Dear People of St. Paul,

I checked the SPAM box in my email today. I found out that I am one of 20 lucky winners! I am excited to share with you the good news:

**From: International Monetary Fund (IMF) Headquarters:
Washington, D.C, United States**

Greetings From International Monetary Fund (IMF) and United States Integration, I am hereby to inform you that an alert came to us today from a United Nation Official through the help of the Federal Bureau of Investigation {FBI} here in the United States. According to the reporter, World bank organization together with United State Embassy Nigeria, have approved to compensate 20 lucky beneficiaries as a scam victim, and your email address was found among the 20 lucky beneficiaries, meanwhile the fund will be release this week as soon as the beneficiary meetup/comply with the instruction/requirements such as your personal information and your receiving method....

Next the email asked me to fill in all my personal information, and my bank account numbers so that I could receive the promised gift. It sounds tempting, since I *have* been the victim of scams before. So finally, someone is going to compensate me for that misfortune.

The above scam attempt is blatant and obvious. Some are much more subtle. Scams work because we don't look closely enough when someone is telling us exactly what we want to hear.

No wonder God the Holy Spirit inspired St. Paul to write, ***"The time will come when people will not put up with sound doctrine. Instead, to suit their own desires, they will gather around them a great number of teachers to say what their itching ears want to hear"*** 2 Timothy 4:3. There are plenty of teachers who will offer you an exciting and convenient path to God. They promise, "No repentance required! Be you! Do you! And get God too!".

Don't make the mistake. ***"Watch your ... doctrine closely"*** 1 Timothy 4:16. It is for this reason that Sunday sermons right now are dedicated

to discovering "What's the Difference?" We are examining other religious beliefs that are not based on God's Word in the Bible. My hope and prayer is not only that we will be able to spot the

"scam" of false religions, but also that we will all be more dedicated to knowing, growing in, and sharing with our community the truths that Lutheran Christianity are based upon.

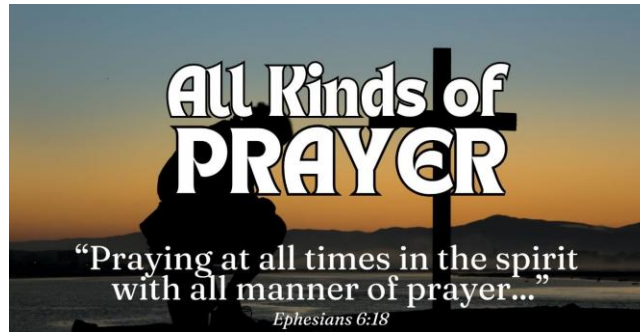

A FOUR WEEK TEACHING SERIES BEGINNING SEPTEMBER 20 AT ST. PAUL



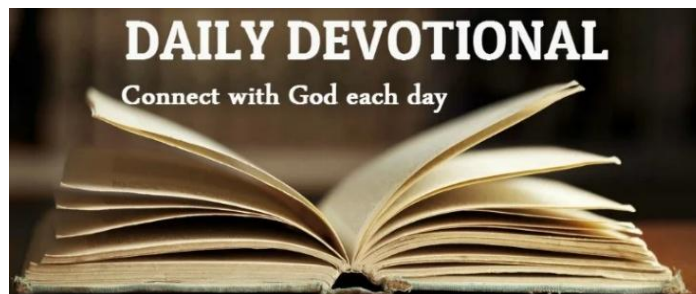

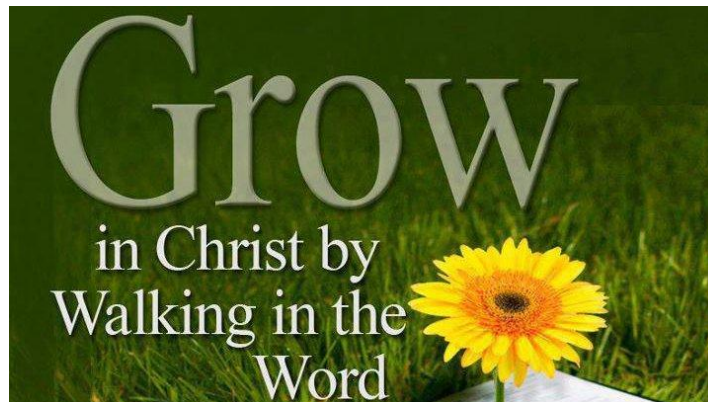

Looking to the Future of St. Paul Lutheran Church Praying and Planning

Congregations like St. Paul are facing circumstances and challenges that we did not know a few decades ago. Worship attendance each Sunday is decreasing as some members fall away from faith in Christ and church involvement. Other members simply worship regularly but less frequently. Our country has changed so that fewer people are Christian than once was the case in America. Many congregations like St. Paul have lower attendance, decreased offerings, fewer children and youth, and predominately an aging membership.

St. Paul’s Board of Directors has been studying the trends at St. Paul and looking for guidance. We must praise God for many, many blessings He has given this congregation.

St. Paul has wonderful, faithful, generous people. The worship services and Bible study groups continue to proclaim Jesus our Savior. New members continue to join St. Paul. First-time guests have been worshipping and many staying. The building and grounds are well kept with no major concerns. Members volunteer to serve. St. Paul does many events trying to reach out. The Preschool continues to have two morning classes which are full. More children and adults have been brought to faith in Christ through the Sacrament of Holy Baptism than in recent years. The community is growing with new homes being built constantly, and new housing developments. New people are being placed within the area St. Paul can minister to them. God has blessed and continues to bless St. Paul Lutheran Church.

While Sunday worship services feel full and have a joyful, energetic spirit of worship, the number of people worshipping each Sunday continues to decline slowly year after year. Our analysis tells us that on average sixty-seven people worship on any given Sunday. Of those members who do attend worship, St. Paul has dedicated saints who attend regularly while most worship only four times per year, yielding an average worship attendance of twenty-six, half of the Sundays of the year.

The average age of St. Paul members is seventy years old. This means that half of our people are age 70 and older, while half are younger. The concern is that given the average life expectancy, it appears that within twenty years half of the current active members will be in heaven and the congregation will be half the current number of people. That prospect causes concern because half the current volunteer servants, and half the number donors will be a very difficult situation.

These “doom and gloom” trends and forecasts will only hold true **IF (1) St. Paul is unwilling to change, and (2) if the congregation does not turn to rely on God alone who is more than able to bless** and strengthen a ministry to reach the lost.

In recent years St. Paul has tried to refocus the ministry of the church to reach children and families with the Gospel, see them come to faith and engage in the church. The ministries and those members who serve in them are good, yet they haven't yielded the results hoped for in growing numbers of people. Many of them rely on the pastor for leadership. As St. Paul members are aging the pastor's time is consumed with hospital and home-bound visits, caring for those dying and those grieving. A different approach to renewal for the future of the church is needed.

Your Board of Directors has been talking to a consulting group called “Five-Two.” Five-Two is a Lutheran group that has helped congregations like ours develop a way of engaging our people and reaching out into the surrounding community. The Strategic Growth Process is an intensive two-year process that helps congregations like ours focus on who in our community we are trying to reach for Jesus, better understand them, and target ministries to them.

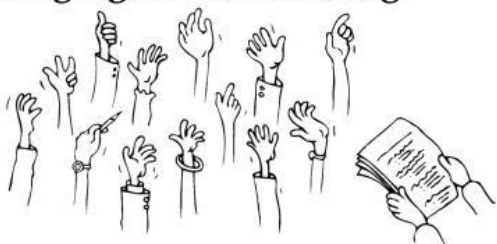
Your Board of Directors has interviewed five congregations who have undergone the Strategic Growth Process with Five-Two. Our interviews reveal that engaging Five-Two is not a “silver bullet” which turns trends around. The congregations do not report rapid growth in numbers of people. Instead, the process changes the way a congregation does ministry to reach out. Ministry gets narrowed from many events, to fewer focused events, filled with

prayer and with Christ-like compassion. The congregations grow to be more intentional. The growth in numbers of people is left to God to work in people's hearts.

Since this is such an important matter, your Board of Directors would like to inform the congregation. The Chairman, Vice-Chair and Pastor have called a Town Hall meeting to be held on Sunday, August 23rd at 10:45am in St. Paul's worship sanctuary. No voting will occur as this is a Town Hall and not a Voters' Assembly meeting. The purpose is to communicate with you, the people of St. Paul, what trends we see, and what a two-year Strategic Growth Process would involve. The process is expensive, and while St. Paul has the money from a bequest, still, you the people should be included in prayerful consideration.

We hope you will attend the Town Hall meeting with a spirit desiring to see the ministry of St. Paul to reach people with Jesus for generations to come. Information on the Town Hall meeting is below.

The artist is currently working on windows capturing Jesus' Baptism, His ministry, and His crucifixion. Memorial gifts are still welcome towards the creation of the windows picturing Jesus' Easter resurrection, and His Ascension to heaven. You are invited to give a lasting gift to God, beautify our worship sanctuary, and memorialize a loved one who has gone ahead to heaven. An information brochure is at the Information Counter detailing this project to replace the worn-out side windows

in the sanctuary with beautiful stained glass that tells the story of our salvation. Please pick up a brochure if you haven't seen one.

Since announcing the program in September 2025, funds for the first window have been secured, the contract signed with the art studio, Azure Stained Glass, and the Birth of Christ window is in production. Members of St. Paul have enthusiastically embraced this program and have been donating generously for the stained glass windows. Gifts being received now are for the 5th window out of the set of 6 windows!

It will take some time for the art studio to produce each unique window. Still, we are eager to see the first done, installed, and dedicated to God's glory.

You have the opportunity to participate in beautifying St. Paul's worship sanctuary. Memorials given in memory of a loved one are welcome, in any amount. Donations may be given by individuals, or groups, for example, "from the Johnson family." Donors may remember their loved one with an inscription of a loved-one's name on our wall plaque entitled, "Life of our Savior Stained Glass Windows have been Given in Memory of"

Your gifts may be given to "St. Paul Lutheran Church" and please add the note "for stained glass windows project." We will then contact you to discuss if your gift is in memory of a loved one and whom you would like memorialized. The Air Conditioning unit that cools the worship sanctuary has failed. It must be replaced immediately. The cost is more than \$25,000!

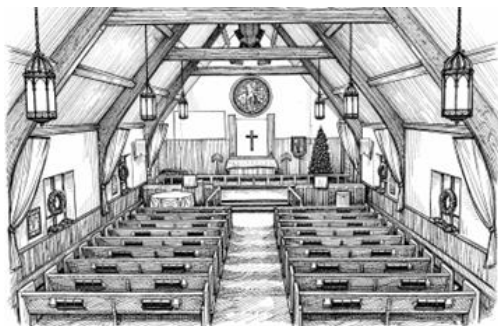
In most congregations a repair that costly would be a crisis. Ministry programs would be cut and maybe staff laid-off. Leaders would appeal to members to give to pay for the urgent need. The people would have to hold bake sales and suppers to raise the funds needed.

At St. Paul we have a unique blessing. Members past had the foresight to realize the need for practical matters like this. Caring saints gave stock to St. Paul which has matured over many years. The result is an endowment that funds crises like this air conditioning system wearing out, and replacing the old heating boiler last year. With the funds available, the congregation's Board of Directors was able to approve the purchase so that the A/C will be replaced without the congregation being disrupted.

Like all blessings, we sinful humans can turn it to something harmful for us. See the Potent Quote at the end of this newsletter. We have the capacity to turn a blessing like this

into self-reliance which may lead us to cease relying of God desperately for every need. This, of course, is not the intent.

Did you know that you too can be a member of St. Paul with foresight? When we realize that all we have belongs to God, and is only entrusted to our care to be used for building His kingdom, then our generosity grows. The Buildings and Facilities Committee

is pleased to share an update on our recent activities and ongoing progress. Over the past several months, we have received a substantial number of responses to both the interior and exterior surveys. Your feedback has been invaluable, and we extend our sincere gratitude to everyone who took the time to share their

We are now in the final stages of preparing our plans and anticipate presenting them to the congregation during the fall. We are confident that these enhancements will benefit everyone and look forward to sharing more details in the coming months. Four Simple Habits That Help Guests Feel Like They Belong

Church members like us often assume hospitality requires a complicated strategy. The truth is much simpler. Guests rarely remember elaborate programs. They remember how people made them feel. Here are four habits you and all of our people can begin practicing immediately.

- 1. Notice before you're needed.** Hospitality starts by paying attention. Look for the person standing alone. Look for confusion and uncertainty. People who feel seen begin relaxing almost immediately.



- 2. Slow down.** Hurried people rarely build meaningful relationships. Slow conversations create lasting impressions.
- 3. Remove confusion.** Guests shouldn't have to guess where to park, where children go, or where restrooms are located. Clear directions reduce anxiety and help people focus on worship instead of logistics.
- 4. Make it personal.** Learn names, ask questions, and remember details. People don't return because they attended an event. They return because someone remembered them.

Hospitality Is Built One Sunday at a Time. None of these habits require additional staff. They simply require all of us to be intentional. As those habits become consistent, they begin shaping the loving and welcoming character of this body of Christ, St. Paul.

Sharing the Good News Far and Wide

Communications Ministry Update

Over the past year, from July 1st, 2025 to June 30th, 2026, our church has been hard at work spreading the message of Jesus across a variety of platforms. We are excited to share some encouraging numbers that show just how far our message has reached.



On Facebook, our posts received an incredible 352,000 views and 8,400 engagements, and we welcomed 21 new followers to our online community. Our YouTube channel also saw great growth, with 106,400 views, over 1,100 hours of content watched, and 173 new subscribers joining in the journey. In the last 90 days alone, Instagram brought in 5,000 views and 164 interactions, helping us connect with members old and new. And since launching on TikTok on June 19th, we've already seen 8,600 views and 387 likes—a fantastic start on a fresh platform!

These numbers are more than just statistics; they represent lives touched and hearts inspired as we share the love and teachings of Jesus beyond our church walls. We have also noticed a meaningful correlation between our online presence and increased attendance at Sunday services, both in person and through our YouTube livestream. It's clear that our communication efforts are making a real difference in our community and beyond.
