
January 1, 2023 The Book of Micah

Read Micah 1:1-7

1 The word of the Lord that came to Micah the Moreshite—what he saw regarding Samaria and Jerusalem in the days of Jotham, Ahaz, and Hezekiah, kings of Judah.

²Listen, all you peoples; pay attention, earth and everyone in it! The Lord God will be a witness against you, the Lord, from his holy temple. ³Look, the Lord is leaving his place and coming down to trample the heights of the earth. ⁴The mountains will melt beneath him, and the valleys will split apart, like wax near a fire, like water cascading down a mountainside. ⁵ All this will happen because of Jacob's rebellion and the sins of the house of Israel. What is the rebellion of Jacob? Isn't it Samaria? And what is the high place of Judah? Isn't it Jerusalem? ⁶Therefore, I will make Samaria a heap of ruins in the countryside, a planting area for a vineyard. I will roll her stones into the valley and expose her foundations. ⁷ All her carved images will be smashed to pieces; all her wages will be burned in the fire, and I will destroy all her idols. Since she collected the wages of a prostitute, they will be used again for a prostitute.

- Who is God addressing and about which Kings and nations?
- Why has God appeared and bringing judgement on Judah and Israel?

Read Micah 2:1-2; 3:1-2, 5, 9-11

¹Woe to those who dream up wickedness and prepare evil plans on their beds!
At morning light they accomplish it because the power is in their hands.
²They covet fields and seize them; they also take houses.
They deprive a man of his home, a person of his inheritance.

¹ Then I said, "Now listen, leaders of Jacob, you rulers of the house of Israel.

Aren't you supposed to know what is just?

² You hate good and love evil.

⁵ This is what the Lord says concerning the prophets who lead my people astray, who proclaim peace when they have food to sink their teeth into but declare war against the one who puts nothing in their mouths.

⁹ Listen to this, leaders of the house of Jacob, you rulers of the house of Israel, who abhor justice and pervert everything that is right, ¹⁰ who build Zion with bloodshed and Jerusalem with injustice. ¹¹ Her leaders issue rulings for a bribe, her priests teach for payment, and her prophets practice divination for silver. Yet they lean on the Lord, saying, "Isn't the Lord among us? No disaster will overtake us."

- What are the people guilty of in the part?
- What leaders does God call out and what is His accusations against them?
- What parallels can we see in our own society?

Read Micah 4:1-4

¹ In the last days the mountain of the Lord's house will be established at the top of the mountains and will be raised above the hills. Peoples will stream to it, ² and many nations will come and say, "Come, let's go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob. He will teach us about his ways so we may walk in his paths." For instruction will go out of Zion and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem. ³He will settle disputes among many peoples and provide arbitration for strong nations that are far away.

They will beat their swords into plows and their spears into pruning knives.

Nation will not take up the sword against nation, and they will never again train for war.

But each person will sit under his grapevine and under his fig tree with no one to frighten him.

Read Micah 6:6-8

What should I bring before the Lord
when I come to bow before God on high?
 Should I come before him with burnt offerings,
with year-old calves?
 Would the Lord be pleased with thousands of rams
or with ten thousand streams of oil?
 Should I give my firstborn for my transgression,
the offspring of my body for my own sin?

⁸ Mankind, he has told each of you what is good and what it is the Lord requires of you: to act justly, to love faithfulness, and to walk humbly with your God.

- How is God leading us into authentic relationships with Him and others?

Read Micah 7:18-20

Who is a God like you,
forgiving iniquity and passing over rebellion
for the remnant of his inheritance?
He does not hold on to his anger forever
because he delights in faithful love.
He will again have compassion on us;
he will vanquish our iniquities.
You will cast all our sins
into the depths of the sea.
You will show loyalty to Jacob
and faithful love to Abraham,
as you swore to our ancestors
from days long ago.
