Church and Visual Art

- 1. Early Christianity to 4th Century – Christianity was a minority movement, often underground. Christian symbols and images were left by early churches and in houses of Christians.**
- 2. From the 4th- 15th Centuries - During the Medieval period, art was dominated by Christian themes and purposes. The church supervised and funded illuminated Bibles and gothic architecture. Arts taught the Bible to the illiterate, reinforced the Catholic Church's authority, and “aided” worship.**

Church and Visual Art

- 3. The Renaissance Shift: The Renaissance revised the humanism of ancient Greeks, understanding that “Man is the measure of all things”. Visual content was mainly Bible, but was shifting. Artists like Michelangelo and da Vinci became well-known, funded by patrons, like the Medicis, more so than the church.**
- 4. The Reformation and Iconoclasm: The Protestant Reformation in 1517 brought a wave of iconoclasm. Reformers thought visual art distracted and even derailed worship. Some Protestants thought religious imagery was idolatrous. They destroyed religious works.**

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- 5. Secularization and Insult – By the 19th century art mainly served secular interests of the artist more so than the patrons. Religious art declined. Some artists used their work to satirize the church and biblical ideas.**
- 6. Eastern Orthodoxy: Within the Eastern Orthodox Churches icons are still appreciated and used in veneration.**
- 7. Modern Revival: By the late 20th century, what were acceptable components of worship had broadened so that there was re-birth of the idea that visual arts could be aspects of worship and liturgy.**

Church and Visual Art – Concerns

- 1. Idolatry - The visual arts create images; and images are easily manipulated into idolatry in thought and/or practice.**
- 2. Appropriateness - There is lack of discernment and a definition of what is appropriate when considering art and worship contexts.**
- 3. Worldview – Currently visual arts are dominated by a secular or actively anti-Christian worldview. Art has suffered a loss of beauty, purposely turning to absurdity and ugliness. Artists enjoy reflecting the disorder, twistedness, and alienation that descends from the Fall.**

Christians Should Consider Art

- I. All things are for God and His Glory.
 - A. Colossians 1:16 “—all things have been created through Him and for Him.”
 - B. Romans 11:36 “For from Him and through Him and to Him are all things. To Him be the glory forever. Amen.”
 - C. Corinthians 10:31 “Whether, then, you eat or drink or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God.”

- A. Psalm 27:4 “One thing I have asked from the Lord, that I shall seek: That I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, To behold the beauty of the Lord And to meditate in His temple.”

- C. Isaiah 4:2 “In that day the Branch of the Lord will be beautiful and glorious, and the fruit of the earth will be the pride and the adornment of the survivors of Israel.”
