Yet, comfort has a way of slipping away from us, doesn't it? That comfortable sofa on Sunday afternoon gives way to 8:00 Monday morning all too soon. That great meal is quickly digested and we feel hunger pains again. Even greater than these minor discomforts is knowing that we have failed our God in so many ways that we can't even count them all. This is the source of all our discomfort.

There is comfort, however, *LASTING COMFORT*, for us Easter Christians! Jesus' resurrection, triumphant over the grave, triumphant over the power of the devil, triumphant over the sin of the world, gives the final answering comfort to all who are discomforted by their sin.

What greater comfort is there than to have peace with God through the forgiveness of sins? What greater comfort is there than knowing that this blessing is entirely God's free gift to each one of us? What greater comfort than to be servants for Jesus, who are moved into action by their faith? What greater comfort than to take all our tragedies and triumphs to our Living Lord in prayer? 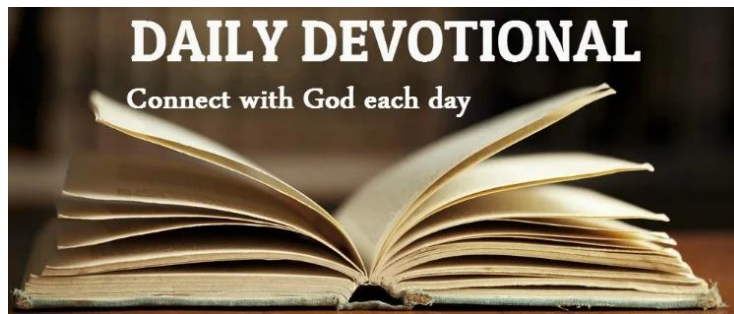

Sick Child Needs Our Help - Milo is the 4-year-old son of Matt Hambleton (Lowe's store manager) and on January 4, 2026, he was diagnosed with Acute Myeloid Leukemia. The next year of Milo's life will entail long hospital stays, intensive chemotherapy and a marrow transplant. Mom has quit her job, and Matt is taking a long absence from work so they can be with their child during this difficult time. We of St. Paul Lutheran Church can assist them by taken on the following ministry: 1) Spread the news of this dreadful event to everyone you know, 2) Ask everyone to pray for the family during this spiritually and physically difficult time, and 3) Go to <https://GoFundMe.com> Search for Milo Hamilton and make a donation to help cover the medical and living expenses for the family as their income will be significantly reduced over the next year.

UPDATE: A bone marrow match has been found from a donor. The procedure was delayed because Milo caught an infection. After being home from the hospital several weeks, the infection is cleared and the procedure to save little Milo's life is being scheduled.

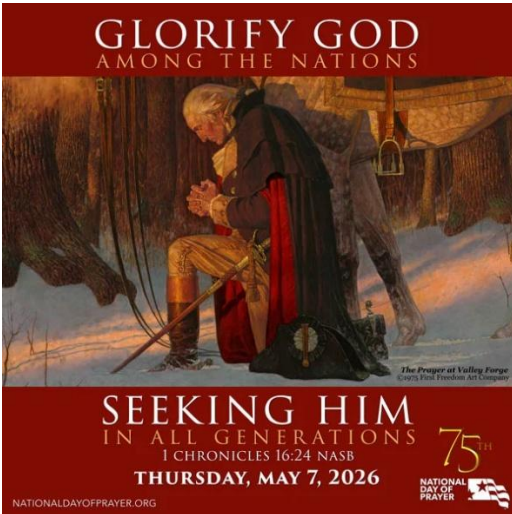

Is being a Christian MORE than attending a Church Service?

Being a Christian shows in your Commitments and Action. These are the "fruits" or results in the life of a person who fully follows Jesus Christ. It takes discipline, prayer, and love for Christ to constantly through life keep growing in these habits.

7 Doors of Spiritual Growth

In response to God's grace to me in Jesus Christ, I commit to on-going growth in all the disciplines of the Christian faith, which include:

- ◆ **Witness** to Christ in all I say and do,
- ◆ **Worship** Christ with my life daily and with my fellow Christians weekly,
- ◆ **Connect** with others in my congregation as well as in a small group,
- ◆ **Pray** regularly for others, especially the lost, as well as for myself,
- ◆ **Study** the Bible on my own as well as with my fellow Christians,
- ◆ **Serve** God and others inside as well as outside the church, and
- ◆ **Give** a percentage of my financial resources to extend the cause of Christ, making a tenth (tithe) as my minimum goal.

I have noticed that this Lententide has felt heavier than usual, with war in Iran having commenced after much building of tensions. The Persian members of our church and community also feel this pressure very strongly. On average, we have had less people attending our Persian Bible studies and outreach center days since the war in Iran began this past month. The happenings in Iran deeply impact the day-to-day lives of those who have family still living in Iran. It is not uncommon for members of our church and outreach community to be unable to attend events or services because they are overwhelmed by sorrow, stress, and other emotions.

Throughout this all, it is critical that we keep in mind the intentionality of prayer and praise which is the season of Lent. Christ endured the temptation of Satan for 40 days before willingly taking the path to the cross to suffer and die for our sakes. All of this He did out of obedience to the Father and love for us. He loves us, more than any of us could believe possible on our own!

We remember this, and give Him thanks and praise, especially in the times we feel overwhelmed by the weight of the world. He already carried it. Thanks be to God! +

14 Ideas for Sharing the Story of Easter with Your Grandchildren



No matter the age, from wee little ones to the oldest grandchildren, do not let this holiday pass without taking the opportunity to help your grandkids understand what Easter is all about. Eternal hope is something we all need in this broken world full of fear and anxiety. You can turn your grandchildren’s hearts and minds to the promises of God this Easter season. When all seemed hopeless, Jesus rose from the grave, bringing abundant Joy and Hope.

Consider the Younger Grandchildren

Remember that parts of this story can be difficult for the youngest, so choose parts and ideas to share with your grandchildren’s ages, personalities, and interests in mind. No matter

how dark the days may get, Sunday is coming! Regardless of age, they can catch your excitement and joy that Jesus is alive!

It may be hard to think of things to do with the littlest of our grandchildren, yet even they can listen to the story. There are wonderful books and songs out there.

An example sung to the tune of *Happy Birthday* is “I’m so glad for Easter. It’s such a happy day! Jesus came back to life, He’s alive today! I’m so glad for Easter. It’s such a happy day! Let’s tell the Good News – Jesus still lives today!”

Or sing this one to the tune of *Are You Sleeping?* “Sweet little one, sing for joy; Easter day! Celebrate! Jesus is alive! Jesus is alive! Sing for joy, sing for joy.” You can also make up songs using easy preschool tunes.

25 Ideas for Sharing Easter

Below is a list of activities and ideas to do in person or virtually. Be creative and have fun, adapting and modifying them so they work for you.

1. **Coloring Eggs** – As you spend time together, talk about when you were young and how you celebrated Easter. What were those traditions that meant so much to you and that you desire to pass on? Talk about creation, new birth, and all the colors God made.
2. **Egg Hunt** – There are so many ways to do an egg hunt. Stress that while finding the eggs brings so much joy, the women finding the tomb empty brought rejoicing that is still celebrated today.
3. **Verse Egg Hunt** – Choose an age-appropriate Easter verse, such as John 3:16, Romans 5:8, or Luke 24:6a. Divide the verse into words or phrases that will fit onto slips of paper that will go into a plastic egg. On one side of the paper, write the word or words depending on how many slips you are using. On the other side, draw pictures in sequence telling the Easter story. You may need to start at Palm Sunday, depending on how many pictures you need. Be sure to have the words and pictures match the correct sequence for the words. Fill the eggs and hide them. Allow the grandchildren to find, empty, and put the verse together in order. You can make more than one set using different colored eggs for each set. Go over the verse’s meaning with them. Challenge the older grands to memorize the verses.
4. **Easter Story Rocks** – Collect some smooth rocks, paint symbols of Easter on each rock. Discuss the symbols as you choose them and paint them.
5. **Acts of Kindness** – Help your grandkids think through what they could do to show kindness to someone else. Think Romans 5:8.
6. **Read the Bible** – Read the biblical account from an age-appropriate Bible. Focus on “Jesus is alive” for the young ones.
7. **Attend Church Service Together** – Discuss your favorite Easter hymn or song, your favorite scripture passage, and/or a memory of church.
8. **Go Shopping** – You can purchase a new outfit or part of an outfit – always check with parents first. Talk about how you prepare yourself for Easter, especially your heart. It is about the inner spirit, not the outward clothing.
9. **Writing** – Challenge the older grandchildren to write an eye-witness account as one of the people who were there – soldier, women, disciple, so forth. What would they have seen, heard, felt? The younger ones could do a drawing instead.
10. **Passover Meal** – Prepare and eat a seder meal, good for the older grandchildren. Great resources on line to help you.

11. **Meaningful Dinner Conversations** – Think of some questions to ask the grandchildren and some for them to ask you. Try to connect the questions to the Easter story, family traditions, memories, and your personal testimony. Some examples: When did Easter become very real to you? How did you celebrate Easter as a young person? What foods did you eat? What is your favorite memory? For the grandchildren, ask what their favorite part of the holiday is. What do they hope to get in their Easter basket? Do they have a favorite Easter candy?
12. **Send a Puzzle in the Mail** – Write verses and symbols connected to Easter on one side. On the flip side, write in a different color, the message He is Risen! along with a special message from you. Place it in an envelope as individual pieces so the grandchildren can put it together to discover the message.
13. **Pictionary** – If you have grandchildren who like to draw and play games, this is fun. Write out Easter words on index cards. Place face down in a stack and take turns choosing a card and drawing.
14. **Do “You’ve Been Egged” to Grandchildren Who Live Near You** – Check this out on Pinterest. You could also do this with your grandchildren to a home in the community as an outreach.

Of course, be sure to set aside time to thank Jesus for His incredible love and sacrifice. Encourage the grandchildren to voice their prayers of thanksgiving as well. Take steps this Easter season to intentionally teach that Jesus is alive!

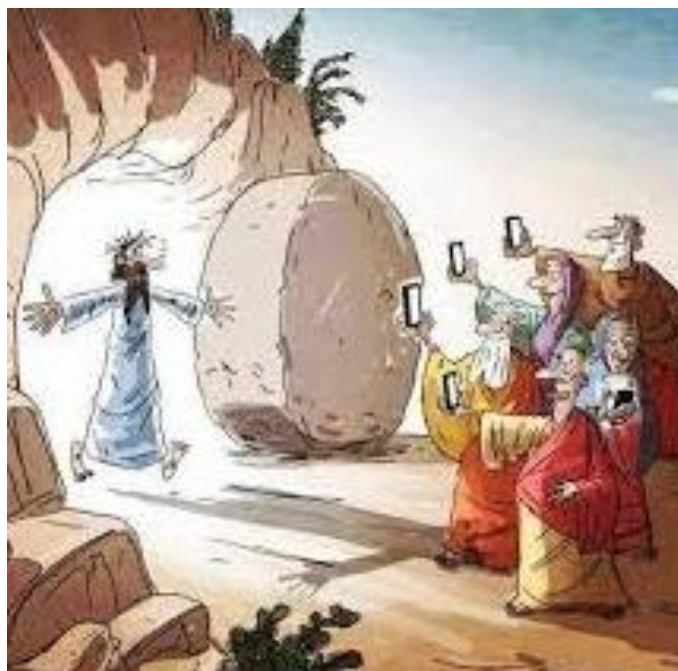
