

5 Day Devotional

Day 1: The Seed and the Promise

Devotional

Most of us have held a seed in our hand and marveled at how something so small and seemingly lifeless could become something so full of life. It does not look like much. But buried in the ground, something extraordinary happens.

Paul uses this exact image in 1 Corinthians 15 to describe what happens to us. Our bodies, fragile and fading, are like seeds. And what God promises is that what goes into the ground perishable will come out imperishable. What is buried in weakness will be raised in power.

This is not wishful thinking. This is the promise of a God who has already proven He can do it. Jesus Christ died and rose again, and in doing so, He became the first fruits of what is coming for every person who trusts in Him.

You are not at the end of your story. You are in the middle of it. The best is still ahead, and it is more glorious than anything you can imagine right now.

If you are carrying grief today, or fear, or uncertainty about what comes next, let this truth settle into your heart. God is not finished. He is growing something in you that death itself cannot stop.

Bible Verse

'But someone will ask, How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come? You foolish person! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies.' - 1 Corinthians 15:35-36

Reflection Question

In what area of your life do you need to trust that God is growing something beautiful, even when it feels like things are buried and lifeless?

Quote

You are a seed. And what Paul is writing here, what Paul is promising here, is that in Christ, the water, the fertilization, everything necessary to take that death and turn it into life exists.

Prayer

Lord, thank You for the promise that death is not the end. Help me to trust that You are at work even in the seasons that feel like loss. Grow in me a hope that is rooted in Your resurrection power.

Day 2: He Beat the King of Death

Devotional

There is a moment in history that changed everything. A tomb was sealed, guards were posted, and the world held its breath. And then, on the third day, Jesus walked out.

This was not a symbol. It was not a metaphor. It was a real man, in a real body, defeating real death. And because He did, nothing is the same.

Paul declares it plainly: death is swallowed up in victory. The King of Death has been met, fought, and beaten. The door that had been locked since the very first human death was forced open by Jesus Christ, and it will never be shut again.

For those of us who follow Him, this means death has lost its final word over us. The grave is not our destination. It is a doorway.

This truth is meant to change how you live today, not just how you feel about dying someday. When you know the ending of the story, you can live with courage in the middle of it. You can face hard things, love difficult people, and keep going when life feels heavy, because you know that none of this is the final chapter.

He is risen. And that changes everything.

Bible Verse

'Death is swallowed up in victory. O death, where is your victory? O death, where is your sting?' - 1 Corinthians 15:54-55

Reflection Question

If you truly believed that death had no final victory over you, what would you do differently starting today?

Quote

He is the first fruits, the pioneer of life. He has forced open a door that has been locked since the death of the first man he has met, fought and beaten the King of Death. Everything is different because Christ has done this.

Prayer

Jesus, thank You for walking out of that tomb and opening the door for me. Help me to live today with the confidence that comes from knowing You have already won. Let that victory shape every choice I make.

Day 3: The Kingdom Starts Now

Devotional

It is easy to think of heaven as something we wait for. A reward at the end of a long road. Something we earn by enduring this life faithfully until we finally get to the good part.

But that is not what Scripture teaches. The resurrected life is not a future event you are waiting to enter. It is a present reality you are invited to live in right now.

Jesus rose from the dead, and in doing so, He launched a new kind of kingdom. A kingdom where death does not have the final word. Where grief is held with hope. Where relationships matter eternally. Where every act of love and every whispered prayer carries weight that outlasts this world.

You do not have to wait for heaven to taste this glory. You can have it now, in the way you love your neighbor, in the way you show up for someone who is hurting, in the way you worship even when life is hard.

The kingdom of God is not coming someday. It is here, and you are part of it. Every day you choose to live in the resurrected truth of Jesus Christ, you are participating in something that will echo into eternity.

Start today. The kingdom is already open.

Bible Verse

'But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.' - 1 Corinthians 15:57

Reflection Question

What is one practical way you could live more like a citizen of God's eternal kingdom today, rather than simply surviving the moment in front of you?

Quote

We don't have to wait for heaven to taste this glory. We can have it now.

Prayer

Father, help me to stop waiting for someday and start living in the reality of Your kingdom today. Open my eyes to the eternal significance of the ordinary moments in my life. Let me live like the resurrection is real.

Day 4: Nothing You Do Is Wasted

Devotional

Have you ever wondered if what you do actually matters? You pray, but the situation does not change. You serve, but no one seems to notice. You love someone who does not love you back. And quietly, a question creeps in: is any of this worth it?

Paul answers that question with one of the most encouraging statements in all of Scripture. Your labor in the Lord is not in vain. Not a single bit of it.

Every relationship you honor, every prayer you offer, every moment of genuine love and service, these things are not lost when this life ends. They are woven into the fabric of eternity. They endure. They matter forever.

What you build on your own will end when you end. But what you do in Christ outlasts everything. A hug given in love. A word spoken in faith. A quiet act of kindness done in His name. These things echo into forever.

So do not grow weary. Do not let the silence or the slow progress convince you that your faithfulness is pointless. God sees every act of love. He honors every prayer. He remembers every sacrifice made in His name.

You are not wasting your life. In Christ, you are building something that will never be destroyed.

Bible Verse

'Therefore, my beloved brothers, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain.' - 1 Corinthians 15:58

Reflection Question

Is there an area of faithful service in your life where you have started to wonder if it is making a difference? How does the promise that your labor is not in vain change how you see that situation?

Quote

Your work is not in vain. Your love is not in vain. Your prayers are not in vain. Everything matters, though we may die.

Prayer

Lord, on the days when faithfulness feels thankless, remind me that You see everything done in Your name. Give me the strength to keep going, knowing that nothing I do for You is ever wasted.

Day 5: Living Like It Changes Everything

Devotional

Knowing the truth and living the truth are two very different things.

Most believers know that Jesus rose from the dead. We say it in our creeds, we sing it in our songs, and we celebrate it every Easter. But if we are honest, many of us live as though this life is all there is. We chase comfort, avoid hard conversations, hold back from real vulnerability, and quietly treat eternity like a distant idea rather than a present reality.

But the resurrection is not just a doctrine to believe. It is a life to live.

Because Jesus defeated death, you can face your fears without being controlled by them. You can grieve without losing hope. You can give generously, love sacrificially, and serve faithfully, knowing that none of it is wasted. You can look at the hard things in your life and say, this is temporary, and eternity is coming.

This is not about pretending life is easy. It is about living with a confidence that goes deeper than your circumstances. It is about surrounding yourself with people who remind you of the truth, worshiping with the full weight of what Christ has done, and choosing eternal gain over temporary relief, one day at a time.

He is risen. Now live like it changes everything. Because it does.

Bible Verse

'For this perishable body must put on the imperishable, and this mortal body must put on immortality.'
- 1 Corinthians 15:53

Reflection Question

What is keeping you from fully living in the resurrected truth of Jesus Christ, and what would it look like to take one step toward that today?

Quote

What is keeping you from declaring he is risen and living like it changes everything.

Prayer

Jesus, You rose from the dead and You offer me that same victory. Help me to stop living small and start living like Your resurrection is real. Let my life today reflect the hope I have in You.
