1. When you hear the word honor, what first comes to mind? Why do you think honor is often confused with being nice, polite, or respectful?
2. The sermon said, “Where honor is freely given, life begins to flourish. Where dishonor is freely given, everything begins to unravel.”
Where have you seen that prove true?
3. Why do you think Scripture specifically commands us to honor our father and mother and how can someone honor a parent without pretending that everything in the relationship was healthy or good?
4. How can Christians honor civil authorities without agreeing with every policy or idolizing the person in office?
5. In 1 Peter 3:7, wives are called a “weaker vessel”. Discuss the analogy of a tea cup vs a beer mug. What does that say about strength, authority, and responsibility in marriage?
6. Why does Leviticus 19:32 command honor for the aged?
How does honoring older people challenge a culture that often values youth, productivity, beauty, speed, and usefulness?
7. Discuss this statement: “Honoring someone else is not dependent on the other person’s character. Honoring someone else is dependent on your character.”
8. Romans 12:10 says to “outdo one another in showing honor.”
What would it look like if a church actually tried to outdo one another in honor?
9. The sermon said, “Honor elevates people; dishonor diminishes them.” What are some ways dishonor reduces people to their worst moment, weakness, or failure?
10. In Mark 6, the people of Nazareth dishonored Jesus because they were too familiar with Him. How can familiarity keep us from receiving what God wants to give through someone?
11. The sermon says honor is often tested in failure, disagreement, struggle, or betrayal. Why is it harder to show honor in those moments, and what would Christlike honor look like there?
