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Construction History – Continued from April

We continue our conversation regarding construction progress:

- January 2026: The fire sprinkler system is installed and passes the air test at the end of January! At the same time, we began receiving some funds to get back on track with other contractors.
- February to Now: We are excited to say that plumbing is just about complete throughout the building. This keeps us ahead of pace on the overall project. Electrical is also installed throughout the Food Pantry area and is going in on the second floor. Data cables will begin installing the first part of May.
- It may sound simple, but we have also installed one of the dorm room windows on the second floor. This was necessary so the contractor had a good template for the other 20+ windows and frames that will be needed.

So what's next?

We are trying to get projects completed in order to open the Food Pantry by summer/fall of this year. But that takes planning, adjusting, and coordinating. We'll need window cuts, and then we can insulate. Once insulation is in, we can test the fire sprinkler system. Once the system is tested we can begin some sheetrock in the Food Pantry area.

In other words, there is a LOT going on – and even more to come as we raise the funds!

As seen in the pictures to the left, electrical is in the Food Pantry area and ready to move to the next step. HVAC units have been installed and duct work is beginning to be installed, plumbing is just about installed, data cables are being installed - so much going on!

The Humanitarian Branch of the LDS Church has granted \$200,000 for kitchen equipment!



Our objective is to open the Food Pantry by Summer/Fall 2026, followed by the development of the shelter, office, and kitchen, with the final phase of Transformational Living Space set for Winter. The Food Pantry funding still needed is just under \$100,000, which is our goal for Idaho Gives.

Remaining costs are estimated at:

- Security camera/system: \$25,000
- Shelter bed system: \$40,000
- Windows: \$98,000
- Bath fixtures: \$70,000
- Insulation and sheetrock: \$110,000
- HVAC systems: \$115,000
- Elevator: \$122,000
- Electrical and fire alarm: \$150,000
- Kitchen equipment: **DONATED \$200,000**

Total Estimate: \$730,000



Prayers for Our Neighbors on the Streets

Every week, we have the privilege of reaching out to our neighbors who are living on the streets, in their cars, or along the river—wherever we can find them. This is not a way anyone should have to live, and for many, it's all they have ever known. One man has spent over 20 years on the streets, while another has been there for at least the last decade. Each individual carries stories and circumstances that have led them to this situation and kept them there.

We visit them as often as possible, bringing along people with various skills and connections to help guide them toward a better way of life. However, the ultimate choice to seek change or remain in their current circumstances lies with them. Improving their situation isn't simply about finding a job, stopping substance use, or seeking help. While these steps are crucial, building trust and understanding their unique stories takes time. Moreover, transforming lives requires more than just the efforts of Valley Mission and its partners; we need the city to recognize the harsh reality. There are between 140 and 200 individuals sleeping on the streets each night in Pocatello, and they have limited options for the assistance they need.

One particular group resides in a river encampment. For various reasons, they do not qualify for local shelters, struggle to secure stable employment due to a lack of transportation, clothing, and hygiene, and some have past experiences that hinder their chances of being hired. Their only familiarity is with their current living conditions and how to survive there.

Recently, this group received an ultimatum from the city to relocate without any guidance or support to find a new place. Valley Mission and the Housing Alliance Community Partnership (HACP) have collaborated to seek solutions, including purchasing or leasing property and finding suitable buildings. Unfortunately, none of these options have proven successful. As a result, they will need to move again, living in fear of being forced to relocate in just two weeks. This situation exacerbates their trauma and brings them closer to despair.

This is just one of many reasons we urgently need to open this building. I want to emphasize that while Valley Mission is not *the* solution, we aspire to be part of a larger answer moving forward.

Please pray for our neighbors on the streets—for peace amid chaos, for restful moments, for their safety, and for the city to awaken to the pressing need for improved solutions right now.
