The Time is NOW!

RAMP Events

Each summer, beginning in either March or April, we hold an event called RAMP - Reach Access Mobile Partnership.

That's a fancy way to say we bring together several partner and support agencies from the area on one day at a local park and offer services, supplies, and support for our folks surviving on the streets of Pocatello.

Partners such as the Free Clinic bring their van and offer screenings, resources and more. Our traveling Veterinarian brings services for pets and vaccines. We have several local stylists who come and provide haircuts. A local churches brings clothing from their clothes closet.

Valley Mission supplies free lunch and other items, and serves as the check-in point for all of our neighbors.

This event brings together the homeless community in one location and allows our partner agencies to connect with them. Many of our neighbors don't make it to other appointments, so RAMP serves as an opportunity for us to meet face to face and get the care and support they need.

These events are on the 3rd Wednesday of each month through October, weather permitting, and are held at the Union Pacific park (near the underpass).

Our objective is to open the Food Pantry by Summer/Fall 2026, followed by the development of the shelter, office, and kitchen, with the final phase of Transformational Living Space set for Winter.

\$80,000 was raised through Idaho Gives!

Remaining costs are estimated at:

- Security camera/system: \$25,000
- Shelter bed system: \$40,000
- Windows: \$98,000
- Bath fixtures: \$70,000
- Insulation and sheetrock: \$110,000
- HVAC systems: \$115,000
- Elevator: \$122,000
- Electrical and fire alarm: \$150,000
- Kitchen equipment: **DONATED \$200,000**

Total Estimate: \$730,000



Uncle Henry

Every day, people come and go in our lives. Some are quickly forgotten, while others stay with us for a lifetime. We don't usually decide who will occupy our short-term or long-term memories; sometimes it happens automatically, and other times we make a conscious choice to remember.

However, there are those special individuals whose presence leaves a lasting impression, making an impact that cannot be overlooked. They resonate with us in a unique way, striking a chord in our hearts that draws us closer, often unexpectedly.

Uncle Henry was one such person who captured my heart. His warm smile, infectious laughter, and the way he made you feel truly special were unforgettable.

His genuine concern for me was evident. Whenever he saw me rushing through my busy days, he would express his worry: "You're always working so hard. I pray for you every day, Karl." This came from a man struggling to survive on the streets of Pocatello, living outside the Valley Mission, on the patio of First Baptist Church, or beneath a tree in the nearby park. He had plenty of reasons to pray for himself, yet he chose to care for others, especially those who sought to make his life more bearable, even if just for a day. His passing has profoundly affected me and many on our team; we cared deeply for him and find ourselves wondering if we could have done more.

I kindly ask that you pray for Henry's family, particularly his daughter, seeking comfort and peace during this difficult time. She loved him dearly and will miss him greatly.

Please also remember our neighbors on the streets, who are mourning this loss alongside us, as Henry had built close relationships with many of them. Pray for their safety and health, and for moments of rest amid their struggle for survival.

Finally, we pray for our city to recognize the urgent need for better solutions now and to support our efforts to serve this community.

Here is a quick look at the progress so far:

- Fire sprinklers being tested and correcting any leaks.
- Plumbing has about 2 weeks (or less) to finish off rough-in throughout the building.
- Windows and doors will be cut and framed in on the first floor.
- Cabling for security and internet are in the process of installation.

There are so many moving pieces in a build like this. It may look like random pieces being worked on, but there is a method and a sequence that guides the construction. In the end, it will all be worth it!

Food Pantry Opportunities

There are a few ways to serve:

Wednesdays, 8 am - 11:30 am

Food is delivered from our 14 stores as well as from the Idaho Foodbank. Unloading, sorting, organizing and building food boxes takes place on this day.

Thursdays, 10 am to 11 am

Additional food deliveries from some of the same stores. Unloading, sorting and organizing takes place here.

Thursdays, 3:30 to 6 pm

Food is distributed to the community. Most 'jobs' deal with serving the guest as well as carrying boxes to their vehicles.
