Dear Cheney UMC Friends,

As many of you know, the Men's Soccer World Cup is currently taking place in Canada, Mexico, and the United States. Every four years, the world comes together to experience the joy and beauty of the game. I love that about this sport.

For a moment, people of different nations, languages, religions, and political convictions gather around something they share. But this month, I've found myself thinking about something else: the Jesus we often see displayed by athletes and celebrities.

One of the German players, Felix Nmecha, knelt on the field and thanked God in prayer. In many ways, I find that beautiful. I am always moved when people speak openly about their faith. But over the years, I've noticed a pattern.

Again and again, a professional athlete, singer, or actor publicly proclaims their faith in Jesus. And that is wonderful. Sometimes it is deeply genuine and inspiring. Yet when I listen more carefully, it often seems to be the same version of Jesus:

- A Jesus who is evangelical, fundamentalist, exclusive, and at times even hostile toward queer people.
- A Jesus who is strong in comforting, but weak in disturbing.
- Deeply personal, but often silent about social realities.
- A Jesus who fits comfortably into a world where success is seen as God's blessing: I made it. I am successful. I am wealthy. I am popular. Thank God.

But this Jesus rarely asks, "At whose expense did you make it?"

This isn't accidental. It is a particular image of Jesus.

Much of modern evangelical spirituality focuses on personal conversion, individual holiness, and my relationship with my Jesus. Even many contemporary worship songs revolve around "I," "me," and "my Jesus," while community and our shared responsibility for one another fade into the background.

And don't misunderstand me, that personal relationship with Jesus matters. It is one side of the coin. But by itself, it is incomplete.

Because something important often gets lost: **structural sin**. The systems and powers that crush people, and the question of whether our faith challenges those systems or quietly protects them.

When we look at the real Jesus, we see a brown, Jewish man from Galilee, a poor man living in an occupied and colonized land. He was executed not because he was merely pious, but because he was dangerous to the religious and political powers of his day.

Jesus didn't simply place **Luke 4:18** in his Instagram bio. He lived it:

***"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me
to bring good news to the poor.
He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery
of sight to the blind, to set free those who are oppressed."***

This Jesus is not an accessory for successful careers. He is a holy troublemaker.

Bishop Desmond Tutu once said that a faith that is unconcerned with this world becomes "pie in the sky" - a promise of heaven later that leaves injustice untouched today.

I sometimes wonder if we have created a Jesus who has very little to say about queer people who have been pushed out of churches, about racism that still shapes our institutions, about class divisions and who can afford the "blessed" lifestyle we celebrate, or about the exclusion of people with disabilities.

These silences are not accidental. They reveal a theology that has forgotten structural sin and has polished Jesus until there is nothing dangerous about him anymore.

This is not an attack on individual Christians or athletes. It is a question about the image of Jesus that has been allowed to run unquestioned through stadiums, award speeches, and viral prayer circles for decades.

So perhaps the question for all of us is this:

Which Jesus are we following?

And perhaps even more importantly:

What does it truly cost us to follow him?

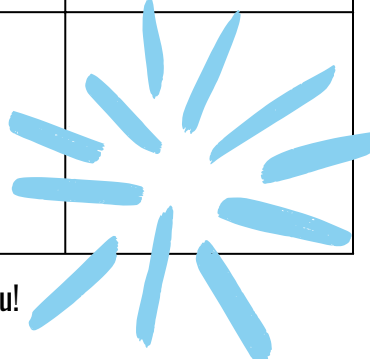

An Update on Our Construction Project

Dear Cheney UMC Family,

As many of you have already heard, we have a construction issue that needs to be addressed sooner rather than later. Rather than simply repairing the problem, we saw this as an opportunity to dream about the future of our church building and ask an important question:

How can our facility better serve our ministry and our community for years to come?

To help us with that process, we invited the architectural team from FUSE to evaluate the wall facing 4th Street and to look at other possibilities for improving our building. Some of the ideas that have been discussed include better sanctuary lighting and automatic doors to improve accessibility for people of all abilities.

We also wanted your voices to be part of the process. On April 23, we held an open meeting where members of the congregation shared ideas and hopes for our building. One of the themes that emerged was the desire for a larger and more functional Fellowship Hall, especially on Sunday mornings and during church events.

Following that meeting, a smaller team met two additional times with FUSE to discuss the concerns and ideas that were raised, explore what is possible, and begin developing some potential designs.

Phase One remains our highest priority: addressing the wall along 4th Street. We are excited about a beautiful and practical design concept that not only solves the problem but also enhances the appearance of our church. You can see some of the design images in this newsletter.

Because of that excitement, there is a possibility that we may have more people interested than we can reasonably accommodate. If we do reach our capacity, priority will be given to active participants and members of Cheney UMC, as this trip grew out of our church community and ministry together.

I hope you understand this decision, and I am deeply grateful for the enthusiasm and excitement surrounding this adventure.

Thank You, Cheney UMC

I am so proud of our church. On June 16, the Upriver Fire broke out in Spokane Valley. Fueled by strong winds, the fire spread quickly, destroying more than 15 homes and tragically claiming one life. Even for those whose homes survived, events like this leave deep emotional and spiritual wounds. In moments like these, I am especially grateful to be part of the United Methodist Church.

Immediately, Spokane Valley UMC, under the direction of the Red Cross, became an emergency shelter for those who had been displaced. At the same time, UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) reached out to Pastor Alissa and myself to see if we could help staff the Resource Center in Spokane Valley, supporting with volunteers and offering a listening ear, words of comfort, and practical assistance to those affected.

Because Spokane Valley UMC was preparing for Annual Conference, Cheney UMC stepped in. Within only an hour of sending out the request, many of you offered your time and energy. Together, we covered Friday and Saturday at the Resource Center with three wonderful volunteers all day long.

I was deeply moved by your willingness to serve, and so was Kathy Bryson, our UMCOR liaison, who sends her heartfelt thanks as well. Thank you for being the church. Thank you for your prayers, your presence, and your willingness to help when our neighbors needed us most. In times of tragedy, you reminded people that they are not alone and that God's love is still present, often through the simple acts of kindness and compassion offered by ordinary people.

Coffee (and more!) that Reflects Our Values

You may have tasted (or smelled) a recent change here at Cheney UMC, particularly during Sunday fellowship time. This change may have seemed sudden, but it actually arose from a churchwide examination.

As a church, Cheney UMC has spent time exploring how to better care for creation, including our recent Serviceberry series, and the Creation Care team headed by Ronda Cordill. We have examined our own individual and church-wide impacts on climate, poverty, and being good neighbors and stewards. Changes over the past few years have included our reduction of single-use dinnerware and reducing our use of disposable paper products. We have also tried some eco-friendly low-waste cleaning supplies around the building, thanks to our locally owned (by a church member, no less!) Evergreen Refillery.

As the new office administrator, along with learning about purchasing supplies, I was tasked by Pastor Damian to factor in Social Justice and our church values when ordering. Thanks to the Church Council and Nurturing Team leaders' discussions, we have been making some sourcing changes that are better for the world (and our church funds!). There have been a few simple swaps, including the ordering of cleaning supplies, toilet paper, and more, to Evergreen Refillery, and ensuring copy paper is 100% recycled or even entirely tree-free (sugarcane waste!).

Finding coffee that fits our values, budget, and coffee connoisseur standards (especially Pastor's!), we now serve Equal Exchange Fellowship Blend after service. It seems like a simple thing, but we are actually making a strong statement about our values as a community.

We are affirming our commitment to keeping small farmers on their land, empowering them to feed their families, and retaining economic control. We see the importance of working with indigenous producers and women, as sustainable agriculture is key to fighting climate change.

Founded in 1986, Equal Exchange partnered with coffee farmers organized in a movement founded by Catholic priests (through studying and living liberation theology). By collaborating with small farmer cooperatives and offering fair prices and pre-harvest financing, Equal Exchange supported small producers' access to global markets. Equal Exchange now works with 24 farmer groups in 11 countries, buying about 5.5 million pounds of green coffee beans annually. The company exclusively sources from small-scale cooperatives, ensuring high-quality coffee for U.S. consumers.

We now proudly serve coffee that reflects our social justice values. (And hot chocolate, too!)

Greetings from Zambia!

The United Methodist Church is alive and thriving here at a special place called Kafakumba, located near Ndola, Zambia. The Kafakumba ministry began in 1999 and has grown into a remarkable outreach that serves the surrounding communities through several ministries, including the Training Center (with the Pastor's School at its heart), a primary and secondary school (Grades 1–10), a medical clinic, God's Kids, well drilling, Journey of Transformation, and logistics support.

Our hostess during our stay has been Elinda Steury, who manages the Kafakumba Medical Clinic. Rosana and Elinda first met in 2018 when Rosana participated in her first nursing study abroad while attending school in Melbourne, Florida. They quickly became close friends, and over the years, Elinda has become an invaluable mentor in helping Rosana organize Washington State University's first nursing study abroad program to Zambia.

The WSU nursing students have participated in several clinical rotations that they describe as a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to see how healthcare is practiced where resources are often limited. One example was witnessing a new mother who, after giving birth, was offered the equivalent of Tylenol for pain relief because stronger medications simply were not available.

Student rotations included three days at Roan Antelope General Hospital, one day at the Fisenge village clinic, one day at the Kafakumba Clinic, and a full day of medical outreach in the remote village of Kenyenda.

Several students shared that the outreach clinic in Kenyenda was the most meaningful experience of the trip. After a 90-minute drive from Kafakumba, the team spent six busy hours caring for patients. They worked alongside a Zambian Clinical Officer (similar to a Physician Assistant), two Zambian nurses, and an American missionary nurse. Under supervision, the students assisted with triage, patient assessments, and treatment. Common concerns included respiratory illnesses, symptoms of malaria—which frequently resulted in positive test results—and other medical conditions requiring referrals to the nearest hospital for specialized care.

Kafakumba is filling an enormous need in this region. Government-run hospitals and clinics often struggle with limited funding, resulting in shortages of medications, supplies, and equipment. One particularly difficult experience for the students involved caring for a young child during a painful wound-care procedure. Because local anesthetic medication was unavailable, the child had to endure a level of pain that would almost certainly have been prevented in a U.S. hospital. It was a sobering reminder of the challenges faced by healthcare providers and patients alike. The experience deeply affected the students and brought many of them to tears.

As we reflect on the past four weeks, we are filled with gratitude for the opportunity to witness God's work in Zambia and to partner with the wonderful people of Kafakumba. While we are looking forward to returning home to Cheney and seeing our friends and family again, we leave with a greater appreciation for the resilience, faith, and compassion of the people we have met. Although this year's study abroad has come to an end, plans are already underway to return next year and continue building these meaningful relationships and opportunities for service.

New Youth Ministry starts in Fall 2026!

We are excited to share some wonderful news! Beginning in September 2026, a new ecumenical youth ministry will launch in Cheney: SEED Youth Ministry. (And no, this is not SEED Campus Ministry—although there is a connection!) SEED Youth Ministry is a partnership between Cheney United Methodist Church, Cheney Congregational Church, and the Episcopal Church of the Resurrection. Together, we want to create a welcoming, inclusive, and Christ-centered community where young people can ask questions, build friendships, serve others, and grow in faith.

This ministry will be guided by an ecumenical board. Representing Cheney UMC are Macey Fredenberg, Kevin Thorson, and Regina Yancey, and we are grateful for their willingness to serve.

We are thrilled to announce that the ministry has received a \$5,700 grant from the Pacific Northwest Conference's Ministry Opportunity Fund (MOF). In addition, SEED Campus Ministry has committed \$20,000 over the next two years to help fund a part-time Youth Pastor position. To make this ministry sustainable beyond those first two years, we will be inviting all three churches to invest financially in its future.

We are currently searching for a part-time Youth Pastor and are also looking for volunteers who have a heart for young people. Our current plan is to gather on Tuesday evenings:

- **5:00–6:30 p.m. – Middle School Youth Group**
- **6:30 p.m. – Shared Dinner**
- **7:00–8:30 p.m. – High School Youth Group**

We believe that young people are an important part of the church right now. In a world of constant pressure and competing voices, they need a place where they are loved just as they are and can encounter a healthy faith in a loving God. 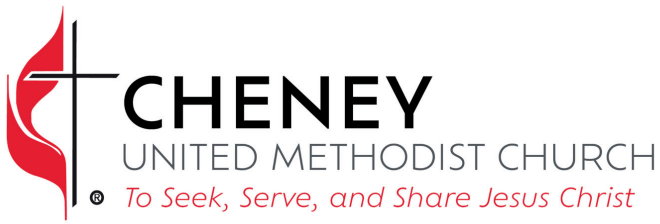
