metal pipes and countless other components standing in front of the speakers on the organ platform were blocking, absorbing, and therefore muting the sound waves coming from the speakers. Without all of that material to get in its way, the sound is indeed much more direct into the church.

For a temporary solution, we put tablecloths on two of the four speakers - I was surprised to discover that veiling all four speakers made the sound too muffled and distant! The organ will also sound different in the Parish Hall, but we are going to do our best for a seamless transition by having the organ "re-voiced" on September 17th.

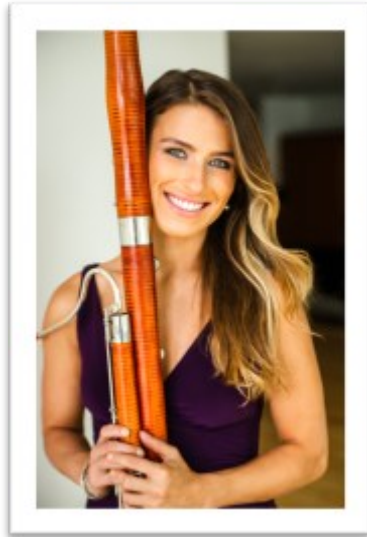
"Voicing" as it pertains to an electronic organ - is simply a fancy term for volume regulating. Just as it was when we purchased the organ and installed it in the church, a technician will come and listed to each stop individually and adjust the volume for our smaller Parish Hall Space. "Voicing" in regards to a true pipe organ is a much more detailed process, where small adjustments are made onto each individual pipe after installation to affect volume, color, speech optimized for an organ's individual acoustic. When Dobson installs the organ in the new church, this voicing process is estimated to take approximately 6 weeks. It seems tedious but in reality this is critical to making our organ fit our acoustical space like a glove; part of the reason we chose Dobson is because they were insistent on a more thorough voicing process than some of our other candidates.

Music at Trinity

I'm tremendously excited to present our 2026-2027 Music at Trinity concert season! I am certain that the lineup of performers for this season will provide great variety, exceptional artistry, and enjoyment for all music lovers.

Our first two programs of the season celebrate U.S.A. 250! Our first concert will be Sunday October 25th, with a program titled *"America the Bassooniful"* played by bassoonist **Eleni Katz** and pianist **Llewellyn Sánchez-Werner**. Ms. Katz teaches bassoon at the University of Wisconsin-Madison's Mead Witter School of Music, is a former fellow of the prestigious New World Symphony in Miami, and a winner of the 2022 Concert Artist Guild Victor Elmaleh Competition. Mr. Sánchez-Werner was named a Gilmore Young Artist, which is one of the most prestigious honors granted to young pianists and performs across the globe, including performances at The Kennedy Center for Presidents Obama and Biden. Their program of Americana highlights the full range of the bassoon in works by Aaron Copland, Leonard Bernstein, and George Gershwin, and the concert's finale will be the latter's iconic *Rhapsody in Blue*.



On November 15th we welcome the **Astralis Chamber Ensemble**, presenting *"American Discoveries"*. Led by flutist Angela Massey, these award-winning musicians have been described as "scary good" and "truly riveting". An innovative and dynamic ensemble, they aim to make classical music more accessible and for audiences to make a lasting connection to the music and performers through creative programming in a small ensemble setting. Their Trinity performance features an expressive work by Samuel Barber, the lyricism of Amy Beach, and highlighted by a magnificent quartet by Arthur Foote.

Music at Trinity

Our annual **Christmas by the Cove** choir carol concert December will of course feature the customary two performances of the Christmas choir concert on Saturday December 12th and Sunday December 13th. Make sure to sign up fast as these concerts always reach capacity!



In January of 2027 we will welcome a truly unique ensemble featuring an instrument that I presume few people have heard of, much less heard performed live – the *Baryton*. The **Valencia Baryton Project** will perform on January 17th. This ensemble has dedicated itself to the performance of music written for this ancient and little-known instrument, which is a cross between the viola da gamba and the lirone. With 10 resonating and plucked strings down the back of the instrument, the baryton gives the traditional string trio an entirely new dimension. Franz Joseph Haydn is the most notable composer to have written for the baryton, with nearly 170 works; though beyond Handel and his contemporaries ensemble's repertoire extends to the creation of new works for this forgotten instrument. The ensemble's founder and director, Matthew Baker, is one of only a handful of baryton performers in the entire world! This will truly be a once in a lifetime concert!



Our concert season concludes on February 28th, with a return appearance by the preeminent British choir **VOCES8**. They were last at Trinity in October 2022 and enjoyed being here so much that they requested to return before I had the opportunity to invite them! If you missed their last concert here, you certainly won't want to miss this one. They will present a program titled "*The Art of Expression*", which explores how Renaissance composers transformed music into a profound vehicle for drama, devotion, and human feeling. Beginning with seldom-performed pre-Renaissance composers Hildegard von Bingen and Pérotin, the concert then moves through dazzling contrapuntal mastery of Josquin des Prez, Victoria, Lassus, and Palestrina. The program culminates in the heightened emotional world of Monteverdi's *Lagrima d'Amante al Sepolcro dell'Amata* ("tears of the lover at the tomb of the beloved").



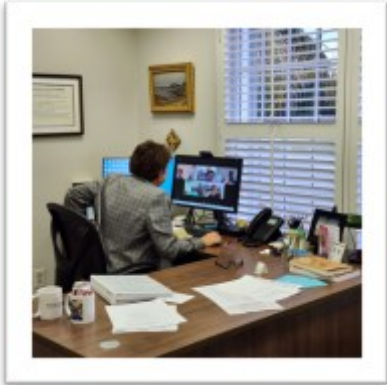

Next, we will read, discuss and study The Book of Revelation- using various commentaries and study notes to gain a better understanding of the symbols and images and how they speak to the past, present and future.

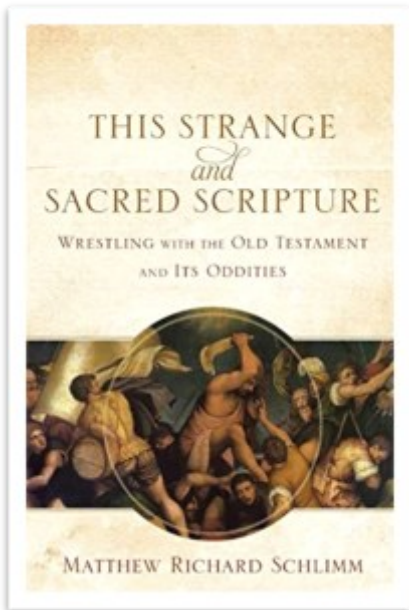
