Rector's Message

There is a quiet truth about parish life that we sometimes overlook: the Church is not sustained by programs or personalities alone, but by the steady, faithful offering of its people. Week by week, in ways both seen and unseen, you build up the Body of Christ in this place.

The Book of Common Prayer gives us words that capture this beautifully: *“Accept, O Lord, our thanks and praise for all that you have done for us. We thank you for the splendor of the whole creation... and for the blessing of family and friends.”* That gratitude extends, surely, to this parish family, to each of you whose hands and hearts, time and talents, make Trinity-by-the-Cove what it is.

Some of that work and ministry happens in the light: at the altar and lectern, in the choir stalls and the narthex with bulletins and greetings, in the careful preparation of worship that lifts our common prayer to God. Some of it happens more quietly: envelopes stuffed, linens pressed, silver polished, gardens tended, thrift sorted. Some of it is offered in the beauty of music that stirs the soul; some in the simple, faithful presence of those who ensure that all is ready with tables set, speakers engaged, and gourmet goodies.

Then there are the countless acts that never make a sign-up list—notes written, calls made, prayers offered, burdens quietly shared. All is holy work.

What unites all of it is not visibility, but love. Love of God, love of this parish, love of one another. That love is the thread that binds together every ministry, from the most public to the most hidden, into a single offering of praise.

So, this rector's message as high season passes by is one to simply say: thank you. Thank you for your time, your care, your generosity, your faithfulness. Thank you for the ways you serve that others see, and the ways you serve that only God knows. In all of it, you are helping to make this parish not just a place, but a living community filled with God's grace.

“We will exalt you, O God our King, and praise your Name for ever and ever.” And we do so together—because of you.

Pentecost

The Joy of Pentecost

On May 24th, we will celebrate the Feast of Pentecost. Pentecost is one of the three great festivals of the Christian year; and in fact, Pentecost is older than Christmas as a Christian holiday. But, for many Episcopalians, Pentecost can seem like an innovation.

So, what is Pentecost? Pentecost is the Day, fifty days after Easter, when according to Luke, God poured out his Spirit on the Disciples of Jesus, empowering them to become Apostles of the Risen Christ, sent into all the world to preach the Gospel to all nations.



Pentecost started out as a Hebrew Harvest Festival, as prescribed in Deuteronomy 16:9. Later, by the time of Jesus Pentecost had become associated with the Renewal of Covenant with Noah, which is when different races came to be, which are represented in the Rainbow.

Pentecost means that the Christian faith is not just good news *about* Jesus. It is good news *for us*, too. On Pentecost, Peter explained to the crowds: "This Jesus whom you crucified, God has made both Lord and Christ." That's not *necessarily* good news for us. It could mean we're guilty of the death of God's own Son. That's why, when those who heard Peter were "cut to the heart and said [O no!] What shall we do?"



Then Peter said, "Repent... Be Baptized..." Then he said, "You will receive the Holy Spirit [too.] "For the promise is to you and to your children and to all that are far off, everyone whom the Lord our God calls to him." Before he died Jesus had told the Disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; pray therefore the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest." By pouring out His Holy Spirit we are equipped and empowered to gather in God's harvest.

The reason Pentecost feels like an innovation is an accident. Since the Middle Ages, Pentecost came to be called Whitsunday in England. Episcopalians, as heirs of the English tradition, continued the custom, until the Liturgical Movement of the twentieth century, brought Anglican practice back into alignment with Western Church practice. Then, to further complicate matters, since the first Sunday after Pentecost is Trinity Sunday, English (and Episcopalians) Christians counted the Sundays that followed as "after Trinity", or what Roman Catholics call "ordinary time." So, the Feast of Pentecost sort of got 'lost in the shuffle.

Luke tells us that "On the day of Pentecost, the disciples were in one room when there came the sound of a mighty wind..." Once at a clergy retreat in Evergreen, Colorado, during a sermon on the Holy Spirit, a sudden storm came up, and the rafters of the cabin shook. I was filled with joy – not happiness – joy! I said to the preacher afterwards, "How appropriate to have a storm come up when you were talking about Pentecost." He said, "There wasn't a storm." Look out the window." And, sure enough, the sky was clear and you could see thousands of stars in the sky.

Pastoral Care

Ministry through the Spirit of Sacraments

Oh, the many times parents hear the complaint – “I’m bored” during the long summer, especially towards the end - when all the fun activities are over and new ideas are long played out. Like the weary parent, I think our Father feels a little bit frustrated with us when we live uninspired – on autopilot. Kids aren’t the only ones who need inspiration - so do adults!

Ministry is indeed inspired work. To do ministry well, periodic affirmations provide the needed infusion of energy and imagination. Last month, Bishop Scharf laid his hands on and reaffirmed church members in their work in Christ and received a new member in whom work has already begun. We all witnessed and participated in the continuing baptismal covenant our brothers and sisters in Christ have with God and their commitment the works of the Church.

In the early 2000’s, I was reaffirmed at St. John’s, Tallahassee after an extended catechism like our own Faith Seeking Journey. After the church service, I remember feeling a stronger bond with my church family and a shift inside of me. It was as if the interior furniture was rearranged and with some old things no longer useful discarded to make room for new things. A similar thing happened when I was ordained to the priesthood. Devoting time to study, prayer, and reflection in preparation to reaffirming one’s faith in the midst of the congregation in a public holy moment, changes you. That is the holy work of sacramental rites.

The Spirit, who is always working something good and holy within you, innervates you to grow in God and in your connection with others. Public commitments such as these are positive demarcations of the before and after. In the after time, new things will emerge as important to you and may motivate you to do something new in your life and the life of the church. This is your call to ministry on your faith journey. Though you may have not been a participant in Faith Seeking Journey (yet!), God still calls you in some way to ministry in the church. When we say together the Baptismal vows during Baptisms and with Bishop Scharf last month, we reaffirmed our commitment to God through Christ. Trinity-by-the-Cove has a wide range of ministries that you might be called to participate in.

Most important to our life as a church is worship. For worship each Sunday, our services need lectors, ushers, greeters, chalice bearers, and an audio-visual person for live streaming. Perhaps that is your call for ministry. Other ministries such as The Church Mouse and Habitat for Humanity are centered on providing for our wider Naples community. These are just a few of the opportunities to serve in ministry organized in the church.

If you feel called to something new, and know what it is you want to do, please let us know. If not, we are here to help you. Just call our office and we will help you find the work the Lord is leading you to do.

Formation News

Faith Seeking and the Journey of Faith

1) Two disciples of Jesus were walking away from Jerusalem toward Emmaus. A stranger joined them, "What have you been talking about?" He inquired. "Are you the only one who doesn't know what's happened?" They asked. "What things? Tell me, he said. "About Jesus... We had hoped he was the One..."

2) "O foolish men! Slow of heart..." He said. And showed them all the things in the Scriptures from Moses to the Prophets that pertained to Himself.

3) Then toward evening, they turned in to rest. And they said to Him, "Stay with us, for evening is at hand, we pray you." So he went with them, and at supper he took bread, blessed it, and broke it. And, their eyes were opened and they recognized Him. And He vanished. They said to each other, "Did not our hearts burn within us while he talked to us on the road, while he opened to us the scriptures?"

4) And that same hour they returned to Jerusalem. And the Apostles said, "The Lord has risen indeed, and has appeared to Simon!" And they shared their stories, and how He had made Himself known to them, in the Breaking of the Bread.

Before Jesus ascended into the Eternal Presence of God, He told the Eleven to 1) Go 2) and make disciples of all nations, 3) baptize them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, 4) and teach them to observe all that I have commanded you."

The early Church used this four-fold structure of 1) Inquiry 2) Formation) 3) Enlightenment and 4) Initiation as a way to carry out the Great Commission that Jesus had given them. For four hundred years it was the way the Church carried on Evangelism.

The Faith-Seeking Journey is patterned on that model. During Easter, we are in the Initiation Period of that Journey. Our focus is on the sacraments and on the discovery of God's call to us in our lives today.

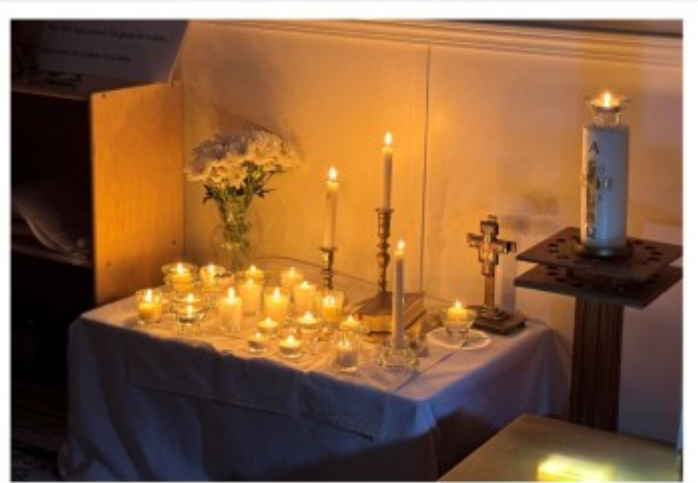

Music at Trinity-by-the-Cove

Announced in the Fall, Trinity's choir will be the "choir in residence" at Chichester and Southwark Cathedrals from August 10-16, singing daily evensong services. A significant benchmark for Episcopal Church music programs, choral residencies are rooted in our common Anglican heritage and offer many benefits, which include:

- Spiritual and musical enrichment for choristers. Singing in places that are the standard-bearers and origins of Anglican choral music deepens a choir's connection to this repertoire.
- Prestige and recognition of a choir's musical excellence
- An opportunity for pilgrimage, blending worship and fellowship. Participating in daily services grounds the choir in the spiritual life of the cathedral, offering a sense of continuity with centuries of worshippers and musicians.
- Support of the cathedral's liturgical life when their choirs are on summer holiday
- An attractive piece for recruitment as we continue to build our music program as a "destination choir", particularly amongst FGCU students, providing extraordinary opportunities that compliment their musical studies.

Choral Residency

As promised in last month's *Trinitarian*, I wanted to share some information about Chichester Cathedral, where the Trinity choir will be in residence for daily Evensong from August 10-14.

The Cathedral Church of the Holy Trinity - Chichester Cathedral, stands at the heart of West Sussex with a history stretching back nearly a thousand years. Construction began in 1075, shortly after the Norman Conquest, when the bishop's seat was moved from nearby Selsey to Chichester. The cathedral was largely completed in the Romanesque style, characterized by its rounded arches and sturdy stonework, though it has been shaped and reshaped over the centuries.

A devastating fire in 1187 led to significant rebuilding, introducing early Gothic elements such as pointed arches and ribbed vaulting. Later additions, including the striking detached bell tower—unusual among English cathedrals—gave the building its distinctive profile. In 1861, the cathedral's spire collapsed dramatically, but it was carefully rebuilt, preserving its familiar silhouette.



Chichester Cathedral is also known for its blend of ancient and modern. Alongside medieval carvings and historic tombs, visitors encounter contemporary works of art, including the Piper tapestry reredos and a Chagall window, reflecting a living tradition of faith and creativity. Today, the cathedral remains not only a place of worship but also a testament to resilience, renewal, and the enduring story of the Church in England.

Chichester is perhaps best known musically for its connection to Leonard Bernstein's *Chichester Psalms*, commissioned for the 1965 Southern Cathedrals Festival, which rotates between Chichester, Salisbury, and Winchester. This vibrant work, blending Hebrew text with modern musical language, reflects the cathedral's ongoing commitment not only to preserving tradition but also to fostering new artistic expression. The Renaissance composer Thomas Weelkes is one of several noteworthy former Chichester organists!



While we're in Chichester, we will have sightseeing excursions to Arundel Castle, Brighton Royal Pavillion, and Winchester Cathedral, which is the longest Medieval cathedral in Europe and is the burial place of Jane Austen.
