Reflection Questions 07/05/2026

1. The sermon says, "The God of yesterday is the God of today." Why is that important to remember when we face present-day fears?
2. In Numbers 13–14, the spies saw the same land but came back with very different conclusions. What made Caleb and Joshua interpret the situation differently?
3. Why do you think the Israelites so quickly forgot the miracles God had just done for them in Egypt and at the Red Sea?
4. What are some ways we experience spiritual amnesia today?
5. The ten spies calculated the giants against themselves, while Caleb calculated the giants against God. Where are you tempted to measure the problem only against your own strength?
6. The Israelites wanted to go back to Egypt and back to slavery. Why and when are we often tempted to return to old patterns, sins, or places of bondage?
7. What are some examples of "Egypt" that Christians might be tempted to return to today?
8. The sermon says the promised land is a place of abundance, but not necessarily a place of comfort. Why is that distinction important?
9. What are some "giants" in our culture that intimidate Christians from representing Jesus faithfully?
10. Joshua and Caleb said, "The Lord is with us; do not fear them." How does God's presence change the way we interpret opposition?
11. Do you currently have "Calebs and Joshuas" in your life — people who help you see God as bigger than the giants? If so, who are they?
12. How does the cross and resurrection of Jesus change the way we face fear, sin, death, and opposition?
