Why a Rule of Faith?

At Woodmark, our church family represents more than forty nationalities and a wide range of Christian traditions. We come from different cultures, denominations, and theological backgrounds. We value that diversity as a reflection of the global church.

But diversity does not mean aimlessness. We want to be rooted in the beliefs Christians have historically confessed together.

That is why we are calling this series A Rule of Faith.

The phrase comes from the early church. Christians used the language of a rule of faith to describe the shared beliefs that gave shape to the biblical story and united the church around the gospel.

We want to recover that spirit for our own day.

Rather than creating our own statement around our particular theological preferences, we are rooting this series in one of Christianity's oldest and most enduring summaries of faith: the Apostles' Creed. It begins with two simple words: "I believe."

The creed is not Scripture, nor does it replace Scripture. It is a concise summary of the biblical story. It gives us shared language for naming the God revealed in Scripture and the gospel Christians have confessed across generations, cultures, and traditions.

How to Use This Companion Guide

This guide is designed to help you carry the conversation beyond Sunday.

Each week corresponds to a line or theme from the Apostles' Creed and includes a short theological overview, a central idea, selected Scripture readings, reflection questions, historic Christian voices, additional reading, and simple practices for individuals and families.

Use the guide as a companion rather than an assignment. Read the Scripture passages slowly. Carry one of the questions with you through the week. Return to a quotation that arrests your attention. Talk about the ideas around the dinner table. Pray the prayers. Write in the margins.

Most importantly, allow these ancient words to send you back into Scripture and deeper into the life of God.

Our hope is not simply that, by the end of twelve weeks, we will know the Apostles' Creed better.

Our hope is that we will become a people more deeply rooted in the faith we have received, more united around the essentials of the gospel, and more prepared to live faithfully within the world God has placed us in.

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Apostles' Creed

What Do We Believe?

EVERYONE HAS A CREED

“I believe.”

Overview

Every person lives from a set of beliefs about God, ourselves, the world, and what makes life worth living. The Christian faith gives those convictions a shape, a story and words to confess together.

BIG IDEA

Everyone lives by a creed. Christian discipleship begins by learning to believe, confess, and live inside the story Christians have received. The goal is not merely to know the creed. It is to become the kind of people whose lives can truthfully say: “This I believe.”

We believe

“I believe.”

Those first two words are more significant than they appear. The creed begins with a personal confession. Christianity is not merely something we inherit, admire, or understand. It is a faith we learn to confess as our own.

03 Does my life reflect what I say I believe?

Where is there distance between my confession and my habits, fears, ambitions, or desires?

Q: What is a creed?

A: A creed is a short summary of what Christians believe. It helps us remember God's story, say it together, and live by it.

TALK ABOUT IT

How can you tell what someone believes by the way they live?

How would your life be different if you really believed that every day?

SHORT PRAYER

Father, thank you for giving us the good news of Jesus. Teach us to know what we believe, to trust what is true, and to live what we confess.

Help our family follow you with faithful hearts.

SIMPLE PRACTICE

Teach the opening line of the Apostles' Creed.

Say it together once each day this week.

Explain that Christians throughout the world have said these words for generations.

Teach us to know you rightly



PRAYER

God of truth, teach us to trust what you have revealed, to hold fast to the faith we have received, and to live what we confess. Through Jesus Christ our Lord.

CONFESSION

Lord, we confess that our lives do not always reflect what we say we believe. Forgive us for trusting lesser stories and letting other voices shape us. Renew our minds, strengthen our faith, and make us faithful to the gospel.

BLESSING

May the God who has revealed himself in Jesus Christ ground you in truth. May the Spirit guard the faith entrusted to you. And may the words you confess become the life you live.

Who Is God?

A THEOLOGY OF GOD

“I believe in God, the Father almighty.”

Overview

The Christian confession does not begin with a vague spirituality or a distant force. It begins with the living God who speaks, creates, covenants, judges, shows mercy, and makes himself known.

The question is not whether people are religious, but which God they imagine and whether that vision has been shaped by divine revelation.

BIG IDEA

God is not a projection of our desires. He is the eternal, holy, loving, and incomparable One revealed in Scripture and made known in Jesus Christ.

We believe

“I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.”

The creed does not merely tell us that God exists. It tells us who he is: **Father, almighty, Creator**. Christians are not free to invent God according to cultural mood, personal preference, or spiritual sentiment.

03 What would change in my life if I lived this week with a deeper awareness of who God is?

What Did He Make?

A THEOLOGY OF CREATION

“I believe in the creator of heaven and earth.”

Overview

The Christian faith begins with a simple confession: the world is created.

Everything that exists owes its life to God. Creation is not an accident, an illusion, or something to escape. **It is the good work of a good Creator.**

To confess God as Creator changes how we see everything. The world becomes gift. Our bodies have meaning. Ordinary life matters. And creation itself becomes a place where the goodness and glory of God can be received with wonder.

BIG IDEA

The world is God's good creation, made through Christ and for Christ. To believe in the Creator is to learn to receive creation as gift, live within it with gratitude, and care for what God has made.

We believe

“I believe in the creator of heaven and earth.”

The creed begins the Christian story with creation. Before there was sin, there was **goodness**. Before there was brokenness, there was **beauty**. Before anything belonged to us, everything belonged to **God**.

Christians believe that the material world matters because God made it. Trees and oceans, bodies and meals, work and rest, art and friendship all belong within a world God called good.

03 If all things were created through Christ and for Christ, how should that shape the way I treat my body, my possessions, other people, and the earth?

What is one area of my life that needs to be brought back under the care and purposes of Christ?

TALK ABOUT IT

Look around your table and name a few things that ultimately come from God's creation.

Food. Wood. Water. Plants. People.

Ask: What is one thing God made that you are especially glad exists? Why?

SHORT PRAYER

Creator God, thank you for making a world filled with life and beauty. Give us eyes to notice your gifts, hearts that are grateful for them, and hands that care for what you have made.

SIMPLE PRACTICE

Sometime this week, ask everyone in the family to find three things God made that they normally walk past without noticing; a tree, a bird, a flower, the clouds, another person. Stop for a moment and simply say: "Thank you, God, for making this."

Teach us to know you rightly



PRAYER

Creator of heaven and earth, you spoke and there was light. You filled the earth with life. You made us from the dust and gave us breath. Teach us to receive this world as your gift.

CONFESSION

We confess that we often move through your world without wonder. We consume without gratitude. We possess without remembering that everything belongs to you. Forgive us.

BLESSING

May the God who made heaven and earth give you eyes to see his goodness.
May Christ, through whom all things were made, teach you to receive the world as gift.
And may the Spirit who gives life to creation fill you with wonder, gratitude, and joy.

Who Is Jesus?

A THEOLOGY OF JESUS

“I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord.”

Overview

At the center of the Christian faith is not an idea, a philosophy, or a set of principles, but a person.

Jesus of Nazareth is the one through whom God has made himself known. He is truly human and truly divine, the promised Messiah, the eternal Son of God, and the Lord of all.

To ask “**Who is Jesus?**” is to ask the question at the heart of Christianity.

BIG IDEA

Jesus is the eternal Son of God who became truly human, reveals the Father, and reigns as Lord over all.

We believe

“I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord.”

The creed teaches us to name Jesus rightly. He is Jesus, the man from Nazareth who entered our history.

He is the **Christ**, God’s promised and anointed King. He is the only **Son**, sharing the very life of the Father. And he is our **Lord**, worthy of our trust, worship, allegiance, and obedience.

Christian faith does not simply admire Jesus. It confesses who he is.

02 If Jesus makes the Father known, what do I learn about God by watching Jesus?

What do his words, actions, compassion, authority, suffering, and love reveal about the character of God?

03 Where am I comfortable receiving Jesus as Savior but hesitant to follow him as Lord?

What area of my life is most resistant to his authority?

TALK ABOUT IT

If someone asked you, “Who is Jesus?” what would you tell them? After everyone answers, read John 1:14–18 together and ask: What does this passage add to our answer?

SHORT PRAYER

Jesus, Son of God, help us to know you, trust you, and follow you. Show us what God is like and teach us to live in your way.

SIMPLE PRACTICE

Choose one story from the Gospels and read it together. Afterward, have everyone answer one question: “What does this story show us about who Jesus is?”

Teach us to know you rightly



PRAYER

Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God and Lord of all, open our eyes to see you clearly. Teach us to trust your words, follow your way, and receive your grace. Form in us a deeper love for you and a greater faithfulness to your kingdom.

CONFESSION

Lord Jesus, we confess that we often make you smaller than you are. We admire you without obeying you, seek your help without surrendering to your lordship, and shape you around our preferences. Forgive us and teach us to receive you as you truly are.

BLESSING

May Jesus Christ, the suffering servant, the Word made flesh, the Son of Man, and the Lamb who reigns, deepen your faith, strengthen your hope, and lead you in his way.

Who Are We?

A THEOLOGY OF THE BODY

“I believe he was born of the Virgin Mary.”

Overview

Christianity begins with a remarkable claim about what it means to be human. God made us as embodied creatures, and when God came to rescue us, the Son did not merely appear human. He became flesh. Jesus was conceived, born, grew, ate, slept, suffered, died, and was raised bodily. The incarnation reveals both who God is and the dignity of what God has made us to be.

Our bodies are not accidents to overcome or raw material to reinvent. They are part of God's good creation, taken up by Christ and destined for resurrection.

BIG IDEA

To be human is to be embodied. In Jesus, God takes on our humanity, restores what sin has distorted, and shows us what humanity was always meant to become.

We believe

“I believe he was born of the Virgin Mary.”

The creed does not allow us to speak about Jesus only in spiritual terms. He was born of the Virgin Mary. The eternal Son entered the physical world he created. He received a human body, a human history, and a human life.

The incarnation is God’s great affirmation of embodied human life.

Which of those messages have shaped me most deeply?

- 03 What does the incarnation reveal about the dignity and goodness of embodied human life?**

How might Jesus becoming flesh change the way I see my own body and the bodies of others?

TALK ABOUT IT

What is one thing your body lets you do that you are thankful for?

SHORT PRAYER

Creator God, thank you for making us. Thank you that Jesus became human like us. Teach us to receive our bodies as your gift, to care for them with gratitude, and to use them to love you and love others.

SIMPLE PRACTICE

At bedtime, have each person name one thing their body allowed them to experience or do that day.

Finish together: “Thank you, God, for making us.”

Teach us to know you rightly



PRAYER

God our Creator, you formed us in your image and called your creation good. Teach us to receive our bodies as gifts, to honor the bodies of others, and to follow Jesus with our whole selves.

CONFESSION

God of grace, we confess that we often reject, misuse, or obsess over the bodies you have given us. We measure ourselves by the standards of the world and forget that we belong to you. Forgive us and restore in us gratitude for your good creation.

BLESSING

May the God who created you, the Son who took on flesh, and the Spirit who dwells within you teach you to receive your body with gratitude, honor others with dignity, and glorify God with your whole life.

What's Wrong With The World?

A THEOLOGY OF SIN AND SALVATION

“I believe he suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried.”

Overview

Christianity takes the brokenness of the world seriously. Something has gone wrong, not only around us, but within us. Scripture calls this sin. **Sin is more than bad behavior.** It is our refusal to trust God, our turning inward upon ourselves, and the disorder that follows when creation is separated from its Creator.

The gospel announces that God has acted within this broken world to rescue and restore it.

BIG IDEA

The deepest problem with the world is sin, and God's answer is not merely better advice, but the saving work of Jesus. Salvation means more than escaping judgment. It is the work of God to forgive us, heal what sin has distorted, reconcile us to himself, and make us new.

We believe

“I believe he suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried.”

The creed does not rush past the cross.

Jesus truly suffered. He truly died. He entered the darkest consequences of human sin and evil.

At the center of the Christian faith stands a **crucified Savior**. The cross reveals both the seriousness of what is wrong with the world and the depth of God’s love for it.

What patterns of distrust, pride, fear, resentment, or self-protection do I need to name honestly?

02 What does the cross tell me about how seriously God takes both sin and suffering?

Where have I minimized one or the other?

03 When I think about salvation, do I mostly imagine forgiveness, or do I also imagine transformation?

What part of my life is Christ seeking to make new?

Q: What is sin?

A: Sin is turning away from God and his good ways.

Q: What does sin do?

A: Sin hurts our relationship with God, with others, and with the world God made.

TALK ABOUT IT

When something goes wrong, what is your first instinct: hide it, blame someone, fix it yourself, or ask for help? Why?

SHORT PRAYER

Jesus, thank you for loving us even when we do what is wrong. Thank you for forgiving us and helping us begin again. Teach our family to tell the truth, ask for forgiveness, and show grace to one another.

SIMPLE PRACTICE

Practice saying “I’m sorry.”

Once this week, create space as a family to name something you need to make right.

Teach us to know you rightly



PRAYER

Merciful God, search my heart and show me where sin has taken root. Teach me to stop hiding, excusing, and defending myself. Help me to trust the mercy of Christ, who gave himself for me, and to receive the new life only you can give.

CONFESSION

Merciful God, we confess that we have turned from you and chosen our own way. We have hidden, blamed, resisted, and wounded others. Forgive us for the sake of Christ, who bore our sin and gave himself for us.

BLESSING

May the Jesus who bore your sin, carried your shame, and conquered death fill you with the assurance of his mercy. Go in the freedom of forgiveness, the power of grace, and the hope of a life being made new.

Power is unavoidable. It shapes families, institutions, nations, relationships, and even the stories we tell about ourselves. The Christian faith makes a startling claim about where ultimate power now resides. The crucified Jesus has been raised, exalted, and seated at the right hand of the Father.

The resurrection and ascension declare that Jesus is not merely alive.

Jesus reigns. His rule also redefines power itself. In Jesus, power is not grasped, hoarded, or used to dominate. It is received from the Father and exercised for the good of others.

BIG IDEA

Jesus has been raised and enthroned as Lord. Christian power begins by living under his rule and learning to use whatever power we have in the shape of his kingdom.

We believe

“I believe on the third day he rose again from the dead. He ascended to heaven and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty.”

The creed moves from the humiliation of Jesus to his exaltation. The one who was crucified now reigns. To confess that Jesus is seated at the Father’s right hand is to say that history is not finally governed by presidents, markets, armies, corporations, algorithms, or our own ability to control our lives. **Jesus Christ is Lord.**

Follow up by asking: What does Jesus show us about how power should be used?

SHORT PRAYER

Jesus, our risen King, thank you that you are with us and that you are in charge. Help our family trust you when we are afraid. Teach us to use our strength, words, and choices to serve one another.

SIMPLE PRACTICE

Ask everyone in the family to identify one kind of “power” they already possess.

At the end of the week ask: “How did you use what God gave you to help someone else?”

Teach us to know you rightly



PRAYER

Risen and reigning Jesus, you have conquered death and are seated at the right hand of the Father. Teach us to trust your rule, follow your way, and use what you have given us to serve others.

CONFESSION

Lord Jesus, we confess that we often fear the powers around us and grasp for power of our own. We use influence for ourselves instead of for the good of others. Forgive us, and teach us the way of your kingdom.

BLESSING

May the risen Christ, who reigns above every power, give you courage when you are afraid, humility when you are given influence, and grace to use your strength in service of others. Go in the peace of Christ our King.

How Is Judgment Good News?

A THEOLOGY OF JUDGMENT

“I believe he will come to judge
the living and the dead.”

Overview

The promise of judgment can sound threatening because we often imagine judgment only as punishment. **Scripture gives us a larger vision.**

God judges because he loves what he has made. He sees what has been hidden, hears the cry of the oppressed, exposes evil, defends what is good, and refuses to allow violence and injustice to have the final word.

When Christians confess that Jesus will come again to judge the living and the dead, we are confessing that history is moving toward justice. Every evil will be named. Every wrong will be answered. Every life will be brought into the light of Christ.

BIG IDEA

God's judgment is good news because evil will not last forever. Jesus will come again to expose what is wrong, vindicate what is good, and put the world right.

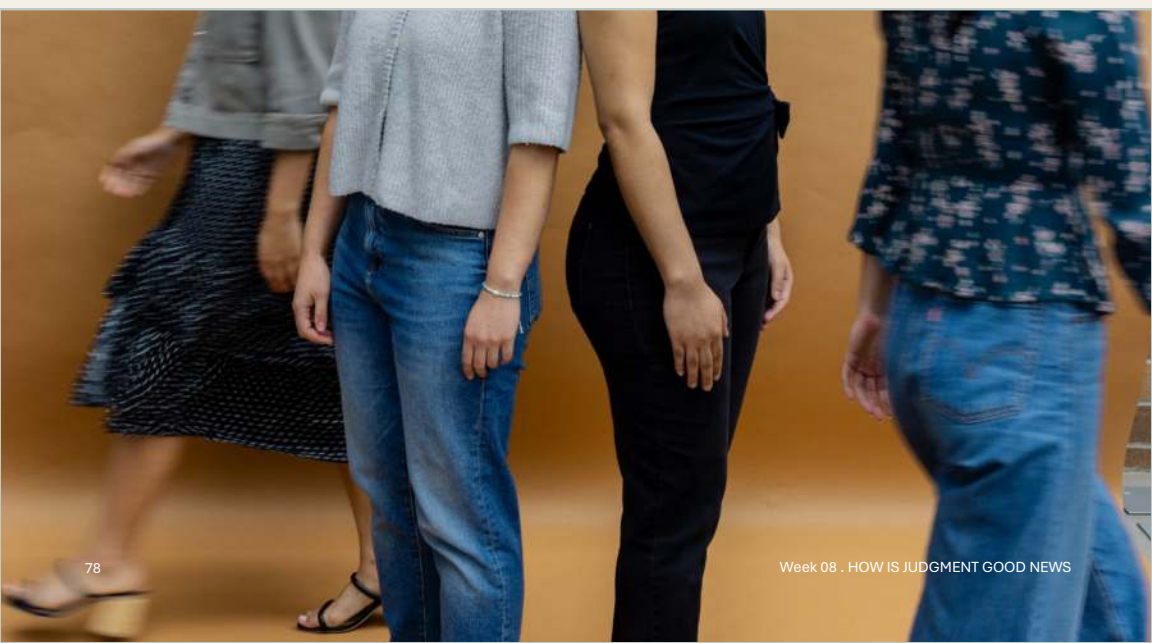
We believe

“I believe he will come to judge the living and the dead.”

Jesus is not absent from the future of the world. The risen and ascended Christ will return.

The creed reminds us that history has a destination.

Our lives matter. Our choices matter. Justice matters. And the final verdict over creation belongs neither to governments, cultures, nor the powerful, but to Jesus Christ. For those who belong to Christ, the coming judgment is not a reason to live in terror. It is a summons to hope, repentance, courage, and faithfulness.

May Jesus Christ, the righteous Judge and merciful King, give you courage to do what is right, hope when evil seems strong, and confidence that he will make all things new.

How Is God Present In The World?

A THEOLOGY OF THE SPIRIT

“I believe in the Holy Spirit.”

Overview

God has not left his people alone.

The Holy Spirit is **God's empowering presence**, dwelling within his people and at work in the world. The Spirit gives life, makes Christ present to us, transforms us into his likeness, and empowers us to participate in the work of God.

To believe in the Holy Spirit is to believe that God is not merely above us or around us. **God has come to dwell within us.**

BIG IDEA

The Holy Spirit is God's empowering presence, dwelling in us and working through us so that the life of Jesus becomes visible in the world.

We believe

“I believe in the Holy Spirit.”

The Spirit is not an impersonal force or spiritual energy. He is the Spirit of God, given to the people of God. Through the Spirit, the presence of God that once filled the tabernacle and temple now dwells within his people.

The Spirit makes Jesus known, gives life to what is dead, forms Christ in us, and gives ordinary people power to participate in God’s extraordinary work. Christianity is not simply learning to live like Jesus. **It is learning to live by the Spirit of Jesus.**

SIMPLE PRACTICE

Before leaving the house each morning, pause together for ten seconds. Open your hands and pray: “Holy Spirit, help us notice where you are at work today.”

Teach us to know you rightly



PRAYER

Come, Holy Spirit. Breathe life into what has grown tired within us. Make Jesus real to us. Form his character within us. Give us eyes to see where you are already at work. Give us courage to follow where you lead.

CONFESSION

We confess that we often attempt to follow Jesus without depending upon the Spirit of Jesus. We rely upon our strength. We trust our plans. We resist your leading. Forgive us for living as though we have been left on our own. Teach us again to walk by the Spirit.

BLESSING

May the Spirit who raised Jesus from the dead give life to you. May the Spirit who rested upon Jesus empower you. May the Spirit who has made his home within you form Christ in you.

Who Are God's People?

A THEOLOGY OF THE CHURCH

“I believe in the holy catholic church, the
communion of saints.”

Overview

The church is the community created by Jesus and gathered by the Spirit to embody the life of God's kingdom in the world.

From Abraham onward, God's purpose has been to form a people through whom his blessing would reach the nations. **In Jesus, that story comes to its fulfillment.** Jew and Gentile are gathered into one family, reconciled to God and one another, and sent into the world as a sign of God's coming new creation.

BIG IDEA

The church is God's new-creation people. A community gathered around Jesus, formed by the Spirit, and sent into the world as a sign of what God intends to do with all things.

We believe

“I believe in the holy catholic church,
the communion of saints.”

To confess belief in the church is not to claim that the church is always faithful, healthy, or worthy of our confidence.

It is to confess that **Jesus has chosen to have a people.**

The word catholic means universal. The church stretches across cultures, nations, generations, languages, and traditions. Wherever people belong to Jesus, they belong to one another.

To belong to Jesus is to belong to a people.

What's So Amazing About Grace?

A THEOLOGY OF GRACE

“I believe in the forgiveness of sins.”

Overview

Grace is at the heart of the Christian story. It is God's love given to people who cannot earn it, deserve it, or repay it.

The gospel announces that forgiveness is not something we achieve through enough regret, religious effort, or moral improvement. **In Jesus, God moves toward sinners first.**

Grace means our failures can be named without destroying us. Forgiveness means our past no longer has the final word.

Grace tells us that we are more sinful than we want to admit, yet in Christ we are more loved and accepted than we dared to hope.

BIG IDEA

Grace is God giving us what we could never earn: forgiveness, welcome, and a new beginning in Christ.

We believe

“I believe in the forgiveness of sins.”

To confess belief in the forgiveness of sins is to confess that sin is real, guilt is real, and mercy is greater.

Christians do not believe that God simply overlooks evil. **At the cross, God deals with it.** Forgiveness is costly because grace is costly. Yet the cost is borne by God himself.

Because we have been forgiven, we become a people learning to forgive.

Teach us to know you rightly



PRAYER

Gracious God, thank you for the mercy you give so freely. Teach us to receive your forgiveness and live from the freedom of your grace.

CONFESSION

Merciful God, we confess that we hide our failures, justify ourselves, and withhold forgiveness from others.
Forgive us, and make us people of grace.

BLESSING

May the grace of Christ free you from shame, teach you to forgive as you have been forgiven, and make your life a witness to the mercy of God.

What Happens In The End?

A THEOLOGY OF RESURRECTION HOPE

“I believe in the resurrection of the body, and the
life everlasting. Amen.”

Overview

Christian hope is bigger than the promise that we will “go to heaven when we die.” The biblical story ends with **resurrection, renewal, and God dwelling with his people in a restored creation**. What God did for Jesus on Easter morning, he intends one day to do for all who belong to Christ. Our bodies will be raised. Creation will be renewed. Death will be defeated.

This means Christian hope is neither escape from the world nor optimism about human progress. It is confidence that the God who raised Jesus from the dead will finish what he began.

BIG IDEA

Christian hope is not that we escape the world, but that God will raise the dead, renew creation, and dwell with his people forever.

We believe

“I believe in the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.”

To confess the resurrection of the body is to say that **death does not get the final word over anything God loves**. The God who created bodies will raise bodies. The God who called creation good will renew creation. And the life everlasting is not simply endless existence. It is life healed and whole in the presence of God, when everything fractured by sin and death has finally been made new.

BLESSING

May the God who raised Jesus from the dead fill you with resurrection hope, strengthen you to live faithfully today, and keep your eyes fixed on the day when all things will be made new. Come Lord Jesus!
