

Conversation Guide

Take-Aways

- What we should believe:
 - About Eternity (John 14:1-4) I believe there is a heaven and a hell and that Jesus Christ is returning to judge the earth and to establish His eternal kingdom.
- What we should become:
 - Identity: (John 1:12) I
 have worth and value
 because I am made in
 God's image and am His
 child. As His child, I live
 my life to bring glory
 to God and to serve His
 purposes.



- How we should behave:
 - I engage in the missionary task wherever I am:
 (Matthew 28:18-20)
 Through both my words and actions, I engage in gospel conversations with those around me. I take the gospel around the world by going, give, pray and send others


Exaltation does not come from the east, the west, or the desert,

Read the Psalm

- Who was the author of this Psalm?
- What are the things the Psalmist thanks God for?
- Who is speaking when verses 2-5? How do we know this?
 - What does He say He will do?
- Make a list of the things that lead to the downfall of the wicked.
 - Make a list of the things that lead to the lifting up of the righteous. What perspectives to they have that lead to their blessing?




- What do the horns signify in this Psalm? (Check netbible.org Net Notes for help)

Interpretation

 What does this Psalm teach us about God? About Man?

Romans 12:14-21

Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse. Rejoice with those who rejoice; weep with those who weep. Live in harmony with one another. Do not be proud; instead, associate with the humble. Do not be wise in your own estimation. Do not repay anyone evil for evil. Give careful



thought to do what is honorable in everyone's eyes. If possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone. Friends, do not avenge yourselves; instead, leave room for God's wrath, because it is written, Vengeance belongs to me; I will repay, says the Lord. But

If your enemy is hungry, feed him.
If he is thirsty, give him something to drink.
For in so doing you will be heaping fiery coals on his head.

Do not be conquered by evil, but conquer evil with good.




How does this passage fit with Psalm 75?

Exodus 14:13-14

But Moses said to the people, "Don't be afraid. Stand firm and see the Lord's salvation that he will accomplish for you today; for the Egyptians you see today, you will never see again. The Lord will fight for you, and you must be quiet."

- Moses is speaking to the Israelites as they've come up from the Red Sea with Pharoah and his army following after them.
 - How does Moses instruction to them back up what we read about in Psalm 73?



Proverbs 16:18

Pride comes before destruction, and an arrogant spirit before a fall.

 How do we prevent ourselves from becoming arrogant?

Application

- Does this psalm give us the right/permission to gloat over our enemies when they fall?
 - What should be our response when we see others fall?
- How have you caught yourself casting judgment on others and wishing them ill? How can you

approach those situations better in the future?


Romans 2:2-8

Now we know that God's judgment on those who do such things is based on the truth. Do you think—anyone of you who judges those who do such things yet do the same—that you will escape God's judgment? Or do you despise the riches of his kindness, restraint, and patience, not recognizing that God's kindness is intended to lead you to repentance? Because of your hardened and unrepentant heart you are storing up wrath for yourself in the day of wrath, when God's righteous judgment is



revealed. He will repay each one according to his works: eternal life to those who by persistence in doing good seek glory, honor, and immortality; but wrath and anger to those who are self-seeking and disobey the truth while obeying unrighteousness.

- What does this passage tell us about passing judgment on others?
- What should be our motivation toward our enemies- to see them punished or to see them come to repentance?
- How do we hold love for our enemies without endorsing/condoning their sin?
